DONATES \$15,000 TO RUTH'S CAUSE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
CHICAGO, July 16.—Colonel R. R. McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune and brother-in-law of Ruth Hanna McCormick, told the senate campaign funds committee today that he had given \$15,000 to support her senatorial campaign.

Of this amount, only \$2,500 had been previously included in the expenditure of \$327,000 so far accounted for as her campaign expenses.

Col. McCormick said this sum included a check for \$10,000 which was sent to Mrs. McCormick on April 1, 1930, a week before the primary election.

He said Mrs. McCormick informed him this check arrived too late for use in the campaign, but the money had not been returned to him.

The publisher at first included another contribution of \$2,000 in his testimony regarding the senatorial campaign, but later corrected himself by saying that sum was given to her campaign for congresswoman at large.

The inquiry thus far has disclosed the senatorial nomination cost Mrs. McCormick and her supporters \$327,000 of which amount the nominee herself supplied \$252,500 and accounted for an additional \$67,200.

CLEAN LIVING A GOOD INVESTMENT

Almond Reed Hemenway received a check for \$200 this week from Leopold Schepp foundation as a reward for keeping for three years a pledge for clean living, good citizenship and attention to religious training.

This foundation was established by Leopold Schepp who, when a newsboy, was helped by a wealthy man to get an education. He resolved that if ever he became wealthy he would return the kindness by helping others. He did become wealthy, and he kept his boyhood resolve by setting aside a fund, the interest from which is used to assist lads who live up to a pledge which they are required to sign. That they live up to the pledge must be vouched for by three sponsors.

In return for aid from this foundation, boys are expected later to help some other boy in the same manner. Boys to be eligible must be in the formative period of life.

The Cottage Grove had been outstanding in school activities. He was center in the football team, was a member of the boys' glee club and of the male quartet. He also had part in the high school operetta and the high school play. He is president of the Christian Endeavor of the Christian church and operates his father's business while the father is away, which is a large part of the time. He is 19 years of age, is 6 feet 2 inches in height and weighs 210 pounds.

Reed will invest his money in pullets, and with the proceeds from these he hopes to pay his way through college. He was recommended for the Schepp foundation by Rev. W. A. Elkins of Eugene, ex-pastor here, who has been instrumental in helping several boys to benefit through the foundation. News story from Cottage Grove, Oregon, June 21, 1930.

LEGGE OPINES HE MEANT NO INSULT TO WHEAT STATE

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Alexander Legge has disclaimed in a letter to Governor Reed of Kansas that he "got hot about something" at the recent meeting in Kansas in the farm board's campaign for wheat acreage reduction.

The letter, made public today at the board's offices, said some newspapers "seem to have the impression that Mr. Hyde and myself were asking the farmer to quit raising wheat in Kansas."

"You know how far that is from the fact, the suggestion being only to raise a little less of it and give the consumer a chance to catch up with producers," the board chairman wrote.

"In view of the further facts and information that have been developed on this subject during recent months, I am hoping you will see your way clear to join us in this request. In other words, we are asking a little cooperation from the grower who is the one who will receive the benefit from any improvement in the situation."

After the meeting at Dodge City, Kansas, Legge was quoted as having said:

"The biggest hog will always lie in the trough. Kansas is now in the trough."

This led to a telegraphic request for his resignation from Max M. and Louis Leavitt, joint publishers of the Wichita, Kansas, Beacon.

Legge's letter to Reed concluded:

"Still another peculiar angle is brought up by your friends, Max and Louie, of Wichita, who are prone to speak for all Kansas, acting as if they thought they were the state of Kansas. They transposed the words 'is Kansas' to read 'Kansas is' and proceeded to get insulted about it."

"It seems quite clear that you understood what was meant, as you were sitting within a few feet of me on the platform at the time and apparently accepted the state-

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ment in the spirit in which it was made. Had you thought there was anything in the remarks disrespectful to the good state of Kansas. I am sure that you as governor would have promptly protested rather than leave the job to Max and Louie.

"Since you have given out copies of your letters to me, I feel that you will not object if I pass this letter along to the press."

"Sincerely yours, 'Alex Legge.'"
