RED CROSS SWIM SCHOOL INSTRUCTS SCORES OF PUPILS

The Red Cross swimming school, which closed last Saturday, was one of the best ever held in this city from every standpoint. There were 250 persons enrolled in the school, with an average daily attendance of 125. The school was conducted by John Eberhart, instructor at the University of Oregon, who was assisted by several local young men, who are expert swimmers.

Six boys, 25 girls and five adults passed the test for beginners. These persons were unable to swim in any fashion when the school opened, and all were able to swim at least 50 feet when the school closed, and some were able to swim for considerable distance. There were thirteen who passed the swimmers' test, which required swimming 100 yards using two different strokes; 50 feet swimming on the back using legs only; float; surface dive in six or eight feet of water, recovering object on bot-

tom; plain front dive, racing dive, and witnessing demonstration on artificial respiration. Those who qualified in this class were: Mary French, Margaret French, Ralph Leedy, John McCabe, Dick Harding, Gertrude Adams, Mary Dusenbury, Delmer McMullin, Clarence Richards, Elmore Fies, Lee Wells, Clarence Shirley and Alois Crenson.

Of particular importance was the large class that qualified for the junior life saving test. This is the branch where training is given that may result in the saving of lives, and it was extremely gratifying to those in charge of the school to find so much interest shown in the junior life saving work, with a class of 20 successful students.

The swimmers passing this test were required to dive into deep water and swim 100 yards. They had to make three dives into water more than 6 feet deep and recover objects from the bottom. They had to show a correct approach of a supposedly drowning person and demonstrate different types of carry, towing the body for a distance of 20 feet. Head carry, half carrying, tired swimmer's carry, etc., were used. They were also required to break various holds such as the double grip on one wrist, front strangle holds, back strangle holds, etc. They were also required to demonstrate the prone pressure method of resuscitation.

ANGELS SEEM SURE TO WIN 1ST HALF SERIES PENNANT

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ANOTHER CHICAGO REPORTER MARKED FOR GANG VIOLENCE

In Hospital With Bodyguard
After Clash on Highway;
Scribes Alleged to
Be in Rackets.

CHICAGO, July 8.—Leland H. Reese, crime reporter for the Chicago Daily News, yesterday asserted in a signed story dispatched from Dekalb, Ill., to his paper, an automobile in which he was driving Friday night with a bodyguard was sideswiped and crowded from the road deliberately by another car which followed for ten miles. He said he had been warned of violence.

Reese and two companions, Ed Braun and Allen Finlay, were in Glidden Memorial hospital at Dekalb, with bruises and cuts, and Braun and Finlay suffered broken ribs as well.

Warnings Cited
In his dispatch he referred to an article published July 2 in the St. Louis Star, which said a reporter for the Chicago Daily News was soon "to get his."

"I was told by numerous persons that I was the reporter, and because of previous warnings given me I thought it probable that I was meant," Reese wrote.

"But further, on Thursday, July 3, I received a really definite message that I was to be attacked and beaten, if not killed. This tip did not come by anonymous letter, as do most of the threats received in newspaper offices. Nor did it emanate, as do most of these threats, from the usual gangland sources. It suggested an attack from quite another source."

He also had been warned, he said, after the killing of Julius Rosenberg, an underworld tipster said to have been used by Reese, and again after the killing of Alford Lingle, Tribune reporter.

"This," he explained, "is why I have been accompanied night and day by Allen Finlay, who was engaged for that purpose by the Daily News. Finlay bore a commission as special policeman and was licensed to carry a revolver."

The author of the St. Louis Star article to which Reese referred, Harry Drundie, will be summoned to Chicago to be questioned by an impartial board concerning his stories of racketeering. State's Attorney John A. Swanson announced today.

Suspect Under Arrest
Patry Tardi, west side hoodlum who tallies in some respects with the description of Lingle's slayer, was apprehended by police today and held incommunicado for examination.

Witnesses have said the killer of Lingle was a blond, and a silk glove he is said to have discarded in flight was for the left hand. Tardi is a left handed blond.

Col. Robert P. McCormick, publisher of the Tribune, took cognizance yesterday of the rumors reflecting upon newspapermen generally when, in a letter to State's Attorney John A. Swanson, he suggested a thorough investigation.

Col. McCormick called attention in his letter to a series of newspaper articles published in the St. Louis Star and reprinted in Chicago by the Tribune. The articles were written by Harry T. Drundie, a reporter for the Star, and made general charges that Lingle was not the only Chicago newspaperman making money out of a "racket."

"The revelations of the last few weeks have been distressing to many of us," said Col. McCormick's letter to the state's attorney.

"We wish the matter exposed had never occurred. We tend to wish that skilled linen be not washed in public, but out of so much evil a greater good may come."

PRESIDENT SIGNS BILL MERGING ALL VETS' BUREAUS

WASHINGTON, July 8.—President Hoover yesterday signed a bill which authorizes him to consolidate all governmental activities affecting war veterans under the veterans' bureau.

The measure authorizes the president to consolidate and coordinate the veterans and pensions bureaus and the national home for disabled volunteer soldiers under an agency to be known as "administration of veterans' affairs."

The legislation was recommended to congress by Mr. Hoover in his annual message.

Under the present system, the pensions bureau is operated by the interior department, the soldiers home by the war department and World War veterans activities by the veterans' bureau, an independent agency.

SONNENBERG AND LEWIS WRESTLE TO DRAW IN 6TH BOUT

SEATTLE, July 8.—Thanks to his flying tackle, Gus Sonnenberg is still the popularly recognized world's heavyweight wrestling champion.

In his sixth match with Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former title holder, Sonnenberg wrestled to a draw outdoors here last night before 10,000 fans who paid nearly \$22,000 to witness the bout.

Lewis scored the first fall with his famous headlock in the fourth round but he lost his advantage when the former Dartmouth football player caught him with a flying tackle in the seventh. It was the only tackle that Sonnenberg was able to connect with but it was enough to even up the count.

In the eighth and final round

Sonnenberg attempted several tactics and once landed on the laps of several fans in the second row when Lewis sidestepped a head on charge. The former title holder was on top of Gus applying a headlock as the final gong sounded at midnight.

John Freberg, Chicago heavyweight scored a one fall decision over Hans Bauer, Germany, in the semi-final. Freberg downed Bauer with a body slam in the fourth round.

Charles Hansen, Seattle, conquered Abe Colman, New York heavyweight, with a body slam in the fourth and Bob Meyer, Portland light heavyweight, defeated Des Anderson, Salem, Ore., with a body slam in the third.

KLAMATH FALLS '49 SHOW FILLS CITY JAIL WITH DRUNKS

PORTLAND, July 8.—Too much realistic local color was the way federal authorities described today a raid on the "Last Chance Saloon," a '49 production at the Klamath Falls Fourth of July celebration, where J. Flynn, Art McKee and George Rice were arrested on liquor charges.

Complaints were filed against the three men at Klamath Falls. Three gallons of liquor and a truck belonging to Flynn were seized.

Field Chief Shirley of the state prohibition forces, said the celebration was the scene of the most flagrant violations ever witnessed by him personally. Shirley said he and his squad arrived at the Forty Niner village and that his men commented on the number of intoxicated men and women.

Shirley said the city jail, built to accommodate 12 prisoners, held 50 before the night was well along.

At the "Last Chance," Shirley said they found punch being served over the bar, but also noticed the back room was doing a thriving business. Customers who passed into the back room, Shirley said, were first passed on by the man at the door.

Shirley said he and his squad took possession of the "Last Chance" after they watched a man enter with a bundle under his arm. The bundle, Shirley said, proved to be liquor.

FISHER BODY FIRM WINNER IN STRIKE

FLINT, Mich., July 8.—Operations were resumed in the number 1 plant of the Fisher Body corporation here yesterday as state and local police patrolled the streets adjoining the factory and dispersed groups of striking workers.

Although leaders of the striking workmen had announced plans to prevent the resumption of operations in the factory, police experienced no difficulty in breaking up the gatherings.

Officials of the factory declined to reveal the number of men at work but the police estimated that between 50 and 60 per cent of the normal force of 5,000 men passed through the gates in the morning.

GYPSY WOMEN GET \$3,125 FROM SUCKER
