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FINANCIAL LOSS CAUSES KILLING

LOS ANGELES, July 15.—A frenzy, caused by brooding over stock market losses was offered today by Frank Keaton, 56, as explanation for his slaying Motley Flint, 65, retired banker, in a superior courtroom yesterday.

Flint, brother of former United States Senator Frank P. Flint, was shot three times as he left the witness stand and paused to bid good day to Mr. and Mrs. David O. Selznick, who brought a \$250,000 recovery action against the bank of which Flint was president until 1928.

Keaton, an Inglewood, Calif., real estate dealer, reenacted last night before deputy sheriffs how he rose from his seat and shot over the shoulder of Mrs. Selznick at the man whose name he knew but whom he confessed he never had met.

An inquest will be held today by Coroner Frank Nance into the millionaire's death. Fifteen witnesses will describe the shooting, including Superior Judge Frank Collier, who was the first to seize the slayer.

In a rambling, often-changed discourse, Keaton told of the slaying. He said he had left his home where his sickly wife at times takes in washing to help provide for the couple's two daughters. Carrying a pistol he had kept in a trunk for 40 years, he had no interest in the trial at which Flint was a witness, he said, but was drawn to the courtroom by some inexplicable attraction.

"I had nothing against Flint or the bankers associated with him," police quoted Keaton as saying. "I don't know why I did it. I lost a lot of money, all my \$36,000 life savings, through investing in stocks they could have kept up."

Previously Keaton had shouted "this fellow ruined me! He ruined me!"

**BUTTE IN THROES
OF LABOR STRIKE**
BUTTE, Mont., July 15.—With neither strikers nor employers divulging plans for the future, Butte's wholesale and retail sections today observed a fourth successive holiday.

It was estimated more than 1500 persons are idle as a result of the walkout June 29 of members of the teamsters' union. Some 800 clerks were locked out Saturday by members of the Silver Bow Employers' association, who said business houses would be closed in sympathy with the teamsters until further notice.

The closing affected bookkeepers, stenographers, sub-managers and others not affiliated with the unions.

LOST FARMER FOUND
ZIGZAG, Ore., July 15.—Unharmful and apparently suffering little from exposure, Wilbur Zurbach, 31, farmer of Centralia, Wash., was found early this morning by a party of searchers after he had been lost on the lower slopes of Mount Hood since 5 a. m. Monday. Forest rangers came upon Zurbach shortly after dawn.

FAMED ACTOR DIES OF HEART ATTACK

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., July 15.—Rodolph Schlickraut, 65, veteran of the stage and screen, died at 2:45 a. m. today at the home of his son, Joseph Schlickraut, film star. He had suffered a heart attack yesterday while working at a motion picture studio.

The death of the actor was unexpected. He had appeared to be gaining strength last night and received several friends who entertained him by singing songs and playing a ukulele.

His son attended the opening of a stage play here and returned home at 1:30 a. m. After sitting up with his father a half hour Joseph retired. Forty-five minutes later his father died.

He was born at Constantinople and early in life started out on a stage career which earned him fame in continental Europe.

In his later years he scored in numerous successes in the films, his performance in "The King of Kings" being an outstanding one. The advent of the "talkies" opened a field in which he was much at home and he became an active performer.
