

OREGON FAILS TO REDUCE DEFICIT OF OVER TWO MILLION

New Taxes Merely Offset
Really Cut, Hoss Says;
State Working on
Borrowed Coin.

SALEM, July 6.—As the present biennium upon its last quarter and the next legislature draws near, Sam A. Koser, state budget director, finds that the state's financial condition has not improved since January 1, 1929. The state deficit is more than \$2,000,000. "The financial condition of the state is practically no different at this time than it was at the beginning of the biennium January 1, 1929," Koser's statement said. "It is true the state is receiving moneys from the operation of the intangibles and excise tax laws enacted at the last session of the legislature, but any moneys received therefrom apply to offset the property tax to that extent. Such laws, do not, therefore, produce additional revenue, but operate only to reduce the property tax."

"It is also true that several hundred thousand dollars more than the amount estimated to be received during 1929 and 1930 from inheritance taxes have thus far been paid into the treasury. Any such payments should operate to a reduction of the state's deficit, which, according to the tax levy promulgated by the state tax commission December 1929 aggregated more than \$2,247,000. "If the state wishes to wipe out existing deficit and place itself more nearly upon a cash basis in the near future and at the same time provide for the necessary institutional structures as need for them shall arise and as well provide for the usual and ordinary operations for all its various activities, it is imperative that some early action be taken looking to a financial program which shall be sufficient to cover the usual operating expenses and needed outlays from time to time. Deferring action will not in any measure tend to improve the situation. Dilatoriness will only tend to aggravate it and increase the obligation."

"The state by reason of the present deficit in its funds to meet authorized obligations, is now paying interest upon moneys borrowed from other funds or from outside sources."

WASHINGTON EVEN WITH ATHLETICS FOR LEAGUE LEAD

New Players Add Batting
Strength to Senators;
Boone Makes Great
Brooklyn Debut.

A large part of the first half of the major league baseball season has been spent in strenuous efforts on the parts of various managers to strengthen their clubs for the latter part of the year and the success of their efforts is quite evident in the current standings of the clubs.

Washington's big deals with the St. Louis Browns and Chicago White Sox turned out to be an important factor in making the American league campaign a duel between the Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics. The acquisition of Heinie Manush gave them some batting punch where it was needed while Al Crowder has turned out to be an effective pitcher in Washington. Art Shires and Dave Harris, formerly of Chicago and Portland, Ore., also have helped improve the Senators' batting average.

Leaders in Tie
The result is that the Senators and the Athletics today are tied for the league lead. It was Shires who brought about the tie, coming through with a pinch single with the bases full in the tenth inning to beat the New York Yankees, 3 to 2.

Washington now has won 15 of 16 games, shoving the Yanks 54 games into third place by sweep the series. And by pitching all of yesterday's game Dimp Hadley made it 14 out of 16 pitchers who have finished the games they started.

The Athletics kept their place in the sun by winning their third close decision in a row from the Boston Red Sox, 4 to 3. George Earnshaw scored his eleventh victory of the year, gaining a slight edge over Dan MacFayden.

Cleveland Indians, with Clint Brown on the mound, shut out the St. Louis Browns, 7 to 0. Waite Hoyt also pitched well and led Detroit to a 5 to 2 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Boone Makes Fine Debut
The Brooklyn Robins, who chose to add strength to their team by obtaining the Boone from the Pacific Coast league, found good reason to be pleased with their new acquisition. Boone made his debut yesterday and played the principal role as the Robins regained first place in the National league by beating the Boston Braves, 1 to 4. He hit a home run and a single and made a great catch of a fly, diving into the bleachers to grab the ball.

Cincinnati took both games of a double header from Chicago by scores of 5 to 4 and 8 to 7, breaking a losing streak of five games.

The third place struggle between the New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals remained unchanged as both teams won double headers. The Giants trounced Philadelphia, 10 to 8 and 6 to 3, as the Cardinals hit 12 victories in their last 16 games by winning a 2-1 decision over Pittsburgh in the first game, although they made only two hits off Spencer and following it up with a 12 to 4 victory in a slugging match. Douthitt's ninth-inning home run won the first game after Spencer's wild pitch had provided the other Cardinal run.

Salem Plans Curb
ON FIREWORKS USE

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—The reckless shooting of fireworks and torpedoes on July 4, particularly by grown men in the central business district, has caused talk of a city ordinance to prohibit them entirely.

The most serious offenses appear to have been on State street, where groups of men are accustomed to gather every Fourth of July and shoot fireworks unrestricted. Not satisfied with tossing them into the street, the merry-makers exploded torpedoes against plate glass windows, the fronts, and automobiles and threw firecrackers at pedestrians.

One observer saw a torpedo, thrown from the sidewalk, explode against the windshield inside of an automobile, almost causing a wreck in the street. Great damage was done to several store fronts on the street.

DOCTORS TELL MAX TO TAKE LONG REST

BERLIN, July 7.—Max Schmeling, German heavyweight who won the world's championship from Jack Sharkey on a foot last month, today was ordered by physicians to rest two or three months, before resuming training.

The report of the physician, submitted to the German boxing commission, stated that Schmeling was suffering from varicose of the

right side as a result of the foul. According to the physician Schmeling's injury is of such a nature that sporting authorities who read the report interpreted it to mean there would be no participation by the German fighter in a championship contest possibly until 1931, if then.

AL LASSMAN DIES ON CANOE JAUNT

MARIUSON, Me., July 7.—Al Lassman, former star tackle on the New York university football team, was drowned in Long lake yesterday. The body was recovered early this morning after several hours of grappling.

Lassman, who was 24 years old, was a guest at a boys' camp, where he had served as counselor two years ago. Yesterday afternoon he went out on the lake in a canoe alone.

A few hours later the canoe was brought to camp by persons who had found it unoccupied.

SUNDAY AIRPLANE ACCIDENTS IN U. S. TAKE NINE LIVES

Nine lives were lost in the nation's Sunday airplane accidents. Six persons were killed in the middlewest, two in New York and one in California. Of these, three died when planes plunged into water and another dropped to death attempting to rescue a society

parachute from a dangling, tangled parachute.

At Ruthven, Iowa, a plane banked preparatory to landing and crashed from a 50-foot altitude. Kenneth Wilson, 20, the pilot, Sioux City, Iowa, was killed instantly. Vera Hughes, 17, Ruthven, a passenger and Ernest Southworth, 24, mechanic, Sioux City, were fatally injured.

One Sacrifice Useless
Making her first leap, Mary Fahney, 18-year-old society girl in Oak Park, a Chicago suburb, caught her parachute in the plane and dangled 1,000 feet in the air for nearly two hours.

After one ship unsuccessfully tried to lower a rope ladder, Bruno Schustek, professional parachutist, jumped, shinned down a 75-foot knotted rope from another plane. Just as he reached Miss Fahney, her parachute became disintegrated and she floated to a perfect landing.

Hundreds below watched Schustek try to climb up the knotted rope. They saw him slip slowly, then drop to his death. Friends said he had apparently exhausted his strength and collapsed.

Blazing an air route from Chicago to Mackinac Island, Mich., for the Continental Airways, Inc., Bert E. Kogie, 28, and Duane L. Heller, 26, both of Chicago, were drowned in Lake Michigan when their cabin aquaplane plunged into the water south of South Haven, Mich.

Stunter Loses Life
Dick Dadds, of Santa Anna, Cal., manager of the aviation department of the Union Oil Co., was stunting above the Sunday crowds at Laguna Beach, Cal., when his plane lost altitude in a sidestep, failed to right itself and dived into Crescent bay.

Fishing boats and pleasure craft dragged the twisted wreckage ashore. Dadds' body was in the cockpit.

Martin Wilska, 19, a student pilot, and John W. Gorman, 19, his instructor, were killed at Floyd Bennett field, on Barren Island, New York.

Witnesses said the two men, both of New York, were flying at a low altitude when their monoplane went into a flat spin and crashed. Wilska was at the controls.

Two brothers, Guy and Harry Coffin, of Estherville, Iowa, were injured, the latter seriously, when their plane hit a telephone wire on landing at Clarion, Iowa.
