

## SENATORS AND CUBS INCREASE LEADS IN MAJOR CIRCUITS

The Cincinnati Reds are struggling deep in the second division of the National league, but when the Chicago Cubs, champions last season and contenders for this year's title, come along the Reds step out and play some first division baseball.

The Reds knocked the Cubs clear out of first place in the last few days by winning four games in a row, taking the final game with a 4 to 3 victory.

The defeat dropped the Cubs two full games into second place as Brooklyn took both games of a double header from the Boston Braves. With Dazzy Vance pitching, superlative ball, striking out nine while he allowed only three hits, the Reds took the first game 8 to 0. The Braves put up a better battle in the second and it required a home run with the bases full by Del Blantonette to give Brooklyn a 4-1 decision.

The steadily advancing St. Louis Cardinals picked up another game on the New York Giants and now are only a half game back of third place as the result of their 7 to 6 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates while New York dropped another to Philadelphia by a 5-0-4 count.

**Senators Increase Lead**

The American league celebrated the end of Washington's long winning streak, which came at the hands of the Boston Red Sox in the second game of a double header, but the Senators still gained a half game on Philadelphia and led by that margin.

Washington continued to use only one pitcher to a game, but Lloyd Brown gave the Red Sox 17 hits in the second contest while Milt Gaston held the Senators to eight, and Boston won, 5 to 1. Washington took the first game, 5 to 2, behind Sam Jones' pitching to make it ten straight.

The Athletics in second place, had a very bad day against the New York Yankees and went down by a 12 to 6 score. The Yankees still remained 5½ games out of second place after their recent slump.

**Ruth Suspended**

Once more Babe Ruth provided one of the day's biggest pieces of news by drawing down a three-day suspension because of the previous afternoon's dispute with umpire Brick Owens. The punishment did not turn out to be very severe as an injury was keeping the Babe out of action.

Cleveland and Detroit won their games. The fourth place Indians slammed out a 9 to 5 decision over the St. Louis Browns to win their first series in almost a month. They took three of the four games.

The Detroit Tigers strengthened their hold on the top of the second division with a 6 to 1 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.

## MAIL ORDER FIRMS SLASHING PRICES

CHICAGO, July 10.—A general reduction of prices and the adoption of a time payment plan for the summer months have been announced by Montgomery Ward and company.

George B. Everitt, president, said the new prices were the lowest quoted by his company in many years, being virtually on a pre-war basis. The new time payment plan will be effective until September 15 on all purchases of \$25 or more excepting groceries.

Mr. Everitt said the company considered the plan a constructive move, intended to stimulate consumer buying. "Even a small upturn in demand will start orders to factories, wheels turning and a decrease in unemployment, leading to a general upward trend in business," his statement said.

General Robert E. Wood, president of Sears Roebuck and company, announced that his company's fall catalogue, to be issued shortly, will show average price reductions approximating 10 per cent under prices of the spring catalogue.
