KANSAS GOVERNOR ASKS BAN ON FARM OUTFIT EXPORTS

HAYS, Kans., July 9.—Differing sharply with the policy of wheat acreage reduction advocated by Chairman Legge of the federal farm board and Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, Gov. Clyde M. Reed of Kansas, in an address prepared for delivery, declared American agriculture has been asked "to de-

finately and permanently subordinate itself to industry."

Speaking on the same program with Legge and Hyde, who are making a tour of five of the mid-western wheat producing states, Governor Reed suggested in place of a wheat acreage reduction, a curtailment of "the manufacturing of agricultural implements so as to limit the output to domestic requirements," thus eliminating the exportation of this machinery to other countries "for the purpose of enabling them to produce more wheat at a lower cost so as to be better able to compete in the world market with the American wheat farmer."

"The United States," Governor Reed said in his prepared address, "produces a surplus of wheat and a surplus of agricultural implements. About 20 to 25 per cent of the total volume of production in each is exported. * * * Has there been any suggestion of curtailment of the manufacturing of agricultural implements? * * *
