**NEW COOS BAY TUG
ON MAIDEN TRIP**

BANDON, July 9.—The C. M. Brown, powered with a six-cylinder direct reversing Diesel motor and the most powerful tugboat on Coos Bay, arrived in Marshfield from Prosper on the Coquille river on her maiden voyage. The new tug was built by Herman Brothers for the Coos Bay Dredging company.

She made the voyage from the Bandon bar to the Coos-bar in two hours with Captain Carl Christensen, Bandon, bar pilot, at the wheel, averaging seven knots an hour through heavy seas and performing perfectly. She carried with her a party of 22 people, including officials of the dredging company, August Herman one of the builders, and Captain Lloyd Cutler, who will have charge of the tug on its regular run.

The craft will be used to tow howl barges for the Mountain States Power company and for relief work in shipping on the bay.

ARGUMENT BACKING CABINET FORM OF GOVERNMENT FILED

SALEM, Ore., July 9.—Affirmative argument for the state government consolidation bill, to be voted on by the people in November or state yesterday by Senator Ed W. Miller of Grants Pass and Representative Hector MacPherson of Albany. It will be printed in the Voters' Pamphlet.

The bill, which was passed by the legislature and referred to the people proposes a cabinet form of government of nine departments.

"In Oregon," says the argument, "we have 74 different officers boards and commissions, 17 large state institutions and 15 private institutions receiving state aid—a total of 107 agencies doing our state work. The payroll carries over 4000 names with almost \$550,000 outlay per month in wages and salaries or over \$7,500,000 a year. There is no general supervision, no adequate system of reports and accounts and not even a common fiscal year."

It is declared that the cabinet plan is a proved success in Europe, in the United States government, over 400 American cities and
