RECORD-SEEKING PILOTS CRASH AIRPLANE

Editorials on the Day's News

DID you ever ask yourself this question, and then try seriously and intelligently to give an answer to it:

"Why does a candidate for office issue a personal platform, and what is the USEFUL PURPOSE of it, if any?"

THAT is a double-barrelled question, so let us undertake a double-barrelled answer:

1. Candidates for office issue personal platforms in order to GET VOTES, without which they can not be elected.

2. Personal platforms are useful, because they give the thoughtful voter an insight into the way the candidate's mind works, thus providing some sort of measure of WHAT HE IS.

If you read, thoughtfully and analytically, Ed Bailey's platform, you got a mental picture of a man who has had political experience enough to deal in a little HOOEY, but who has a good grasp of the social and economic problems that Oregon is facing, and whose mind works clearly and sensibly enough to indicate that he possesses ability to lead along roads where people need not be afraid to follow.

That is a pretty fair picture of Ed Bailey.

HERE, got out of the way right at the start, is the HOOEY:

"In choosing your governor, you will decide whether the Republican political machine, dominated and controlled as it is by special privilege, shall be kept in power, or call a new deal wherein the people will have such a voice as is contemplated by our system of government."

ED was a football player, and a good one; so he knows the value of TEAM MORALE. He remembers the days when the coach called all the fellows around him and told them in burning words what a set of highbinders the OTHER TEAM was; and he remembers how the coach's burning words spurred him and his team mates on to HIT THE LINE HARD.

When he starts off his platform by telling what a wicked lot the Republicans are, he is striving for team morale; whipping up the emotions of his followers so they will HIT THE LINE HARD.

It is good strategy, as everyone who has played either football or politics knows.

ON the subject of electric power, which has become a leading political as well as economic issue, Ed thinks this way:

1. Withdraw for public purposes enough power sites to make us safe against private monopoly in the future.

2. Let the federal government go as far as it likes, WITH FEDERAL MONEY, in the development of cheap water power for the people of Oregon to use.

3. Encourage the cities to develop municipal power utilities to serve themselves and their nearby country.

4. Go slowly and carefully in putting the STATE OF OREGON into the power business.

THIS writer, speaking for himself, thinks that is a stately progressive program. It is a program, of course, that if put into effect at all will be put into effect by the PEOPLE, or the LEGISLATURE, and not by the GOVERNOR, but the fact that a candidate thinks sanely and progressively along these lines indicates that he

Seven Caught in Dry Drive

DOUGLAS AND STATE PROHIBITION FORCES SCORE

Outside Agents Buy Liquor From Brothers, Seizing Them as They Bring It in Auto.

Melrose Poultryman Found to Have Big Distillery Underneath Brooder House at Melrose.

Seven arrests for violation of the prohibition law were made yesterday afternoon and evening by Sheriff V. T. Jackson and his deputies assisted by state and federal officers, who have been working in the county for the past few days. Boyce Prose, Melrose poultryman, was arrested yesterday afternoon, following the discovery of a large still on his place, and John Galla and Alfred Galla, also of Melrose, who were employed by Prose, were also taken into custody and are being held for examination.

Robert and James Conaster of Glendale, the former a pitcher for the Glendale baseball team, were arrested last night charged with sale and transportation of liquor. Their car was also taken by the officers and may be confiscated by the state.

Gans Rondeau and Art Dodge, residents of upper Cow creek were taken into custody charged with sale of liquor to the federal and state officers.

Liquor Delivery Made
In the arrest of the Conaster brothers, according to Sheriff Jackson, one of the state officers made arrangements for delivery of a gallon of liquor and the two young men drove up in their car with the moonshine in the machine. When they delivered the liquor, the officers

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PEACH MEN AGREE TO CURTAIL PACK

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—Representatives of peach growers and commercial and cooperative canners of California ratified the agreement to curtail the peach pack to 13,000,000 cases. This year's crop is estimated at 18,000,000 cases. Canners have contributed \$1,750,000 to purchase the surplus. Prices for the surplus were fixed at \$20 a ton.

BOXER DIES AFTER KENTUCKY BATTLE

DAYTON, Ky., July 15.—Sammy Buchanan, junior welterweight boxer from Waycross, Ga., who fell to the canvas in the seventh round of his fight here Monday night with Jimmy Neal, Cincinnati, died early today in Speers hospital.

Buchanan at first appeared to have suffered a hemorrhage of the stomach, but his condition was such that he could not be moved for an X-ray examination and hospital attendants were uncertain as to the cause of his death.

Fugitive Canby Killer is 'Seen' in Oregon Sections

Oregon City Road Worker Discovers Man Ransacking Tent and Identifies Him as Charles Maier; Hop Pickers at Mt. Angel See Man With Gun Emerge From Brush.

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 16.—The posse searching for Charles Maier, 64, slayer of Andrew Nelson, 50, his neighbor, in an argument over a cow, was spurred to new action today by a report that a man answering Maier's description was seen in the wooded district.

Fred Weaver, road worker, said he heard a noise in his tent, investigated, and saw a batless, coatless man run from the place. The man wore a blue shirt.

Maier, after shooting Nelson, fled to the timber near his home. He wore no hat or coat, had a blue shirt and heavy rubber boots.

Officers say it is possible Maier may have been looking for food in the tent.

Others in the posse hold to the theory that the man killed himself after hiding in the woods. When he fled he carried the high-power rifle with which he had killed Nelson.

Hop Pickers "See" Him.
MT. ANGEL, Ore., July 16.—Hop yard workers three miles east of here report seeing a man believed to be Charles Maier, 64-year-old Canby resident sought for the killing of Andrew Nelson, emerge from the heavy brush along Butte creek late Tuesday afternoon.

The man answered the description of the missing farmer, according to Bert Ross, who based his opinion upon newspaper descriptions.

He was wearing overalls and appeared to have a gun concealed beneath his garments. When he saw people at work in the J. C. Weiss hop yard he turned and disappeared back in the brush, it was said.

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BRITISH SEND TWO CRUISERS TO SAVE LIVES

Disorders in Egypt Cause Fear for Safety of Foreigners Living in Alexandria.

13 Natives and 1 Italian Killed in Riots as Police Mix With Striking Men.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 15.—Several thousand Egyptians assembled outside the government hospital today and pelted it with stones. Order was restored with great difficulty.

LONDON, July 16.—The British government has ordered the battleships Queen Elizabeth and Ramilies to proceed to Alexandria for the protection of foreign lives and property endangered by disorders at that place.

Prime Minister MacDonald, in announcing the dispatch of the vessels, also informed the house of commons that Sidky Pasha, the Egyptian premier, and Nafah Pasha, former premier and nationalist leader, had been warned they would be held responsible for the protection of foreign lives and interests.

During rioting in Alexandria yesterday thirteen natives and one Italian were killed and many natives were injured in clashes between Egyptian soldiers and police and strikers.

The Ramilies is a 30,000-ton vessel and is armed with eight 15-inch guns while the Queen Elizabeth is a 28,000-ton ship and also carries eight 15-inch guns.

JAMES LYNCH, NOTED LABOR LEADER, DIES

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 16.—James M. Lynch, for many terms president of the international typographical union and leader of that organization's nationwide battle for the 48-hour working week, died in a hospital here this morning of blood infections. He was state commissioner of labor under Governor Martin Glynn and subsequently one of four industrial commissioners.

Probably the outstanding feat in the long career of James M. Lynch, a career that embraced service to the state and to organized labor, was his determined and diplomatic supervision of the famous fight of the I. T. U. in the early 1900's, for the 48-hour week.

HONEYMOON MONEY SCHEME IS NIPPED

TACOMA, Wash., July 16.—George Graham, who police said was a former inmate of McNeil island and Oregon state penitentiary, was arrested here last night for allegedly conducting what they described as a "honeymoon lottery," to defraud parents of newly married couples out of money.

Officers said Graham followed the society pages of all newspapers in this section and where it was mentioned that an out of state couple was honeymooning in Washington, he would send a wire to the parents of one or both parties, asking for money.

He was arrested through the activity of State Senator Thomas P. Stewart of Anacosta, Mont., whose son was on his wedding trip in Washington. The elder Stewart sensed fraud when he received the request for money and notified the Tacoma police.

Graham was arrested when he appeared at the telegraph office here.

THREE ARE HURT AS PLANE DROPS

PHILADELPHIA, July 16.—Lieut. Commander O. W. Erickson, W. B. Ethel, naval apprentice, and E. L. Talley, civilian inspector, were injured today in an airplane crash at the Philadelphia navy yard.

Sheriff E. H. Lister and deputies left immediately for the scene of the killing, 40 miles from here. Word reached here that Orloff had had trouble with another miner over a claim.

GRANTS PASS MINER FOUND SHOT DEAD

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 16.—Shot to death, the body of John Orloff was found today near his mining claim in the famous Altus mining district, Charles Gilmore, a trapper, made the discovery. A bullet had passed through Orloff's head.

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BANDITS GRAB \$202,000 LOOT

Five Machine Gun Highwaymen Escape With Bank Funds of \$142,000; Canton Haul Is \$60,000; Robber Slain and Bank Messenger Badly Wounded.

WILLMAR, Minn., July 16.—Loot amounting to at least \$142,000 was obtained by five machine gun bandits who held up the Bank of Willmar and escaped after shooting down two women.

Edwin Selveg, vice president of the bank, said the bandits obtained "about \$100,000 in stocks and bonds" in addition to \$42,000 in cash. He estimated about \$25,000 of the paper was negotiable. The exact amount taken was still undetermined.

Meanwhile, authorities of Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa and Wisconsin patrolled highways in a search for the gunmen whose robbery was the most sensational since that of the James gang raid on Northfield, Minn., in 1876.

That raid resulted in the death of two outlaws, the capture of the three younger brothers and the break up of the James gang.

While the search continued for the bandits, Mrs. Emil Johnson, one of the women wounded, remained in a critical condition from a bullet wound in the chest, although physicians said she was slightly improved.

Get \$60,000 in Canton
CANTON, Ohio, July 16.—A robber identified as Charles Williams, alias Charles Kish, 25, of Canton was shot to death and Charles M. Riblet, 49, former Canton police chief, was wounded here today in a pistol fight that followed the robbery of two messengers of the First National bank.

Bank officials later admitted that the messengers were carrying \$60,000 in currency. They said the money could be identified by serial numbers.

The second bandit grabbed the package when the shooting started, and escaped to an automobile in which a third man was waiting.

The package, which at first was said to have contained \$7,000 was consigned to the Cleveland Federal Reserve bank.

Naval Treaty Secrecy Held Cause for Threat of War

Opponent of Pact Declares France and Italy Verge on War Because Details of London Treaty Negotiations Were Not Published.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Senator McKellar told the senate today France and Italy had been "brought on the verge of war" by "secrecy, bad blood and jealousy" surrounding negotiation of the naval treaty.

McKellar's attack, opened after 64 senators had appeared, was expected to be followed by others from opponents of the pact. Its supporters have rested their case.

The Tennessee democrat cited Franco-Italian relations after protesting that no printed record of the London negotiations were available, although records of the Washington and Geneva conferences were printed in book form soon after the 1922 and 1927 gatherings.

"That's the reason why this treaty is not a real peace treaty," he said. "That's the reason this treaty is a sham and why only three powers signed it. That's the reason we almost brought on a war between France and Italy."

Senator Reed, one of the treaty framers, informed McKellar the secretary of the London conference kept records of the proceedings which undoubtedly were in the state department files.

Senator Johnson, treaty opponent, said the state department was printing a volume embodying its own views on the pact. The proofs of this book, he added, have been turned over to "one admiral who was friendly to the plan adopted by the American delegation."

"They are secretly guarded by him and will be delivered to the senate after action on this treaty is taken," Johnson said.

The restless party leaders were holding informal conferences looking to a definite hour for voting. They hope to obtain ratification by a week from today.

Mr. and Mrs. James Byrd have just returned from a visit to Tennessee, where they stopped for a short time with their son and his family.

YOUNG AIR ACE'S CONDITION GRAVE

BENNINGTON, Vt., July 16.—The condition of Frank Goldsborough, youthful pilot whose plane crashed on a mountain side near here Monday, remained extremely critical today. A bulletin from Putnam Memorial hospital said his condition had not improved during the night.

The 19-year-old holder of the junior trans-continental flying record has failed to regain consciousness since he was admitted to the hospital yesterday suffering from a fractured skull and exposure. He had lain beside his wrecked plane for 18 hours while searching parties had beaten thick underbrush in an effort to locate him.

ATTEMPT AT TORCH SUICIDE MAY WORK

JOHNET, Ill., July 16.—Mrs. Elizabeth Sluk's effort to kill herself by fire yesterday probably will prove successful, physicians said today. They do not believe she will survive her burns.

Mrs. Sluk, who police were told was a dependent divorcee, smothered her limbs with grease and saturated a mattress with oil yesterday. She laid down upon the improvised pyre and touched a match to it. A moment later, she ran down the street until finally she fell, exhausted from her burns.

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WHOLE CREW SAFE AFTER CHUTE JUMP

Non-Stop Refueling Effort Ends When Ship Goes Out of Control in Southern Georgia.

BOSTWICK, Ga., July 16.—The monoplane K of New Haven crashed here today but the occupants escaped by use of parachutes. The plane was enroute to South America, on an attempted non-stop endurance flight.

Jimmy Garrigan, one of the pilots, said the ship got beyond control after it consumed all its gasoline and he and his companions decided to desert it. All three floated to safety one mile from here.

Will Try Again
"We will return to New York and try all over again," Garrigan said.

He said they flew through beastly weather last night and the ship used more fuel than they had expected.

"We just had to jump," Garrigan said. "We didn't know where we were exactly and the ship was out of control. The visibility was bad, so we took to the 'chutes and let her fall."

Help reached the fliers soon after they landed about a mile west of Bostwick.

The plane originally was built by Eddie Stinson for an assault on the endurance, non-refueling flight record, now held by Germany. Speed was sacrificed for lifting capacity, but it was considered ideal for
