GRAIN CROPS HURT, FARM WORK HALTS

Miles City, Montana, 108,
Region's Hottest Spot;
South Also Hit by
Scorching Wave.

Chicago Beaches Thronged
With Relief Seekers;

CHICAGO, July 10.—Middle America writhes under a merciless sun.
Twenty have died. The grain fields—save for corn—suffer. Farm work falters, the baking sun a cheerless to man and beast.
There were temperatures of 100 degrees or hotter as far north as Montana and North Dakota and south to Louisiana and Alabama.

The hottest spot officially was Miles City, Mont., with 108 degrees. Huron, S. D., had a reading of 102, while the Fahrenheit heat went also to three figures in Omaha, Kansas City, Sioux City, Ia., St. Louis, Mo., Evansville, Ind., Nashville, Tenn., Shreveport, La., Emporia, Kan., Birmingham, Ala., and numerous other places.

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WHEAT SHORTAGE STRIKES PORTUGAL

LISBON, Portugal, July 10.—Because of a shortage of wheat, the national association of millers today suspended work. No fear of a bread famine was felt, however, since army stocks are sufficient to keep up the daily supply without resort being made to a ration system until the government is able to modify the law concerning the import of foreign wheat.

The public has been advised not to waste bread and the minister of agriculture has ordered all wheat merchants to declare their stocks so the government may be able to fix the quantity to be imported above the legal quota.

Alarming reports reached Lisbon from certain parts of the interior where there is a serious corn shortage.

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

THUMBS CUFFS FAIL TO HOLD SLIPPERY CAPTIVE

THE DALLIES, July 10.—Aurthurites today searched for an unidentified transient wearing a pair of thumb cuffs City Patrolman Dunsmore clamped on him.

The transient is alleged to have attempted to sell alcohol to Indians and was caught. He escaped after the thumb cuffs were placed on him.

PORTLAND C. OF C. ACTS TO BAR IMPORTED LUMBER

PORTLAND, July 10.—L. C. Newlands, chamber of commerce president, was authorized today to appoint a committee to study a provision in the current tariff bill to bar from import products of forced or convict labor to ascertain the probable effect upon the Pacific northwest's lumber industry.

Newlands said the provision will not become effective until 1932. Among other commodities barred will be spruce and fir lumber from Russian and Siberian forests, taken from the forests by convict labor.

NORBLAD ASKS ACTION ON JOB OF STATE LIBRARIAN

SALEM, Ore., July 10.—Governor Norblad today wrote W. Lair Thompson of Portland, chairman of a committee of the state library board appointed to receive applications and report on candidates for the position of state librarian, asking him to expedite the report and suggest a time for the board to meet and make the selection. A librarian is to be selected to succeed the late Virginia Clever Bacon. Other members of the committee are President Arnold Bennett Hall of the University of Oregon, and C. A. Howard, state school superintendent.

NORBLAD CANCELS PAROLE OF INVETERATE FORGER

SALEM, Ore., July 10.—Governor Norblad today revoked the parole of Glen Barnes, who was sent to the state penitentiary from Walla Walla county in April, 1926, to serve five years for forgery, but released on parole in December, 1927. Barnes has violated his parole, the governor said, by passing bad checks at Eugene where he is under arrest.

INTERRUPTED INTRUDER FIGHTS WITH PENKNIFE

PORTLAND, July 10.—Oscar Clancy, apartment house dweller, was struck in the nose and stabbed with a penknife in his chest by a prowler early today.

Clancy said he awakened and found the man ransacking a bureau. Clancy grappled with the intruder who struck him and stabbed him.

Physicians said the wound was superficial.

SANE WOMAN HAS TROUBLE KEEPING OUT OF ASYLUM

SALEM, Ore., July 10.—When Mrs. Edward Click was passing the state hospital for the insane yesterday an attendant mistook her for a patient and undertook to lock her up. She was being taken to the hospital office when another employee recognized her and she was released. It developed that she was the wife of the hospital baker.

The attendant who committed the error was newly employed at the hospital. Mrs. Click had been picking berries in a nearby field as had also a group of patients, which was said to account for the mistake.

Five Prominent Missourians Die In Plane Crash

ARKANSAS PASS, Texas, July 10.—Five men, from Kansas City, Mo., were killed when an airplane crashed four miles from here today. The dead: Murat Boyle, Raymond Watson, Eugene Lynn, Roy Dellano and Gene Gabbert. Gabbert was piloting the plane. The party was here on a fishing trip.

KANSAS CITY, July 10.—Murat Boyle, killed when an airplane crashed near Arkansas Pass, Texas today, was president of the Missouri State Bar association and a member of the firm of Hogsett and Boyle, insurance attorneys.

The others killed were also prominent. Raymond Watson, attorney, was the son of I. W. Watson, of the law firm of Watson, Gage and Hess.

Roy C. Dellano was a prominent realtor of Kansas City. Gabbert was a flyer.

Eugene M. Lynn was an accountant, president of the Kansas City Golf association and club champion at Mission Hills here.

LOST BOY FOUND NEAR VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 10.—Timothy, a boy, was found after a night out in the hills contrary to military orders. George T. Stach, 17, of Portland, was found today near the rifle range, 16 miles from here, by fellow members of the citizens military training camp. About 700 students and enlisted men from Vancouver barracks and several army planes carried on a search for him after he failed to return from Livingston mountain last night.

All planes at the military field here were ordered to aid in the search and four were scouting over the mountain region early today. Young Stach left the rifle range, about 16 miles north of here yesterday with two other students to climb the mountain before they were required to be back at the camp for dinner. The other two youths finally turned back in order to be at the camp in time for roll call, but Stach insisted upon going alone.

When he failed to return late last night hundreds of the students were organized in a searching party. Although they spent hours beating over the mountain area they returned at dawn without having found a trace of the missing student.

Stach was one of the several hundred Oregon and southwest Washington students in encampment here.

ROSEBURG MAY GET ON AIR MAIL ROUTE

PORTLAND, July 10.—Information was received today Senator McNary had discussed with post-office department officials, Washington, D. C., the proposed extension of the air mail service down southern Oregon to Grants Pass.

McNary urged consideration be given the project of C. C. Coleman, Portland, for a short line mail route connecting valley cities.

McNary was told under the new air mail act which he helped draft it would be necessary first to ascertain whether the Pacific Air transport, which has the mail contract between Los Angeles and Seattle, is interested in establishing a branch line into the Willamette region.

McNary said there is a possibility service might be established even if the Pacific Air transport is not interested and Coleman will return to Portland to discuss the situation with company officials.

DEAN CONVICTED OF BANKRUPTCY FRAUD

PORTLAND, July 10.—Dr. C. J. Dean, operator of clinics in Portland, San Francisco and Los Angeles, was convicted today of violating the national bankruptcy act. Defense counsel was given 30 days to file a motion for a new trial.

The chain physician was charged with assigning mortgage to his father's investment company to escape including it in a bankruptcy petition Dean filed.

NO END NEAR OF WARFARE ON GASOLINE

5-Cent California Minimum
Registered at Fresno;
Tacoma Price May
Drop to 3 Cents.

Several Service Stations
in Los Angeles Closed;
Commerce Chamber
Acts for Peace.

Gasoline reductions throughout the state have so far failed to affect prices at local filling stations. Operators of Roseburg service stations stated they have as yet received no instructions to reduce prices, and gasoline is still selling at 2 1/2 cents with a few stations dispensing gas at 21 cents, the prices that have prevailed for several weeks. Changes will be made, the operators report, as soon as orders are received.

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—With retail gasoline prices down to as low as 9 cents per gallon including the state's three cent tax, small service station operators in Los Angeles today were feeling the pinch of narrowing profits as producing companies continued announcing policies of "meeting competition."

Several small service stations were closed yesterday.

There was little indication as to the future course of the gas war. John C. Austin, president of the chamber of commerce, announced he would call a conference of oil company executives. If the situation had not cleared in 48 hours, in an effort to end the price slashing.

The prices generally posted were 10 1/2 to 12 1/2 cents a gallon for gas sold by major producing companies. Some "bootleg" gas retailed at 8 1/2 cents. Several independent companies continued to post "meeting competition" prices.

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LIQUOR RUNNERS SHOOT POLICEMAN

CHICAGO, July 10.—Two motorcycle policemen and two run-runners with an automobile load of alcohol engaged in a spectacular running fight along 22 miles of state highway between Joliet and Aurora, suburban cities, early today. The affray ended on the outskirts of Aurora with the perhaps fatal wounding of one of the officers, Henry Schelling.

Officer William Burke stopped and al Schelling and the run-runners escaped. The officers confiscated the bootleggers' sedan and intoxicants.

The shooting started on the outskirts of Joliet when the pair in the sedan opened fire on the officers without warning. The motorcycle policemen returned the fire and the battle continued as the sedan and cycles sped up to 88 miles an hour at times. One shot from the patrolmen pierced a tire of the sedan on the outskirts of Aurora and the runners left their machine. They continued the attack foot, but fled when Schelling fell with bullet wounds in the neck and shoulder.

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MINE EXPLOSION'S TOLL GOES TO 144

Out of 193 Men in German Colliery
Only 56 Escape and They Are
Severely Injured

NEURODE, Germany, July 10.—At least 144 persons lost their lives yesterday in an explosion at the Wencelaus coal mine. Eighty-one bodies have been recovered, most of them burned badly. No hope is held for those remaining in the shaft.

Of 193 miners in the shaft at the time of the explosion only 56 escaped and they were badly injured.

The explosion in the mine occurred when a large gas pocket was suddenly tapped during blasting late yesterday. The fumes spread through the shafts so quickly that there was little chance for anyone to escape.

Rescue work proved increasingly hazardous and finally was abandoned at about midnight after a number of the crew, flitted with gas masks, had been overcome or injured.

It was possible to save only 49 persons of the 193 in the mine before breaking off the rescue work. All of these, although badly burned, are expected to recover.

It was by far the greatest mine disaster Germany has known in years. In 1912 117 died in the Bochum mine disaster, and in 1925 the death toll in the Dortmund mine reached 135.

Three years ago a similar explosion in the Wencelaus mine took seven lives. That explosion earned the shaft a reputation as "unlucky" among the miners of Silesia.

CALIFORNIA GRAPE AREA MOB-RIDDEN

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—California's \$400,000,000 grape industry faced a crisis today as the campaign to sign up 85 per cent of the growers in a farm board relief program tottered on the verge of failure and night riders moved through one vineyard area terrifying non-signers.

The Fresno county sheriff's office responded to two calls early today from grape growers asking protection from mobs attempting to force their signatures to federal grape control board contracts.

As far as could be learned, there were no physical encounters.

The drive to sign up 70 per cent of the more than 500,000 acres of vineyards in California fell short of its quota by about 80,000 acres last night. Farm board officials had stipulated that 70 per cent of the acreage be signed by then. The plan was not to become effective unless 85 per cent of the acreage were signed five days hence.

The farm board program in the event of an 85 per cent sign-up calls for a loan of \$20,000,000 to a cooperative designed to handle this year's surplus, estimated at 300,000 tons or more. Signers must pay the cooperative \$150 on fresh grapes and \$450 on raisins on every ton marketed, the proceeds to be used to buy up the surplus and make it into by-products.

HUSTON NOT TO QUIT JOB, HE DECLARES

G. O. P. Committee Leader
Still Resists Demand
From Congressmen
That He Resign.

Showdown Expected This
Afternoon at Meeting;
Fess Slated for
Chairmanship.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The republican conference slated to deal with the bitter business of what to do about Claudius Huston's refusal to resign the party chairmanship deferred that problem at this morning's session.

Attention was confined to routine business, but a later meeting today was expected to result in a showdown between the Tennessee and the leaders who want him to get out. The eighty officers and party workers who assembled were said to be almost unanimous against his continuance as chairman.

President Hoover consulted with two of them both before and after the gathering at headquarters. They were James Francis Burke, counsel of the national committee, and Joseph R. Nutt, its treasurer.

Huston Won't Quit
Smiling after the morning's conference, which was called by him to discuss plans for the fall campaign, Mr. Huston received newspapermen in his office. He said: "I will have a statement to make late today. The statements attributed to me in the morning papers are correct."

The statements referred to were repetitions of his determination not to resign, despite calls for such action from republican leaders.

EARL CARROLL AND LAW CLASH AGAIN

NEW YORK, July 10.—Through a cluster of 200 persons who gathered on the sidewalks, Earl Carroll, Broadway producer, made his way into Jefferson market court today with eight dancers and show girls from his newest review and again gave himself up to the law.

A warrant for Carroll, who landed in Atlanta prison because of his denial of his famous bath tub party four years ago, was issued yesterday after police had raided his "Vanities."

Carroll's appearance today was brief. A few minutes after he and his show girls entered the courtroom the trial was adjourned until tomorrow so his attorney might familiarize himself with the case.

Among those who appeared with him at Jefferson market today was Faith Bacon, whose dance, in an attire of two ostrich fans, the police considered indecent. The show girls under arrest appeared in a tableau scene in which they represented wax figures coming to life.

Those arrested were released in \$500 bail and were back in their places for the evening performance from which the show window scene was deleted.

STRIKERS IN BUTTE FACE FIRM MAYOR

BUTTE, Mont., July 10.—Mayor M. Kerr Beadle has taken a hand in the Butte labor strike. He added a dozen policemen to his force and mounted a truck to insure safe delivery of its load.

The mayor's steps supplemented those taken by Sheriff Angus McLeod, and the employers' association to protest non-union teamsters and auto mechanics replacing strikers.

The only serious trouble yesterday was a pummeling administered to two special sheriff's deputies, attacked as they were about to enter a hotel.

Police broke up, without serious difficulty, a gathering on a street corner. The crowd was assembled for a speech.

Business agents of the striking unions were called in by the mayor and notified breaches of the peace will not be tolerated.

CLAUDIUS HUSTON

Repeatedly requested to resign as chairman of the national republican committee, Claudius Huston declared at a meeting of the party heads in Washington today that he intended to stick to the job. Final action on the matter is expected before the committee adjourns.

Entrusted with money to aid projected improvement of the Tennessee river, Huston is accused of devoting the funds to other purposes.

A close personal friend of President Hoover, Huston is credited with doing much toward swinging southern votes to the executive in the last national campaign. Hoover thus far has proved adamant to the demands of party leaders that he request Huston to step down.

BLACK GOLD STAR MOTHERS COMPLAIN

NEW YORK, July 10.—The New York World today says that fifty-five negro gold star mothers who were to sail for France on Saturday have cancelled their reservations and have sent a protest to President Hoover alleging discrimination.

The letter to the president, signed by the 55 women, protests the segregation of the negro women, contending they should be sent to France on the basis of geographic location with the white mothers.

The first contingent of negro women sailing Saturday on the American Merchant is said by the World now to total only sixty-one, although originally 450 of the 800 mothers eligible had planned to go.
