HORSESHOE FALLS WINS FIGHT WITH MAN IN BARREL

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., July 5.—Shooting the Horseshoe falls in an oak barrel of his own design is believed to have cost George E. Statakiis, 46, Buffalo, self-styled Greek philosopher, his life today. Statakiis took the plunge over the falls at 3:35 p. m. and an hour later river men were lined along the shore of the river below the falls still waiting for him and his barrel to appear. The barrel was believed to have been crushed against the jagged rocks at the foot of the cataract. The barrel was said to weigh at least a ton and it was ten feet long. The interior was padded and equipped with a spring mattress.
