## Rib-Tickling Comedy Coming!

They were featured in "Rio Rita," to be sure, but they were kept under restraint in that musical. Here they are allowed to give everything—and how they give it! The remainder of the cast is admirable. June Clyde and Hugh Trevor supply the love interest. Mitchell Lewis, one of the best "heavies" in pictures today, is more than effective. Margarita Padula, "Hallschuh" singer in "Hit the Deck," and Ivan Lebedeff, suave and polished actor, lend important characterizations.
