Cleveland, holding fourth place by a diminishing margin over Detroit, is having a great rivalry with the Tigers, which Chicago and St. Louis are staking an equally close struggle for sixth place.

Washington recovered rapidly from the break in its winning streak by taking the final encounter from the Boston Red Sox 7 to 2, as Ossie Bluege drove in four runs with two doubles and a home run. George Earnshaw pitched the Athletics to an easy triumph over the New York Yankees, allowing only three hits for a 9 to 1 triumph.

The National league had but one game on its schedule yesterday and there was some doubt as to whether it was baseball that New York and Philadelphia played. The Giants won by a score of 19 to 8.
