HOOVER URGES ACTION ON NAVAL TREATY

TWO boys, raised on a farm, buy a second-hand airplane and fly it 50,000 miles in transport service.
Then, fired by ambition, they take their already old machine up over the city of Chicago and remain in the air for 23 days—longer than any human being ever flew continuously before.

IT took BOYS to do that. Mature men would have been too SMART, too full of the cautious wisdom that comes of experience, to tackle any such fool undertaking.

THESE boys, in their second-hand plane with its thousands of miles behind it, fly the equivalent of once and a half around the world, their engine never faltering in all the 23 days of steady grind.
The time is approaching when we shall EXPECT ENDURANCE of airplanes, instead of being SURPRISED by it.

HERE is something to think about: Just as soon as sustained endurance may be confidently expected of aircraft, the whole face of travel will be changed and the far-away places will no longer be far away.

THE old-fashioned Fourth of July, with its cannon crackers, its tetanus germs and its TOLL OF DEATH, is gone, replaced by the modern safe and sane Fourth, with the highways filled with automobiles going from here to there.
The cannon crackers have been banned and the tetanus germs are half forgotten, but the TOLL OF DEATH remains, as you know if you have read the record of Friday's accidents.

TIMES and manners change, but DANGER doesn't change. It remains ever present, and its hand-maiden is carelessness.

Blacks Elude Posse After Fatal Clash

FOUR REACH SAFETY IN 3 DAYS' CHASE

Alabama Governor States
Posted Rewards Apply
to Whites if They
Caused Riots.

Two White Men and Four
Negroes Slain in Row
Over Transaction
July Fourth.

EMELLE, Ala., July 7.—Rifles and pistols were sheathed today as this strife-torn village completed the burial of its dead—two white men and four negroes—slain in disorders arising from an Independence day debt dispute.

Four other negroes, each with a prize of \$200 on his head, still were at large, but virtually all of several hundred white possmen had given up a three-day manhunt, insisted after a negro family engaged in a gun fight with a white family over the payment for an automobile battery.

Official rewards which have been posted for the four negro fugitives, Governor Bibb Graves said at Montgomery, "are not merely for negroes who killed white men" but would be paid "for the arrest and conviction of any body, white or black, responsible at Emelle."

An unidentified negro man and Viola Dial, a negro woman, were the last two killed. They were shot to death yesterday when the commands of white searchers were not obeyed. Previously Grover Boyd and Charlie Morris, both white men, were killed and in turn a negro was lynched and another fatally shot. Both of the negroes were kinsmen of Tom Robertson, who with three sons, fled and has not been apprehended.

The unidentified negro killed yesterday, officers said, replied with bullets and wounded Clarence Bush, a white man, upon being ordered to submit to a search. The badly mangled man was slain when his husband failed to halt his automobile.

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DEATH SUMMONS NOTABLE FIGURE

Death no longer holds any secret for Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, internationally famed spiritualist, for he passed into the great beyond today at the age of 71. In the world of literature he was known as the creator of "Sherlock Holmes" in a series of detective stories and for his defense of England's courage in the Boer war. For the latter work an appreciative government conferred upon him the honor of knighthood.

U. S. PROH AGENT VICTIM OF MURDER

AGUILAR, Colo., July 7.—The slaying of Dale F. Kearney, federal prohibition officer, from ambush here early yesterday was today the object of investigation by county, state and federal authorities who are working with admittedly meager clues as to identity of the assassins.

Kearney, who had established a record of unusual activity against liquor violators, is the first federal dry agent to be killed in Colorado while on duty. This coupled with the fact he was chosen particularly for enforcement in this section of the state and transferred from the Denver office, has added impetus to attempts at solving his murder. There were no witnesses to the shooting.

Five shotgun shells were found behind a fence near which Kearney's body fell after receiving virtually the entire charge of the gunman's fire in the right side. Sixteen lead pellets were removed from his body.

Kearney is known to have received anonymous letters threatening his life since he joined the federal staff 14 months ago. He is credited with "cleaning up" Walsenburg, near here, and with many single-handed raids. Kearney ordinarily worked alone and rarely asked the aid of either city or county officers in making arrests.

Kearney was a World war veteran and was decorated for bravery under fire. He is survived by a widow and two small daughters.

DEATH TAKES ARTHUR DOYLE IN 71ST YEAR

"Sherlock Holmes" Author
and Noted Exponent of
Spiritualism Dies
in England.

Psychic Phenomena Belief
Becomes Basis of His
Main Work After
World War.

LONDON, July 6.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of "Sherlock Holmes" and widely known spiritualist, died at his home here today of heart disease. Sir Arthur was 71 years old.

Sir Arthur was born at Edinburgh, the son of Charles Doyle, grandson of John Doyle, best known as "H. P." and a nephew of Punch's celebrated Richard Doyle. All three of these were widely-known artists and caricaturists.

Arthur Conan Doyle, latterly Sir Arthur, played many roles in his life and most of them famously. He was a physician in the 80's, and a sensational brilliant novelist in the 90's.

After the dawn of this century Sir Arthur exerted his literary efforts in placing before Europe the facts of the Boer war and for this he was made a knight of the realm.

Espones the Occult
In the world war, when his own son lost his life, Sir Arthur delved deeply into spiritualism, through that medium seeking to detect the world beyond with all the zeal he had put into his previous fictional writings.

When he was 60 Sir Arthur announced his retirement from writing to devote the remainder of his days to the study and expounding of spiritualism. He thereafter wrote books about the occult, crossing oceans to lecture and gave the world superb assurance of his faith by announcing he and Lady Doyle were fully convinced they had communicated with their dead son and that the son had replied.

2 HURT AS AUTOS CRASH ON BRIDGE

Nina Avery, Los Angeles vaudeville performer, suffered a broken knee cap and minor injuries when her car, occupied also by O. R. Worrlow, Nels Teeter and W. J. Driscoll, other members of the troupe, was struck by a car driven by Curtis W. Blakely, Richfield beacon station employee, at the Deer creek bridge this morning.

Blakely was coming into town from the north, while the Los Angeles car was northbound and the two machines collided on the north end of the bridge. Blakely suffered a deep cut over his right eye. Miss Avery was taken to Roseburg General hospital, where her injuries were treated by Dr. L. M. Lebach. A complaint charging Blakely with reckless driving was issued in the justice court following the wreck.

CRASH AND FLAMES PREVENT OCEAN HOP

ST. JOHNS, N. F., July 7.—Flames which destroyed his plane and put Major C. S. Wynne-Eyton of England in a hospital, have ended his attempt to fly eastward across the Atlantic.

Crashing from a height of 20 feet here yesterday, the English aviator suffered slight burns and cuts. His De Havilland Moth airplane burst into flames and was destroyed.

Wynne-Eyton, squadron leader of the royal air force reserves, had hoped off to fly to Harbor Grace. The plane nose dived after taking off with a wind at his back.

Braving the flames which quickly enveloped the craft, onlookers pulled the aviator out. Doctors said he would recover.

Wynne-Eyton has flown in France, Africa and India for 16 years. He is 42 years old and has the D. S. O.

PRINCIPALS IN CALIFORNIA MURDER MYSTERY

Roderick had been missing for some time, without satisfactory explanation by his wife who claimed her husband drank to excess and beat her. Officers became suspicious of foul play when Woodring was seen operating a road grader over the well to completely fill it. An illicit love affair is advanced as a possible motive for the murder.

MRS. R. M'LAUGHLIN CLAIMED BY DEATH

Following an illness extending over 2 years, Mrs. Robert L. McLaughlin, member of a well-known Douglas county pioneer family, died Sunday, July 6, at her home on South Deer creek. She was 53 years of age and was born at English settlement, near Oakland, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Harvey.

Besides her husband, who was born in Douglas county in 1857, Mrs. McLaughlin leaves three daughters: Mrs. Robert (Maxine) Arnold of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and Misses Elleen and Roberta McLaughlin, residing at the family home. She also leaves the following brothers and sisters: William Harvey of Sacramento, Calif.; Robert Harvey of Oakland, Ore.; Thomas Harvey, Mrs. W. A. Pearce and Mrs. W. N. Sponagle of Roseburg.

Mrs. McLaughlin, prior to her marriage in 1901, taught school for several years.

Funeral services will be held at the chapel of the Roseburg Undertaking parlors Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. W. R. Baird of the Christian church conducting. Interment will follow in I. O. O. F. cemetery under direction of M. E. Ritter.

OWNERS CHANGE AT IMPLEMENT HOUSE

Herbert Beyers and J. C. Royce, who have been members of the firm of Leake and Beyers, Roseburg, dealers in farm implements and equipment, have sold their interests to F. C. Gurnee, who is to be associated with Walter Leake, senior member of the firm, in the future affairs of the company. The deal is made immediately effective. Mr. Gurnee now being actively engaged in the business, Mr. Beyers will devote his time to the management of the Douglas County Turkey Growers association, and Mr. Royce will continue operation of his farm on South Deer creek.

POSTMASTER SLAIN: 3 SUSPECTS JAILED

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 7.—Three loggers were under arrest here in connection with the fatal shooting Saturday night of Carl Krummel, merchant and postmaster at Adna, in a revolver battle, when an attempt was made to rob the store.

The men held are Matt Simila, high climber; Stanley Phillips, and Blaine McCoy, chasers.

The accused were arrested at an apartment house in Centralia. According to Sheriff Degezler the three suspects told different stories, but all admitted they were in Adna about the time the shooting took place. They also claim they had been drinking.

HUSTON REMAINS AS G. O. P. GUIDE

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Clayton Huston has no intention of resigning as party chairman at the conference of republican leaders here Thursday.

He conferred with President Hoover an hour and a half last night.

Asked about their meeting Huston declined to comment. He said he was not going to give any credence to the many stories published recently about his intentions of resigning by either affirming or denying them.

There was a very definite indication, however, that he was going ahead as national chairman at least for the time being. It was pointed out if he intended to resign, this action would not be in order at Thursday's meeting of national committee officers.

Senator Fess of Ohio who has been discussed at White House conferences as a successor to Huston, returned from a week-end visit with the president at his Virginia camp last night and issued a statement denying the party chairmanship had been discussed. He disavowed being a candidate for that post.

VANNUTELLI, AT 93, REPORTED VERY ILL

VATICAN CITY, July 7.—Cardinal Vannutelli, dean of the sacred college, today was reported in a serious condition with an attack of uraemic poisoning.

Cardinal Vannutelli, who is 93 years old, was reported ill on June 6. At that time it was said his condition was not serious, but that he had been ordered to take a complete rest.

The cardinal was said to have overtaxed his strength at Ascension day ceremonies on May 29.

3 DAYS' HOLIDAY CLAIMS 404 LIVES

CHICAGO, July 7.—This year's celebration of the Fourth was a triple-jointed affair—Friday, Saturday and Sunday—and the nation paid with 226 additional lives for the extra fun she had.

The three-day holiday altogether cost 404 lives.

Fireworks and toy pistols killed 29—a small percentage of the total, yet regarded as large in view of the restrictions against fire works in most parts of America. The automobile took 178 lives, and 121 persons were drowned. Airplane accidents, heat, heart attacks induced by holiday excitement, lightning and other causes connected directly with the holiday resulted in 76 deaths.

WASHINGTON CITIES AFTER VETS' HOME

Vancouver, Chehalis and Olympia, Washington, are all candidates for the branch of the national soldiers home authorized by congress and approved by the president for the Pacific northwest, according to word reaching this city. Vancouver recently announced an active campaign to secure the home, and pledged donation of a site. Olympia has also taken steps, through its chamber of commerce, to secure a suitable site to offer the government, and now Chehalis announces the appointment of a committee composed of A. L. Ribelin, Don G. Abel and Dan W. Bush to endeavor to secure the institution for that place.

The fact that so many Washington cities are in the field, while all of Oregon is endorsing the one site at Roseburg, is regarded as greatly in favor of Roseburg as the prospective location for the home. The board of managers is believed to be strongly in favor of the location afforded in the Unquappa valley, and it is thought to be merely a question now of picking out a suitable local site for the institution.

FILM ACTOR FACES CHARGE OF BATTERY

LOS ANGELES, July 7.—Rex Lease, film actor, was arrested early today on a charge preferred by Vivian Duncan of the Duncan Sisters stage team. Appearing in Malibu before Justice of the Peace John Webster, Miss Duncan displayed a noticeably discolored eye and bruised face. She alleged Lease had struck her during a party at the beach home of a friend.

Lease pleaded not guilty and was held under \$500 bail here. He was arrested at the Malibu beach home of Charles Farrell, also of the films.

JACK M. HUBER DIES AT GLENGARY HOME

Jack M. Huber, a well known resident of Glengary district, passed away after a short illness last Saturday evening. He was born in Ohio on Feb. 20, 1882, and came to this state from Leeds, N. D., about 11 years ago. He was married in San Francisco, Calif., on Jan. 12, 1918, to Miss Linda Johnson, who survives him as do three children, Andrea Katherine, Rosella Johnson and Lewis Andrew. Services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home tomorrow at 10 a. m. Rev. H. B. Shoen, of the First Baptist church, officiating. Interment will take place in the Civil Bend cemetery. H. C. Stearns is in charge of arrangements.

BASEBALL PLAYER GETS BROKEN LEG

Clarence Wilson, Yoncalla baseball player, suffered a compound fracture of the leg yesterday while playing baseball at Oakland. The injury occurred when he slid into a base during the progress of the game. He was taken to Portland last night and will be treated at the U. S. veterans' hospital.

FAILURE NOW WOULD HURT PEACE PLANS

U. S. Wants Only Adequate
Defense, Senate Told
in Message From
White House.

Only Alternative Rivalry
in Building, With Hate,
Ill Will, Disaster,
President Says.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Meeting especially to judge the London naval treaty, the senate heard it advocated today in a message from President Hoover, and adjourned. "This is especially necessary," he wrote, "because of misinformation and misrepresentation which has been widespread by those who in reality are opposed to all limitation and reduction in naval arms."

The president's views commanded senate attention after a vote had shown 58 members, nine more than a quorum to be present.

"If we fall now," Mr. Hoover wrote, "the world will again be plunged backward from its present program toward peace."

Opponents of "Held Power"

Among those who heard were senators who have denounced the treaty as unfair to the United States. All of the known past opponents except Senator Shipstead, farmer-labor, Minnesota, were present. Should they decide to break a quorum at any time it would almost be in their power.

The opposition includes Senators Johnson, California; Hale, Maine; Moses, New Hampshire; Robinson, Indiana; and Oddie, Nevada, all republicans, and McKellar, democrat, Tennessee.

Documents Demanded

As soon as the president's message was read, Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, called up the treaty and went through the formality of having it read. He then moved adjournment until tomorrow when Senator Swanson, democrat, Virginia, will open the debate in behalf of the pact.

Before adjournment was taken, however, Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, an opponent of the pact, led the assault on the treaty by introducing a resolution to have the senate demand of President Hoover documents relating to the preliminary negotiations surrounding the pact. The president declined to give these to the senate foreign relations committee.

Senator Reed replied the whole row over the documents related only to cablegrams exchanged between Ambassador Davies and the state department prior to the London parley. He said those cable-

MOONEY SOON TO KNOW HIS FATE

LOS ANGELES, July 7.—Governor C. C. Young, through his secretary, said today he has reached a decision on the application for a pardon for Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of a part in the preparedness day bombing in San Francisco in 1916.

The governor declined to be interviewed. His secretary explained the governor planned to spend the day in writing his statement which might be released late today, but more probably tomorrow.

The California supreme court last week denied the application for a pardon from Warren Billings, convicted companion of Mooney in the dynamiting. Billings is serving a life sentence in Folsom prison and his only hope of clemency can come from the court, inasmuch as he was a felon before the bombing.

Mooney, serving his first term, a life sentence also, can be pardoned by the governor.

The governor previously has said he would be guided in the Mooney case by the supreme court's action on Billings but has not committed himself since the court decision on the Billings application.

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
