

BEND FIRES SOON TO BE CONTROLLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
BEND, Ore., July 15.—Forest rangers said today all fires in this district will be under control by nightfall unless unexpected winds arise. The Maklaks lake fire was considered under control at noon and barring unexpected winds there was little possibility that it would break loose. No new fires were reported in the Shevlin-Hixon timber west of Bend where a conflagration has raged since Friday. All fires are entrenched from the Shevlin-Hixon camp to West Duck Lake, and all have been backfired. This section is under control, and no new fires have been reported.

The other section of the 15-mile fire front was being held satisfactorily today, except for spot fires here and there on the extreme eastern end.

Lightning is Blamed
SEATTLE, July 14.—With 28 fires burning in the national forest at the north end of Olympic peninsula, all believed started by lightning, state fire association officials said here tonight fire fighters were being concentrated on the Elwha river in that region.

Two fires covering about 42 acres were reported in the Mount Baker national forest by Supervisor L. B. Pagter. Of six other fires in the western part of the state, the biggest was burning over 2,500 acres of logged off land near Cook in Skamania county.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 15.—A check today revealed that nearly 300 men from this district are aiding fire fighters in the Deschutes forest fire area. Many more were retained in this city to guard Klamath timber where fire hazards are considered as extreme. Several small fires in the county are under control.

MISSING ASSESSOR SUICIDES IN CAR

BONNER'S FERRY, Idaho, July 15.—The body of W. C. Reid, Boundary county assessor who disappeared yesterday after a short drive, was discovered in his car, which was found last night in his sedan, 12 miles north of here.

Reid had attached a piece of garden hose to the exhaust pipe, closed the windows of his car and sat down to await death.

When the shortage in his accounts was discovered yesterday night, Reid was said to have admitted it but asked to be allowed to go to Coeur d'Alene to seek funds to reimburse the county. He held his wife he was going fishing.

the long struggle of the railroads for relief from the fourth section of the interstate commerce commission. This section prohibits rail lines from charging more for hauling freight to intermediate points than between farther distant terminal points on the same line. However, the coast roads are now operating under interstate commerce commission authority to disregard this section where actual water competition exists. This privilege was denied to transcontinental roads.

Roseburg Affected.
William P. Ellis, attorney who represented the western Oregon traffic association, composed of substantially all of the western Oregon chambers of commerce south of Portland, said the decision is a decided victory for western Oregon communities intermediate between San Francisco and Portland, and that substantial rate reductions may be expected to result from a compliance with the decision.

"This is particularly true," he said, "as to the rates to and from Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Roseburg, and other southern Oregon points. While reductions will doubtless result to Willamette valley points, the amount thereof will doubtless be less."

"While our association urged complete denial of the Southern Pacific application, we likewise urged that if the commission felt that circumstances required that fourth section relief be granted to the Southern Pacific company, the intermediate rates should not be more than 100 per cent in excess of the port rates."

If Puget sound points be used as a base for figuring intermediate rates, reductions to western Oregon points will be even greater. If the Southern Pacific company continues its attempt to compete with the boat lines for port to port traffic, the granting of the Southern Pacific application would have resulted in some substantial increases in rate rates to Salem, Albany, Eugene, and other Willamette valley points. Three increases are specifically denied by the commission.

Commission's Order
WASHINGTON, July 15.—Pacific coast railroads received interstate commerce commission decision today to make north and south freight rates between California seaports and the north Pacific ports in Oregon and Washington to meet steamboat competition.

The commission's orders, effective Nov. 25, allow the rail line to maintain higher rates to and from intermediate territory and inland points where the water competition is not effective while reducing charges to the seaport areas. The new adjustments involve situations where rail rates will be higher for short distances than for longer distances over the same routes. The commission placed limits on this for the Pacific rail lines, holding that generally existing rates through intermediate inland points should not be increased above present levels and that intermediate points should not be charged more than 100 per cent above the charges to ports.

of the extension service of the Oregon State college.

This was followed by a reading by Miss Marie Christian of Evergreen Grange.

A most inspirational address was given by Dr. Poling, who spoke on the "Value of Community Idealism."

In community life success is measured in exactly the same manner as in an individual. Dr. Poling declared, and the individual life parallels that of the community. Certain things make for the success of an individual; power, pleasure and faith—faith in his highest self, not only in spiritual things, but faith in one's self, faith in the community and faith in those things that are right and best for all. Success in the individual and in the community, Dr. Poling said, is to be measured in the relationship to the world at large. A selfish outlook upon life cannot be successful. Success depends upon service to mankind, and the individual of the community that fails to include a humanitarian view of life, that fails to benefit mankind in general is not a success.

State Master Speaks.
Dr. Poling's interesting talk was followed by a vocal duet by Misses Janet and Gladys Shepherd of South Deer Creek Grange, after which C. C. Hulet, master of the State Grange, spoke briefly on the subject of "Fraternity."

Mr. Hulet stressed the thought that the various organizations, such as the Grange and Kiwanis and other groups of like kind are working toward the same end. Each has the thought of community development in mind, promoting of fellowship and fraternity. Frequently, he stated, one organization gets the idea that some other group is working in conflict and sometimes such is the case, but in practically every instance such conflict is the result of misunderstanding. When organizations and groups of people get together and discuss their problems, it always results that cooperation is established whereby both can work to the same goal and great results can be achieved.

Speaking to the Grange members he stressed the importance within the organization of loyalty as citizens. The Grange, he stated, is not a law enforcement organization, but it is law abiding, and he urged loyalty as citizens to the laws of the land and the land and the principals of fraternity and fellowship.

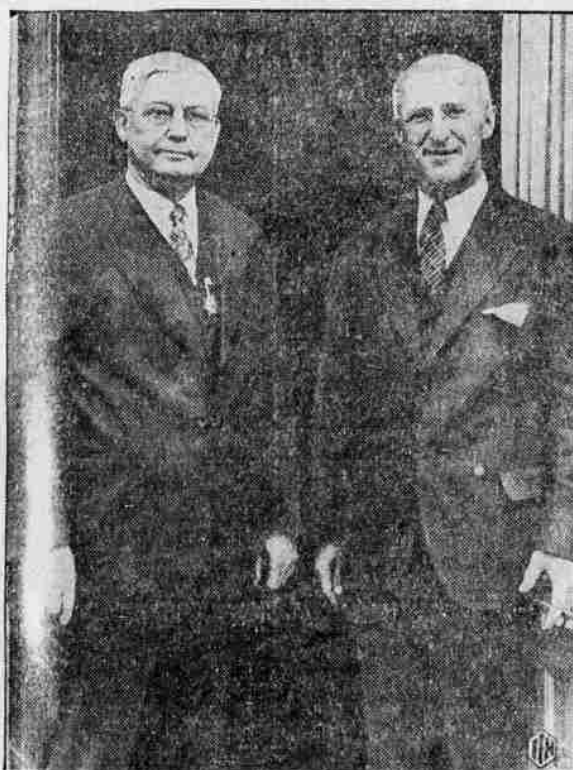
The attendance at today's picnic was the largest since the annual event was inaugurated, and every one present was delighted with the spirit that prevailed and the excellent entertainment furnished.

Gas Fraud Plan Will Be Probed

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
SALEM, Ore., July 15.—Evidence that certain persons living in country districts purchased thousands of gallons of gasoline during the price war last week, claimed tax exemption on it under the law that exempts tax payment from fuel used for industrial purposes, and now intend to sell it at the higher prevailing prices in competition with regular dealers is to be investigated by the secretary of state.

State officials became suspicious when some purchases of 1000 gallons or more turned in affidavits the following day purporting to show that the fuel was used for industrial purposes and claimed exemption from the 4-cent tax. In cases where the exemption was allowed the purchasers got their gasoline for as low as 8 cents a gallon. The officials declare that it is very unlikely that any machinery owned by a farmer would consume as much as 1000 gallons of gasoline in a day.

Many persons, it is said, purchased as much as 5000 gallons. Their use of the fuel is to be watched closely by operatives connected with the state department.

McNARY ASKS QUIZ ON LUMBER TARIFF

WASHINGTON, July 15.—A resolution asking a tariff commission investigation of the difference in cost of production here and abroad of lumber and timber of fir, spruce, pine, hemlock, and larch was introduced today by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon.

A new tariff act places a duty of one dollar a thousand board feet on these softwoods, but exempts Canadian and Mexican lumber if these countries permit the same to be exported to them free.

that there will be between 2500 and 3000 tons of pears for the local market, and unless the cannery is able to take care of them, a large percentage of the fruit will be lost.

In view of the general unemployment situation, the poor market conditions, and the general fruit situation, it is felt that the operation of the cannery is imperative in order to save fruit that otherwise will be a complete loss, while at the same time, the operation of the plant will relieve unemployment to a considerable extent. The growers are, therefore, very anxious to get the cannery in operation as soon as possible.

The committee appointed at last night's meeting, was instructed to meet at once, to draw up the outline for putting the plan into effect, and the first meeting is to be held tonight. A general meeting of all growers who have been patrons of the cannery will be held Friday night at the courthouse, at which time the report of the committee will be presented and steps taken to make the organization effective.

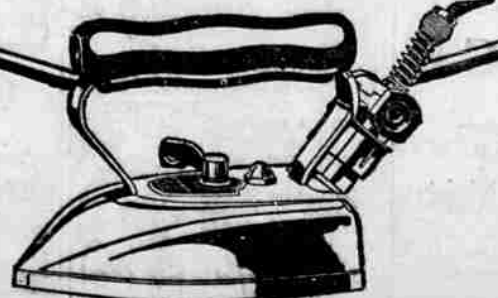
