

HOUSE SUPPORTS VIEWS OF HOOVER ON PENSION BILL

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The house today adopted the conference report on the veterans' pension bill and only senate approval is needed for final congressional action.

The house provided a maximum of \$40 for veterans with permanent disabilities as opposed to \$60 voted by the senate.

The conference agreement retained the house language which withheld disability pensions from those who are able to pay income taxes.

The senate amendment allowing compensation to veterans who suffered disability from venereal disease contracted in service also was eliminated.

In his letter to Senator Watson, the republican leader, President Hoover condemned the additional made to the veterans' bill by the senate. He said the senate bill increased the cost of the house legislation by about 250 per cent.

Hoover Gives Objections

"You request my views on the effects of the senate amendments to the house veterans' bill."

"I must say at once that these amendments again re-establish injustices and discriminations between veterans, impose unwarranted burdens on the taxpayer and perpetuate entirely wrong principles in such legislation."

"There are many points of criticism in this direction."

"For instance, under these amendments, the average allowance to veterans whose disabilities were incurred in civil life, subsequent to the war, will work out very close to the same average payment as that given to veterans who actually suffered from battle and in the trenches."

"This is an injustice both to the men who suffered from the war and to the public."

"The senate amendments seriously affect the men who were enrolled after the armistice and who never heard a shot fired; they seriously modify the clauses in respect to venereal diseases and impose burdens upon the treasury therefor, which must be condemned from the point of view of family life."

Vets O. K. House Bill

"There are many other objections to the senate amendments such as renewal of certain presumptions, but perhaps this will indicate my views. The bill as passed by the house, before amended by the senate, was in itself a generous national action, based upon sound principles. Except for some minor technical points the house bill met the entire approval of the representatives of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. They did not ask for any more. They had shown a sense of responsibility not only to the country but to the veterans, by unhesitatingly expressing their opposition to the major senate amendments."

The quick conference agreement increased hope congress would be able to adjourn by nightfall. Speaker Longworth was ready to press house action and expressed hope the legislative affairs could be wound up by 6 p. m.

FARMER SHOULD EAT WHAT HE RAISES, EXPERT ADVICE

CHICAGO, July 3.—The farmer must learn to eat what he raises, the farm press division of the national dairy council has decided.

M. D. Munn, president of the council, said the farmer himself was largely responsible for overproduction of dairy products, espe-

cially butter, because his tendency is to "sell his cream and eat substitutes."

Munn said the campaign was an outgrowth of an emergency scheme that resulted in reduction of surplus butter by more than 1,300,000 pounds between January and April.

SAMMY BAKER IN HOSPITAL AFTER FIGHT WITH GANS

Collapses in Final Round
and Fracture of Skull
Feared—Griffith
Whips Risko.

CLEVELAND, July 3.—Sergeant Sammy Baker, the veteran New York welterweight campaigner, was in a serious condition today from head injuries suffered in a boxing at the hands of "Baby" Joe Gans of California in the 12-round fight here last night.

Baker collapsed in the last round and was taken to St. Alexis hospital, where an X-ray was ordered today to learn whether he was suffering from a hemorrhage of the brain or a fractured skull.

Baker, reeling from Gans' onslaught and at the limit of endurance from eight knockdowns, staggered backward and sank to the canvas after a minute and 35 seconds of the final round. As referee tolled nine, the New Yorker gamely pulled himself to his feet to face another two-fisted flailing from his negro rival. He sank to the canvas once more and this time Referee Brock ruled it a technical knockout.

The stricken fighter was carried from the ring, moaning in delirium and half-conscious, and was taken to the hospital in an ambulance after first refusing to leave his dressing room.

Baker won only three rounds, the third, fourth and eighth, although he twice felled Gans. Nearly 4,000 spectators alternately cheered and booed the pair, who some time ago fought a vicious 10-round draw at Madison Square garden.

Baker's condition was reported somewhat improved this morning, but hospital attendants said the extent of his injuries could not be determined until an X-ray was taken. He was resting easily.

Griffith Beats Risko

CHICAGO, July 3.—Gerald Ambrose Griffith, the aspiring heavyweight hope from Sioux City, Iowa, silenced his chiding critics at the Chicago stadium last night by giving Johnny Risko a sound thrashing in 10 rounds.

It was his third victory over the notorious despoiler of championship hopes and by far his most impressive.

Risko, veteran of many a tough battle against even tougher fighters than "Tuffy," stood upright through it all, however, and never was in distress.

From a financial standpoint, the match was far from a success. Less than 10,000 watched it and the receipts only totaled approximately \$30,000.

Colman Beats Karasick

PORTLAND, Ore., July 3.—Abe Colman, Jewish light heavyweight wrestler of New York, defeated Al Karasick, Portland, two out of three falls here last night. Colman took the first fall in 24 minutes, 40 seconds with a series of flying tackles and the third in 14 minutes 20 seconds with a crotch and armbar hold. The second fall went to

Karasick in 18 minutes, 50 seconds with a series of headlocks.

Colman weighed 155 pounds; Karasick, 176.

CONGRESS SOFTENS JONES LIQUOR LAW

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The senate yesterday passed a house bill modifying the Jones law to provide lighter penalties to petty offenders of the prohibition act.

The measure went through the senate on motion of Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, without debate. It provides those convicted of selling, making or transporting less than a gallon of liquor are subject to a penalty of not more than \$2500 and jail sentence of not more than six months.

The senate amended the bill to stipulate these lighter terms should apply only if the defendant was not engaged habitually in the liquor traffic and had not been convicted of violation of the dry laws two years before.
