

OREGON CROPS AND LIVESTOCK SHOWN IN GOOD CONDITION

PORTLAND, July 9.—The United States department of agriculture, weather bureau, issued today its crop and weather report for the week ending July 5.

"Cereals: Harvest of winter wheat and oats has begun in Jackson county, and will begin in parts of Umatilla and Morrow counties this week; by the 15th of July it should be general over the warmer wheat districts. In some of the central counties wheat shows considerable effect of drought and some frost damage, but elsewhere it seems to be filling well. Corn is improving.

"Fruits: Picking of cherries is nearly complete in some of the earlier districts and is progressing in the Willamette valley; in the latter section there has been much cracking. Apples are in market in the south. Fall fruits are sizing well.

"Meadows, pastures and rangeland: Harvest of the second crop of alfalfa is under way in southern counties, while in some of the elevated districts the first cutting is in progress. Cutting of clover and vetch is well advanced. Drought has seriously affected wild meadows in some central and eastern counties. Domestic pastures in the Willamette valley and coast counties are still good, and there is generally abundant feed on mountain ranges.

"Livestock: Shipping of lambs is proceeding rather slowly. Stock is generally in good condition.

"Miscellaneous: Shipping pens are under way, and shipping of new potatoes will begin in the Hermiston section this week. Melons are growing well. Tomatoes are ripening in quantities in some of the warmer localities. Flax is in bloom and looks well. Peppermint is promising."

SENATE ORDERS HOOVER TO TURN OVER DOCUMENTS

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The senate today adopted a modified resolution requesting President Hoover to turn over to the senate all letters and cables exchanged among the powers prior to the London parity.

The vote was 53 to 4, those voting against being Senators Black, Copeland, George and Harris, all democrats.

Before adoption, the senate had amended the resolution to make it a request for the papers if their transmission to the senate was not incompatible to the public interest.

HIRAM JOHNSON RAPS WITHHOLDING OF TREATY PAPERS

WASHINGTON, July 10.—With a vote in prospect before adjournment, the senate argued for the third day over the proposal requesting from President Hoover the diplomatic documents exchanged prior to the London naval parity.

Again, a bare majority of 49 answered the roll call.

Senator Johnson, republican, California, a treaty opponent, upheld the McKellar resolution seeking the papers. He refused to accept the statements of Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, a delegate to London, and others that the letters and cables were incommunicado and amusing.

"I am perfectly willing to concede," the Californian said, "that the papers may have contained a comic strip and be so exasperatingly funny as to convulse us all, and may contain personal references from perhaps a peppery ambassador from the United States that would cause a worldwide explosion."

There have been intimations the papers have been withheld because of manners of expression employed by Ambassador Davies in communications with the state department.

Johnson also contended the senate should know what took place at the conference between Prime Minister MacDonald and President Hoover on the Rapidan about a year ago. He said it was obvious that "some kind of an agreement was made between the prime minister and the president."

JONES TIES WITH COX ON 1ST ROUND OF GOLF TOURNEY

INTERLACHEN, CLUB, Minneapolis, July 10.—Bobby Jones, the defending champion, was tied for the lead in the first round of the United States open golf tournament today by the Brooklyn sharpshooter, Wilfred (Whiffey) Cox. Each had the same score of 34-37-71, one under par, and a one stroke lead for the time being over the rest of the field.

With the halfway mark reached, attacks on the mark set up by Jones were falling considerably short.

Two other amateurs, George Von Elm and the British star, Cyril Tolley, each required 80 and were out of the running at the start. It was one of the poorest exhibitions Von Elm had given in the open championship as he needed 45 for the homeward nine.

Among those at 73, two strokes behind Jones, were Eddie Williams of Cleveland, Irving Ottman of Louisville, and Jack Forrest of New York, all in the "dark horse" class. At 74, were Johnny Golden, Jack Burke, and Willie MacFarlane. Wild Bill Hehlhorn had a 75.

Don Moe, western amateur champion, after a sub-par 35 on the outward journey, took 40 to return but was well up in the list with 75.

TACOMA, Wash., July 10.—With a major distributing company planning another slash in the wholesale price of gasoline today, the low retail figure of 7 1/2 cents a gallon, which prevailed yesterday, will be shaded by at least 1 cent, observers of the price war predicted.

Indications that the distributing companies will pound the price down to the state tax of 3 cents a gallon were given when one firm announced a wholesale price of 4 3/4 a gallon last night.

Lake Cities Perspire
Chicago, surrounded by heat, benefited by its Lake Michigan location, a northeast breeze fanning thankful thousands. Milwaukee and other lake shore cities also enjoyed comparative isolation from the heat blanket.

But even beneath beneficent breezes, the lake cities perspired. Two Chicago deaths resulted from falls, one from a window to which a man had gone for a breath of air, and other through a skylight through which toppled a woman who sought relief on the roof.

The twenty odd miles of Chicago beaches, a carnival of colored beach pajamas, robes, parasols and bathing suits, had two drownings. Forecasters offered little relief. They did venture that it would be "not quite so warm" in the northwest tomorrow, but Illinois and some other middle western sections were warned to prepare for even warmer weather.

Northwest Swelters
SEATTLE, July 10.—Eastern Washington and Idaho sweltered in the highest temperatures of the season yesterday with Lewiston, Idaho, registering a high mark of 104 degrees. The mercury rose to 101 at Wallace and 93 at Moscow, Idaho, and to 98 at Spokane and 95 at Yakima, Wash. Unsettled conditions, with probably thunder storms, were forecast for the region today.

Low temperatures prevailed in western Washington, the highest reported at Seattle being 76 degrees.

Virginia's Loss Heavy
CHARLESTON, W. Va., July 10.—Crop damage resulting from a prolonged drought and hot weather in West Virginia was estimated at one million dollars today by John W. Smith, state commissioner of agriculture.

Smith said the drought has been general all year but reached its greatest intensity during the last month.

Moonglight Harvesting
KANSAS CITY, July 10.—"Make hay while the sun shines" is a proverb strictly applicable to hay, in the opinion of western Kansas wheat harvesters. Unable to work in the blazing sun, combine crews last night began to harvest the grain by moonlight.

The heat which kept them out of the fields by day yesterday caused the death of Ole Olson, 45, farm hand, who died in the field in which he was planting corn.

U. S. TO PROBE BRITISH QUARANTINE ON APPLES
WASHINGTON, July 10.—The farm board will investigate the quarantine instituted against certain United States apples by England and Wales to determine whether it is in effect an embargo.

The decision was revealed today by C. C. Teague, member representing fruits and vegetables.

He said he did not believe the action, said by the British government to have been taken to prevent the introduction of apple pests, was intended as an embargo. Such a policy, Teague said, would be short sighted on the part of any government.

Apple exporters fear the quarantine may seriously handicap the exportation of a considerable part of the new crop.

Wet Candidate Asked
NEW YORK, July 10.—Albert Ottinger, formerly attorney general, announced today that he favors the nomination of Charles H. Tuttle, United States attorney, as the republican candidate for governor on a wet platform.

Ottinger, who was defeated by Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1928, said he was not a candidate for the nomination.

"I favor the nomination of Charles H. Tuttle," he said. "He will be elected, especially if he adopts Dwight Morrow's platform for repeal of the eighteenth amendment as the only way to achieve true temperance."

"The republican party of this state, while respecting the law, must take its stand firmly once and for all in favor of repeal of the eighteenth amendment without equivocation."

When informed of Ottinger's statement, Tuttle said he was engrossed in the duties of his office and that any action or statement linking his name with the republican candidacy for governor was without his knowledge or authorization.
