DOUGLAS LOCALE SOUGHT FOR FILM OF OREGON TRAIL

Search for a suitable location for the filming of a new episode in the coming Fox super film "Oregon Trail," now in the process of making, is being conducted in the county by Ben Wurtzel and Leo Shaw, who state that a used of nearly 200 persons will be cast, and more than \$30,000 expended locally, in the event a site can be found in this vicinity. Photographs were made this morning of a spot in Camas valley, deemed to be satisfactory for the purpose, and if the site is approved the company will take immediate steps to prepare for the coming of the cast. Locations have been used in Montana and Wyoming and the Oregon location must be ready within the next ten days, or two weeks, as it is planned to have the troupe here by that time. At the present time the Camas Valley site is the most favored, but in the event a more satisfactory place can be found, it will be used. READJUST WHEAT CROPS, CUT COSTS. FARMERS ADVISED

HASTINGS, Neb., July 8.—The government's two chief agricultural spokesmen, Secretary Arthur M. Hyde and the department of agriculture and Chairman Alexander Legge and the federal farm board, Monday carried their campaign for wheat acreage reduction to producers of the hard winter variety of the grain. Accompanied by a small group of department of agriculture economists and extension workers, the secretary of the farm board head set out on a swing through the heart of the hard wheat belt which will take them into five states for half a dozen meetings with growers. Hyde is urging on growers his theory, which is, extensive adjustment in wheat acreage and substantial reduction in production cost must be made if wheat production is to be profitable to growers generally in the next six to ten years. Harold Hedges of the University of Nebraska rural economics department, in talking with Hyde and Legge, predicted if the present low price of wheat continued "the tendency will be for southeastern Nebraska farmers to turn to other crops, for central Nebraska farmers to cut down wheat acreage a little, and for western Nebraska farmers to continue to grow wheat on about the same basis as at the present time." Hyde's quoted figures show it cost approximately \$10 an acre to grow wheat in southeastern Nebraska in the last three years. With wheat at 75 cents a bushel, he said, Cass county farmers would get four cents an hour for labor. Larger fields and bigger machinery make it possible to produce wheat in western Nebraska for about half the cost per acre which would return 65 cents an hour for labor.

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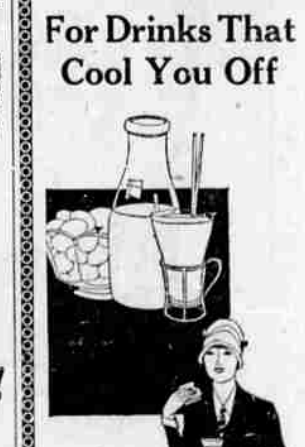
