

LANDSLIDES CAN'T BE BOUGHT, SAYS RUTH MCCORMICK

(Associated Press Landed Wire)
CHICAGO, July 14.—Ruth Hanna McCormick, epitomized her defense of the expenditure of more than \$250,000 to win a senatorial nomination today with the statement: "It may be possible to buy certain elections in this country, but you cannot buy Illinois land-slides."

In the 7000-word statement, with which she opened the hearing before the senate campaign funds committee, the republican senatorial nominee added \$85,214.10 to the \$252,572.30 she had previously admitted was spent in her behalf. But the first quarter million was her own money, she asserted, and the additional sum was expended for her cause by three friendly organizations.

Mrs. McCormick's statement criticized Senator Gerald P. Nye, chairman of the special campaign funds committee, for asserting his investigation had found she had spent approximately \$325,000 instead of \$252,500 she had reported.

The republican senatorial nominee said Senator Nye's statement was inaccurate and misleading, based on the fact that she voluntarily had submitted a supplemental report setting forth the spending of the \$67,214 before his investigators had inquired into those expenditures.

The \$67,214 was used by three organizations and was obtained by contributions from friends and relatives, Mrs. McCormick said. The voters progress league used \$44,000; the Illinois young peoples' republican club \$15,000; and the Ruth Hanna McCormick volunteers \$8214.

FIVE YOUTHS AND GIRL LOSE LIVES IN STORM ON BAY

BOSTON, July 14.—The story of five youths and a girl who fought a desperate but losing fight for life in the squalliest waters of Massachusetts bay late yesterday was told today by the sole survivor, Harden Garceau, 23, of this city, when he was landed here by mackerel seiner St. Rita.

Still chilled to the bone from the long-hours of immersion, during which he clung to the rigging of the capsized yawl in which all had left Scituate harbor only a short time before, Garceau described how one by one the others had loosened their hold and dropped from sight.

The others aboard the tiny craft were: Charles Hall, 23, of Scituate, Mass., the skipper; Walter Ceaser, 23, Youngstown, Ohio; John Blower, 26, Pittsburgh; David Garneau, 27, Concord, Mass.; William Earl, 23, Kansas City; Betty Munsel, Watertown, Mass. All were visitors at an exclusive summer colony.

trying to keep their prunes up to standard should have all possible protection. A. E. Tully, deputy state dairy and food commissioner, promised complete cooperation on the part of his department in handling the situation in Oregon.

Committee of Two Urged
Arthur Marsh, Douglas county representative on the packer-grower committee, presided over the meeting, which had the largest attendance of any of the meetings held so far in the state. He explained the various recommendations made by the committee. Of chief importance to the growers is the recommendation of the appointment of a committee of two reputable growers in each section to act as arbiters in disputes between packers and growers relative to the acceptance of prunes. The committee also recommended that growers discontinue the use of lye in drying prunes, a practice used by many growers to hasten drying. The committee recommended, as well, that the 20 per cent water content for dried fruit be accepted as standard.

Suggestions Offered
Other recommendations were as follows:

Remove all brown rot prunes before dipping.

Suitable sorting belts urged for all dry houses and packing plants with the exception of small dryers.

Improved lighting systems and greater care to guard against injury by excessive lye treatment in dryers.

Prunes should be freed from dirt and lye by thorough rinsing with clean water.

Floors and equipment should be maintained by adequate methods in clean, sanitary condition.

Efficient operation of dryers with even temperature and humidity. Buyers in making purchases should inspect carefully for brown rot.

Careful guarding against bin mold.

E. H. Weigand, professor of horticultural products, gave a very helpful talk, explaining to growers how their dried fruit can be improved. He gave many helps with regard to production, and explained systems whereby prunes affected by brown rot can be eliminated. He urged that a sorting belt, moving at slow speed, be installed in every dryer, at a place where there is good light, and that every diseased prune be removed before the fruit goes on the trays. While this will require a little more expense, he feels that the increased quality will more than offset the cost. He also detailed drying methods giving many helpful suggestions to the growers, who greatly appreciated his discussion.

Prune Crop Light
Prior to the general meeting, the members of the county association met to consider the plan proposed by the H. S. Gilie company for handling this year's crop of prunes. The prune market is very unfavorable this year. California has the largest crop for many years, while the northwest crop is light. The price is low at present, the latest quotation on the new crop having been secured through a contract signed for October delivery in England, the price being 31 shillings for 30-40 sizes and 29 shillings for 40-50 stock delivered in Liverpool. Deducting the usual transportation and packing costs the price is equivalent of around 3.8 cents net to the grower.

In view of this situation some of the directors felt that it would not be policy to hold the prunes for pool bids, as has been done previously, as it was feared that no bids would be received. The growers, however, were assured by representatives of some of the packing interests that there would be bids for the prunes, and upon this assurance the growers voted not to take any action on the Gilie proposal at this time, as the sentiment appears to be against consignment selling.
