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The Boosting Spirit

THIS section of Oregon, this Umpqua valley of ours, is going ahead rapidly. The sheer boosting spirit of the people is carrying us forward to a bigger and better city and a more prosperous valley. What is meant by "boosting spirit"? Here is an example of two: Just a little over a year ago our chamber of commerce secretary, W. C. Harding, conceived the idea that the northwest states needed a national home for veterans and that such home should be located in Roseburg. Work began with the idea, Oregon's delegation in congress was interested, Dr. Stewart gave up his practice for nearly two months and went to Washington and as a result of everybody working and cooperating a bill for a home has passed both houses of congress and now awaits the signature of the president. That is evidence of the boosting spirit.

Here is another bit of evidence. An enactment of the legislature finally made it possible for the people of the North Umpqua road district to decide for themselves whether or not a road district should be formed. The district was voted by a majority of nearly five to one. That is evidence of the boosting spirit. But here is some more: Poultrymen of Douglas county wanted the egg cooperative to install a packing plant here. There were only half enough members signed up in the association to warrant the establishment of a plant. The leaders of the poultry industry immediately put over a campaign for membership and DOUBLED the membership in the marketing association. An egg packing plant will be built here this summer and will be placed in operation this fall.

All of the above items of progress and evidences of the boosting spirit have occurred during the past twelve or fourteen months. These were just skirmishes, getting us in fighting trim for some bigger accomplishments. Douglas county needs an east-west railroad. Douglas county needs industrial plants to convert our already over-ripe forests into lumber, into pulp and paper, into cellulose products—rayon, etc.

These things are possible. We have seen what an intense application of the "boosting spirit" will do for us in a short period. Suppose we now lay out a larger plan allowing more time, working for an even greater result—we have a reasonable chance of success. It is interesting work, work that binds a community closer together and it is fun to fight, win, lose or draw.

This idea that a car license is easier to buy on July 1 than on January 1, is a huge joke. Has anybody discovered that he actually HAS more money now than at any other time?

You can't blame those brothers in Chicago for wanting to stay up there in the air where it is safe. Matter of time, though, and the gangsters will develop antique craft.

go on BUYING things that you and I have for sale.

WHAT happens to people NOW when they grow old and have no accumulated or inherited property? Why, they have to be SUPPORTED, of course.

Who has to support them? Well, their relatives, perhaps, if they have relatives with sufficient earnings or SPENDING power. And what does that mean?

HERE is what it means: Those who are spending money for the support of aged relatives haven't so much money left to spend for SOMETHING ELSE—possibly for something else that you and I have for sale, and out of whose sale we make our living. So, you see, it isn't just the contributing relatives who really support those who are too old to earn their living. In the long run, a share of the burden gets around to all of us.

YOU may not believe that. All right, here is an example:

You may pay no taxes DIRECTLY. But you buy things from people who DO PAY TAXES. Their taxes are a part of their cost of doing business, and are added to the price of the articles you buy. So, you see, you pay your share of the taxes, whether you are taxed DIRECTLY or not.

AND so it is with the support of the aged and the infirm and the UNEMPLOYED. In the long run, in one way or another, all those who CAN'T EARN or who DON'T EARN are supported by those who DO EARN. You can't get away from it.

That is why unemployment insurance and old age insurance are not so radically unsound as at first thought they SEEM to be.

THIS world has made tremendous MATERIAL progress in the century included in Mr. Whitford's life span. This world will make even greater material progress in the next century.

This writer, who ISN'T a socialist, who would be insulted if he were classed as a radical dreamer, has an idea that we are going to fall far short of our ideals if in the future we are satisfied with mere MATERIAL progress.

If we are going to go as far as we WANT to go in the direction of real human progress we must give some serious thought to the problem of making life fuller and pleasanter and more LIVABLE to the whole average body of human beings.

THAT kind of progress is called SOCIAL PROGRESS. In the past we have given the horse laugh to the social reformers who have tried to bring about this kind of progress. We have called them crazy idealists who don't know anything about business and the rules by which it is done.

But, very slowly, the idea is dawning upon us that if the condition of the whole average body of human beings can be improved, BUSINESS will get BETTER.

It is a new idea, but a fascinating one.

BUT don't forget this: There is NO SUCH THING as something for nothing. We can't vote ourselves rich. The only way in which the average condition of average human beings can be improved is by seeing to it that everybody who can WORK AND EARN.

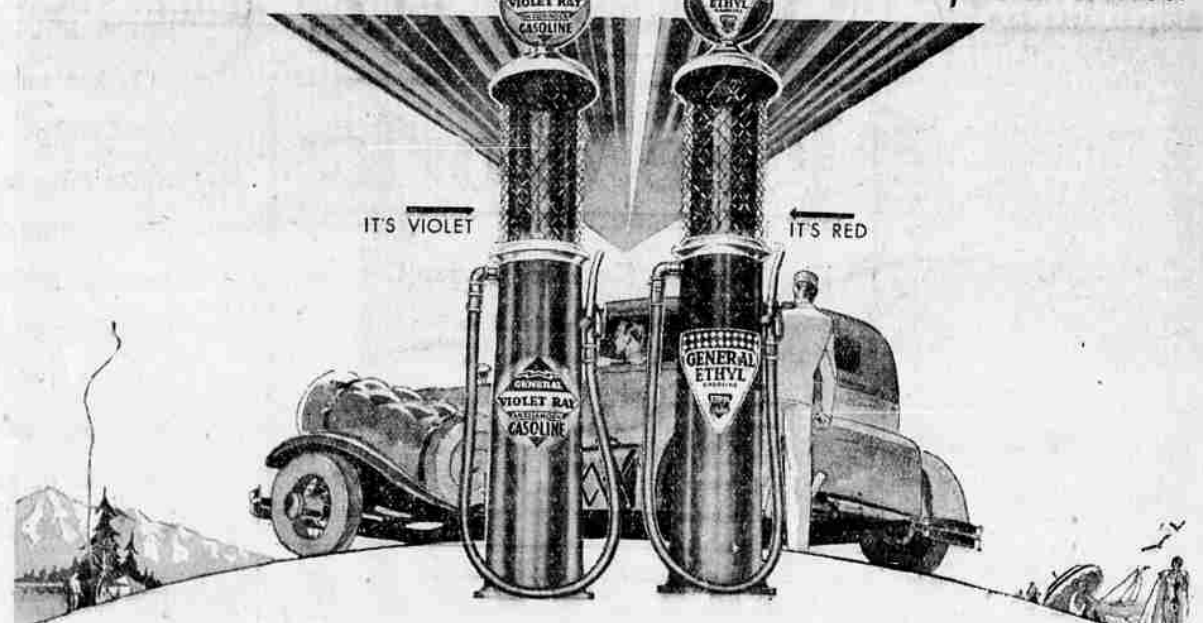
