

ATHLETICS, CUBS TOUTED TO AGAIN CAPTURE PENNANT

Both Top Their Respective
Leagues at Time When
Standings Mark
Race Finale.

The Fourth of July is the unofficial date for naming the winners of the major league pennants, but already the 1930 race resembles the 1929 chase with the Athletics out in front in the junior circuit and the Cubs setting a hot pace in the National division.

If history repeats itself the young men managed by Connie Mack and the McCarthy-inspired team will again battle for baseball's premier honor for on July 4, 1929, the Athletics were leading the American league and the Cubs showing the way in the National.

The world's champions sailed again yesterday to gain ground on their rivals, although rallying in the eighth to defeat Detroit 3 to 1. Eddie Riomel, whose chief asset has been as a relief hurler, had his knuckle ball working to perfection, letting the Tigers down with seven hits.

Yanks Still Coming
The Yankees kept pace with the champions by staging one of their frequent slug fests, during which Babe Ruth hit his thirtieth home run of the season and the fifteenth during the month of June. The Babe is now six games and 12 days ahead of his 1927 record, when he cracked out 60 four-base hits.

The White Sox were victims of the Yankees' wrath, losing 15 to 4. The Washington Senators also kept in the midst of the American league scramble, maintaining their place with the Yanks two games back of the Athletics. In defeating the St. Louis Browns, 2 to 1, Marberry led the Browns down with four hits, one of which was a home run by Kress, while the Senators touched Blahodier for eight.

A five-run rally off "Duke" Durham in the eighth gave the Indians an 8 to 3 verdict over the Red Sox. Belye Deane started and finished his first game for Cleveland, holding the Sox to eight hits.

Cubs Down Giants
With the Robins idle because of wet grounds at St. Louis, the Cubs took advantage of the situation to increase their lead in the National league to one and one-half games as they defeated the Giants 10 to 5. The victory was the Cubs' twelfth triumph in fourteen starts. Gabby Hartnett connected with his second home run while Melvin Ott got out his sixteenth.

In the only other National league game the Boston Braves managed to eke out a 6 to 5 victory over the Pirates. Lloyd Waner, who has been recovering from an operation, made his first appearance of the season in the Pittsburgh lineup. He failed to hit in two official times at bat but made two putouts.

Safe Celebration of Holiday Pays Dividends in Life and Limb; Many "Don'ts" Listed

A SAFE OR AN INSANE 'FOURTH'



July Fourth to Exact Heavy Toll Again This Year; Sane Conduct Urged.

CHICAGO, July 1.—(Special.)—A massed attack of the accident-mongers is scheduled to get under way on the stroke of midnight, July 3, and when the smoke of battle clears away 24 hours later, the life, liberty and happiness for which our forefathers fought will have turned to oblivion for several hundred Americans and to a bitter memory for thousands more.

That is how the National Safety Council views the impending July Fourth celebration which, despite repeated warnings and anti-fireworks legislation, again threatens the happiness of many homes throughout the country.

In its annual plea to the nation's merry-makers for a sane observance of the Fourth, the safety organization points out that the biggest day in American history—and the most glorious—is robbed of much of its glory because it exacts a greater toll in accidental suffering and death than any other day of the year.

Day of Many Hazards
While many of the most tragic deaths, and the most severe and painful injuries are caused by fireworks, pyrotechnics are but one of the hazards which must be kept with. Out of approximately 450 Fourth of July fatalities, but a small per cent will be charged directly to fireworks.

It is estimated, however, that at least 25 deaths occur previous to the Fourth from fireworks, and another 50 or more die shortly after the holiday from lockjaw as a result of the celebration.

Each year there are a number of deaths from stray bullets, and even blank cartridges cause many tetanus deaths. Numerous fires, started from bonfire celebrations, matches and so-called "harmless" sparklers, exact their toll in lives lost.

A surprisingly large number of children die each year from eating firecrackers and torpedoes. Aside from the fatalities resulting directly from fireworks, the two principal causes of death on the Fourth are motor vehicles and drowning. While the average daily automobile death toll in July is around 90 victims, it is estimated that this number is doubled on that day. Fireworks contribute largely to this increase.

Records kept for a number of years show that accidental drownings occur far more frequently on the Fourth than on any other day of the year.

**COMMUNIST SLAIN,
POLICEMAN HURT
IN N. Y. BATTLE**

NEW YORK, July 1.—Undeterred by the slaying of one of their number by a policeman during a melee yesterday, Harlem communists were planning another demonstration today in honor of a dead negro whom they view as a martyr to their cause.

Thirty Mexican and Spanish communists were parading to the funeral parlor in Lenox avenue where lay the body of Alfred Laro when a riot developed over an attempt by Patrolman Edmund O'Brien to halt the procession because it lacked a parade permit.

The policeman was knocked down and beaten and his club wrested from him. Raging in his feet, he fired one shot at Gonzalo Gonzalez, a Mexican communist, whom he said was the one who had taken his club and beaten him with it. The shot struck Gonzalez in the heart and he died in a taxi cab in which O'Brien was taking him to a hospital.

After the shooting the parading communists fled. O'Brien was treated at the hospital for severe bruises of the head, arms and legs. The communists planned to have 4,000 members attend the funeral procession of Laro late today. They contend he died of a fractured skull Saturday after he had been beaten by a policeman. The police maintain the negro was hit by a missile thrown from a roof.

After an autopsy it was announced death had been caused by apoplexy.

**AUTOISTS IN RUSH

ENGLAND'S FLEET ADMIRAL BEATTY ATTACKS TREATY

Great Britain Impotent to Control Her Empire, He Says—Hoover Will Force Action.

LONDON, July 1.—Earl Beatty, admiral of the fleet, attacked the London naval treaties vigorously in the house of lords today. He declared England was the only nation under the treaty that made any disarmament or reduction of its sea strength.

Admiral Beatty told the lords that Britain was obliged to make such reduction that she was rendered impotent and incapable of maintaining control over the various parts of her far-flung empire.

In the United States, Earl Beatty said, "the conference has had the result of increasing their armaments in cruisers by no less than 233,000 tons."

"Japan is increasing her cruiser tonnage by ten per cent. France is not restricted in any way. She has built three 10,000-ton cruisers. She is building three more and has authorized another two."

"Italy has built two cruisers, is building four and has authorized one."

U. S. Not Considered
Continuing, Earl Beatty said that in all the calculations at the admiralty they never had taken the United States into consideration.

"Indeed, the admiralty were ordered not to do so in formulating their requirements. It was recognized that if she (the United States) wished to build up to our standard she could do so without causing us any anxiety whatever."

"To provide protection against naval attacks on the part of the United States was not to form a part of our scheme of defense. It was completely out of the question."

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Hoover has decided to call the senate into special session for consideration of the London naval treaty next Monday. If congress adjourns this week.

Congressional leaders were making a drive today to assure an adjournment by Thursday night to permit a holiday over the Fourth of July.

CONGRESS FAVORS FEDERAL HELP IN BUILDING ROADS

With the western states intensively interested in highways, congress has moved to lend federal assistance through the passage of the Oddie-Colton bill authorizing appropriations for the construction and maintenance of main roads through unappropriated or unreserved public lands and non-taxable Indian lands.

This measure, which has been consistently supported by the Oregon State Motor association, is of far-reaching importance to the eleven western states where the bulk of the land is non-taxable. So important was the measure that Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the association, and J. E. Shelton, secretary-manager, each spent several weeks in Washington working for the passage of the measure.

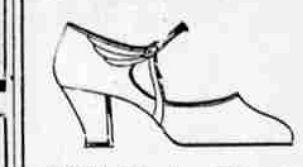
The Oddie-Colton bill, sponsored by Senator Tasker L. Oddie, of Nevada, and Representative Don B. Colton, of Utah, has the same purpose as the measure vetoed by President Coolidge in 1928, except that it leaves to congress the actual amount to be appropriated. Therefore, it is believed that President Hoover will sign the revived bill.

The motor association says in effect, the measure passed by the senate on the heels of favorable action in the house, amends the act providing for the United States to aid in road building. As a result, congress is enabled by law to consider the large federal owned and non-taxable areas of the west.

"This money," says the statement, "could only be used in a state having in excess of five per cent of the total area of all of its lands in unappropriated public lands and non-taxable lands, and will be apportioned to these states in the proportion that said public lands is to the total area."

"It means the speeding up of construction on highways through 100,000 square miles of unappropriated and unreserved public lands and the building of important links in transcontinental roads."

WYOMING'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE SPEAKS FOR LAND STATES

Assails Proposed Transfer Without Mineral Right, Supports Plans of Declaration.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 1.—To Governor Frank C. Emerson of Wyoming fell the role yesterday of spokesman for the eleven western public land states in presenting to the national governors conference the problems incident to the federal ownership of more than one fourth of their area.

While the 37 other states have been given title to practically all the public lands within their borders, the Wyoming executive told his fellow governors 228,000 acres of federal land still remain in the 11 westernmost states "and additional lands have been withdrawn for classification with the purpose of further reservations in view."

"No longer can patent for mineral claims be obtained," he continued, "but rather the property is handled by lease and the federal landlord continues to control. These things seem to indicate a permanent trustship upon the part of the federal government which was not contemplated under the theory applied to other states and which is certainly subject to challenge by reason of the extent of its application. Parity between the public land states and other states of the union in this relation, seems afar."

Wants Mineral Rights
Hailing the proposal of President Hoover for turning over to the western states the surface rights to some 2,000,000 acres within their borders, Governor Emerson deplored the fact that the mineral rights likewise were not included in the proposed action. He declared the surface rights of the remaining lands are of little value, and pointed to "the experience of his own state in administering mineral deposits in her school lands as evidence of the competence of states to conserve them."

The governor also voiced a plea for continuation of the policy of federal reclamation which he said had been attacked in some quarters through ignorance of the real situation, and protested against refusal of the interior department to grant permits under the mineral leasing act.

Pleading for "conservatism in conservation," he denied that in the case of Wyoming in particular there has been any waste or overproduction of oil and asked

the eastern governors for "sympathetic consideration" of the problems of the west.

CHICAGO GUNMEN GET VICTIM NO. 42
