WAR AFTERMATH STILL WORLD'S FOE, ARCHBISHOP SAYS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MOSCOW, July 6.—Pravda yesterday published a long article urging new leaders of the communist party in America to prepare the masses for new and more vigorous battles against "American capitalist imperialists and exploiters." The newspaper quoted Joseph Stalin's declaration that "the communist party in America is one of those few in the world whereupon history imposes problems of decisive importance." Article asserts that stock market crashes, unemployment and the agricultural slump have created fertile ground for revolutionary seeds in the United States. "The possibilities of converting the communist party in America into a powerful massed outpost of 30,000,000 proletarians and an organized army of exploiters and oppressors are dependent upon the activity and energy of the party itself," Pravda asserts. The article asserted that the police activities against the party, the arrest of its leaders, New York Police Commissioner Whalen's charges of plotting and the appointment of the Fish commission for congress investigation, all were intended to strike fear into the hearts of American workers to isolate the communist party from the central committee and ultimately to destroy the party.

RIVERSIDE HAVING BIBLE INSTRUCTION

Daily vacation Bible school at the Riverside school house opened this morning for a two weeks session under the auspices of the local Presbyterian church. The school is open to children of all denominations, hours being from 9:00 to 11:30 every week-day morning except Saturday. Rev. E. Iverson, Presbyterian Sunday school missionary from Medford, is here for a few days assisting in the organization of the school work. James Hendrickson of Grants Pass, a graduate of Albany college, is the superintendent of the vacation school. Several of the young people in the local Presbyterian church are teaching. At the close of the school in Riverside, plans are being made to conduct a similar school in Garden valley for two weeks.

McBRIDE SAYS U. S. BECOMING DRIER

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, July 7.—F. Scott McBride, national superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of America, Washington, D. C., said here today 100 per cent prohibition will come about just the same as 100 per cent observance of the ten commandments. McBride, who arrived in Portland to speak at several churches in this city and in the state, said the nation was becoming drier and drier. The city of Washington, he said, is 75 per cent drier now than it was two years ago. "Chicago is much drier and cleaner now than it was in the old days of the saloon," McBride said. "The modern Chicago gangster and gunman is the last vestige of the liquor ring that controlled Chicago politically for years and years."

POEM FOR THE DAY

By LOUIS ALBERT BANKS THE PURPOSE OF EDUCATION The test of a modern college lies in whether it imparts to its graduates an "unflinching interest in the world of ideas" and a "persistent allegiance to the ideals of mental growth," Dr. James A. Angell, president of Yale university, asserted in the commencement address at Swarthmore college, June 9. "For you and for others coming from colleges with programs resembling that at Swarthmore," Dr. Angell told the graduates, "I believe that the real test will be whether or not, as the years pass, you maintain in full vigor a genuine intellectual curiosity which you insist on satisfying with ever new forays upon the stores of accumulating knowledge. "It is this never ideal of appropriate motivation for a liberal college course which has been tried upon you young people, and we shall learn from you, as time passes, whether we have really discovered a method of releasing in the life of youth a genuine abounding spring of intellectual growth or whether we have simply been the victims of one more educational nostrum. "It is, then, a wholly just proposal to test the modern college by the quality and permanency of the effects it produces upon its graduates."—A news story from Swarthmore, Penn., June 12, 1930.

PRUNE GROWERS TO TALK ON PROBLEMS HERE ON JULY 12

Improvement in quality of dried prunes will be the theme of the meeting of growers called for Roseburg, July 12 to hear the report of the state-wide packer-grower committee. The meeting will be held in the circuit court room of the court house, starting at 8:00 p. m. At the request of the packer-grower committee, selected at a recent meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural society, J. C. Leedy, county agent, is assisting in the arrangements for the Roseburg meeting, and is sending out 500 invitations to the prune growers of Douglas county. The committee is composed of both growers and packers with B. W. Johnson, grower of Monroe, acting as chairman. Other members are F. W. Ariss, secretary of the Northwest Dried Fruit association, Portland; Wm. Wood, Mr. Washington Cooperative Prune association, Vancouver, Wash.; W. G. Fisher, northwest manager, California Packing corp., Salem; A. H. Marsh, grower and president of the Douglas Cooperative Prune association, Lookingglass; Leo Turner, grower, Eugene; Victor Reese, grower and member Springbrook Cooperative Prune Growers, Springbrook; and E. H. Weiland, Horticultural products department, Oregon State college, Corvallis. Other meetings will be held at Vancouver, Wash.; Forest Grove, Newberg and Salem, Oregon. A. H. Marsh will preside at the Roseburg meeting and outline the recommendations of the packer-grower committee relative to the handling of prunes with a view of improving the quality of the dried product. Other numbers on the program are: "Suggestions on improving quality of dried prunes," by Prof. E. H. Weiland, Oregon State college; "Oregon pure food laws as affecting prune growers," J. D. Mickle, state food and dairy commissioner; "Federal food laws as applied to handling prunes," A. W. Hanson, chief in charge Seattle station, food, drug and insecticide administration, U. S. department of agriculture.
