FARMERS CAN CUT INSURANCE RATES

SALEM, July 10.—Reduction in fire insurance rates will be granted to Oregon rural communities that organize for fire protection under the rural fire protection district act of the 1925 legislature, says an announcement by James N. McCune, proprietor of the Oregon insurance rating bureau, to Claire A. Lee, state insurance commissioner.

The question of credit for protected rural property was discussed by McCune and Lee recently and it was agreed Lee and the bureau would establish the minimum requirement for rural fire protection, which, when complied with, will entitle the district to definite credits.

Nine rural districts have been organized in Oregon since enactment of the measure.

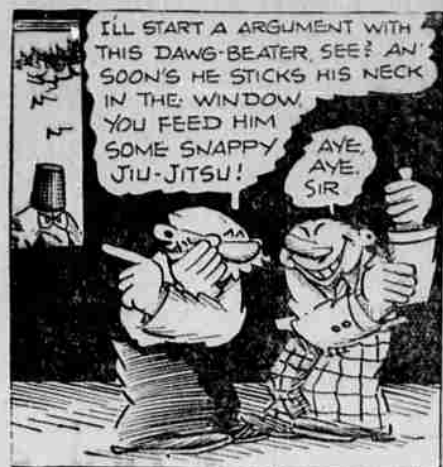

DIGGING GOLD FROM GUTTERS
Down in the heart of New York's Chinatown, which lies on the Bowery's borderland, Tom Noonan, who stood behind Sing Sing bars a little more than thirty years ago, is pulling down-and-enters from the gutter.



Through his Chinese Rescue Mission, by radio, and by every other means he can find, the "Bishop of Chinatown," once "up the river" himself, is waging a battle for outcasts and derelicts. Recently he celebrated the silver anniversary of his entrance into the combat.

Every night he packs them into his mission—the Cathedral of the Underworld, which once was a Chinese theatre—for services and food and sleep. Between times he stiffens their spines and gets them jobs and finds the money that makes his work possible. And every Sunday he talks over the radio to them and to the world that listens in for the heart-beat of Chinatown.

Those radio sessions are becoming so famous that every Sunday at three-thirty finds fingers all over America tinkering with the dials that bring in his station.

"Please stand by!"

Out of the ether comes the voice of the Bishop of Chinatown, telling his story. His talk is followed by another talk by a man or woman whom he has helped, music that he insists be bright because he has no use for sob songs, and requests for the thousand and one things that as many people need.

The world in which he works today is the one in which he prowled around as a boy, when long queued Chinamen and slant-eyed girls walked the cobblestones of Chinatown, when opium dives nestled between the shops, their windows decked with jade necklaces and golden Buddha, red lacquer bowls and dragon-trimmed satin coats.

Tom Noonan was born somewhere on the sidewalks of New York. His mother he never knew, and his father died when he was only a few years old. From then on, a rescue man was his restaurant, a fire escape his bed—Adelaide Kerr in the American Magazine, June, 1929.

In every man is native gold
That in no market's bought or sold;
A gold, so rich to angel eyes
That, when redeemed, it joys the skies;
This gold's as rich in gutter snipes
As in more highly polished types.
All this Tom Noonan understands;
He looks for gold 'neath all the brands.

Tom Noonan was, himself, redeemed;
His soul by evil ways was seamed;
And when, by sin, his life was scarred
Till heart and soul were sadly marred,
Down to the gutter mercy came
And plucked him from his life of shame;
Put love for hate deep in his heart,
And gave his life a heavenward start.

That wondrous miracle of grace
Transformed his life, illumed his face;
And, ever since that marvel day,
Seeks other travelers for the Way.
He hunts and digs for gutter wealth—
'Tis thus he keeps his soul in health;
A bishop he, of Chinatown
The sinner's priest without a gown.

But all the while, he gathers gold;
Lays by, on high, a wealth untold.
The angels call him "Millionaire"
Because his good he loves to share.
Through all Manhattan's underworld
He keeps the flag of hope unfurled;
From out that hell of wicked strife
He sends a host to useful life.
