

SEARCHERS THINK THEY KNOW TRAIL

—CEDAR CITY, Utah, July 16.—Headed by Major R. N. McDonald and Sheriff J. C. Leigh of Iron County, a party of searchers, confident they have found the direction taken by Maurice Graham, the mail pilot, when he left his wrecked plane in the Kanab Mountains last January, today were preparing to push deeper into the mountainous country.

Major McDonald, associated with Graham in aviation during the World War, and the Iron County sheriff yesterday found what they believe to be the trail taken by the pilot.

cer flashed his badge and placed them under arrest.

No formal charge has yet been placed against Prose. Sheriff Jackson states that he can be accused of sale, possession of liquor, possession of mash, conspiracy, manufacture and possession of a still, and he will possibly be required to answer to more than one charge.

Prose was arrested here about three years ago on a charge of sale of liquor, and while being brought into Roseburg by Deputy Sheriff Lens and Daugherty, rolled out of the moving car, despite the fact that he was handcuffed, and succeeded in escaping from the officers. He broke his collar bone when he jumped from the car, but hid in the brush for several hours and then secured the services of a friend in filing off the handcuffs. He escaped into California, but was arrested about 8 months later when he returned to Medford.

Still Unique
Recently he has been operating a poultry farm at Melrose, and officers recently received information that he was making and selling liquor. The state and federal agents, according to Sheriff Jackson, purchased liquor from him, and a raid was made on his place yesterday.

The officers hunted for more than an hour for his still, and were

about to give up the search, when Sheriff Jackson noticed that there was a fire in the brooder stove. He thought it was peculiar that the brooder should be in use on a warm day, particularly as the smallest chicks were several weeks old, and he began investigating the chicken house.

He uncovered a pipe, which had been hidden under a pan buried under hay, and saw that the pipe was apparently a ventilator to an underground room. Returning to the brooder house he investigated the stove, which was set in a concrete base, and found, by sounding, that there was a cellar beneath the concrete floor of the brooder house.

Moonshine in Making
The officers were puzzled for considerable time to find an entrance into the cellar, but finally discovered that the concrete base of the brooder stove was separated from the main floor. The stove was partially turned over and immediately the room was filled with the smell of mash.

Prose was called and seeing that the still had been discovered, showed the officers how to gain access to the still room. He had rigged up a block and tackle by which the brooder stove, with its heavy concrete base could be lifted. The circular base fit snugly into a circular opening through the floor leading directly into the large cellar that had been dug underneath the house.

There the officers found a 60-gallon copper still with the worm and

WAR TIME BLAST SUSPECT CAUGHT AFTER 12 YEARS

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Still looking for the cause of the war time explosion and fire which destroyed huge stores of ammunition at Kingsland, New Jersey, government investigators have located after a twelve-year search the missing key witness in the case.

He is Theodore Wozniak, who was employed at the Kingsland ammunition plant, and subsequently became an important figure in Germany's defense against America's \$40,000,000 sabotage claims for this disaster and the similar morning to meet the local team in the afternoon.

DOUGLAS JUNIORS TO PLAY EUGENE

Roseburg baseball fans will have another opportunity to see the Douglas county junior league team in action next Saturday when the local team plays Eugene for the right to compete in the state contest at Portland. The game is to be played at Finlay field, starting at 3 o'clock, and the legionnaires, sponsoring junior baseball in this county, are very anxious that there be a large attendance of local fans to give the boys the needed support in this semi-final game.

It had at first been expected that the game would be played in Eugene, but the state director has decided to hold the contest in Roseburg, and word was received from Eugene today that the arrangements are satisfactory and the team will be here Saturday

one at the Black Tom arsenal of the Lehigh Valley railroad.

Affidavits filed late yesterday with the German-American mixed claims commission said he had been found at Tupper Lake, New York, in company with an attorney for Germany, who had refused to permit American agents to question him.

Wozniak was interrogated immediately after the disaster, but when the adjudication of the claims began after the war he could not be found. Arguments before the commission were ended, and then the case was reopened by the Germans.

They said Wozniak had appeared at their headquarters and admitted the Kingsland fire started at his work bench, but denied he had caused it or been engaged in a sabotage program for Imperial Germany.

At Tupper's Lake, Wozniak was given a letter informing him he was wanted for questioning in Washington. Subsequently he went to New York, the affidavits said, and was last seen entering a house on the east side.

He informed a government agent who was shadowing him he had no intention of coming to Washington for questioning unless a subpoena is issued.

Final arguments are to be heard before the commission in Germany in September.
