parently was sitting down to eat. In his left hand which was resting across his chest he held a knife and beside him lay a can of tomatoes with a hole punched in the top. In his right hand, lying over his head he held his gun, fully loaded. An empty can of foodstuffs also lay beside the body.

The discovery climaxed an intensive search of the vicinity which has been under way since discovery of the plane. The clue that is believed to have been mainly responsible for ending the mystery was found last Saturday in the discovery of a burned out campfire and articles identified as from a kit carried by the flier three miles south of the scene of the wreckage.

In addition to McDonald, the men who found the body included Jimmy Allen of Los Angeles, a cousin of the pilot. McDonald and Allen returned to Cedar City, leaving the other four men to guard the body.

McDonald immediately notified the Western Air Express officials in Los Angeles of the discovery.

Graham was employed by the Western Air Express on the salt lake run from Los Angeles to Salt Lake City. It was on the last leg of his flight that he became lost in a storm over Nevada and Utah late on the night of January 10.

Graham is survived by his widow, who lives in Hollywood, and his two children, Monte and Melodie, boy and girl twins, 8 years old.

Search Is Historic
The search for Graham, who was 32 years old, began January 11 and terminated last night, was one of the most dogged in the history of aviation.

During the months since Graham took off at Las Vegas, Nevada, on the final leg of his mail run to Salt Lake City from Los Angeles and was lost in a blinding snowstorm, thousands have hunted over deserts and snow laden mountains for his body.

Officials of Western Air Express, for whom Graham had flown more than 150,000 miles without ever having been off schedule, refused to believe he had died in his plane. They said despite adverse conditions they were certain he had landed without serious injury to himself.

Army Deeds Valiant
Graham received his flying training in the army at San Diego, Calif., Fort Sill, Fort Worth and overseas. He enlisted June 28, 1917. He served at the front in France. He was in the 50th squadron, flying a Liberty DFL, but after the Armistice was transferred to the 24th aero squadron and served with the army of occupation in Germany.

While with the 50th squadron Graham's observer was shot through the neck while he was flying 50 feet above the Argonne forest dropping supplies to the famous lost battalion. Graham received two citations and was credited with shooting down a balloon.

Barnstorming in Europe after the Armistice, Graham flew a 8-passenger ship from Germany over Belgium to England, circled Scotland and Ireland and flew back over the channel to France. The two weeks' tour was considered outstanding at that time.

Rankin's Record Broken
SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 17.—Colonel Roscoe Turner, former army flier, having landed at Azusa, California, today at 4:14:05 P.M. yesterday evening today holds the record for a nonstop flight from Vancouver, B. C.

Turner took off from Vancouver at 7 a. m., making his elapsed time 9:14:05. The previous record, set by Tex Rankin, was 13:07.

Turner said he maintained an average speed of 150 miles an hour. Aside from being tired, he and his four crew members were none the worse for their trip.

The distance is approximately 1,350 miles.

William Van Dusen, local N. A. A. representative, said today the record was on its way to Washington, D. C., by air mail.

Frank Goldsborough, 19, aviator, died at Putnam Memorial hospital here tonight. The young flier has been unconscious since the time his plane crashed into a tree in the dense forests east of here Monday. He was brought to the hospital by a posse which had searched for him for 12 hours.

Two Marines Killed
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 17.—Walter Lee Pounders, U. S. marine gunner and pilot, and Chalmers Lewis Martin, U. S. marine aviator, were killed while making an aerological flight ten miles south of Managua yesterday.

Pounders came from Colt, Arkansas, and his next of kin was given as his brother, James S. Pounders. Martin came from Barlow, Ohio. His next of kin was given as his mother, Mrs. Sadie Martin.

The cause of the accident was not known here.

A marine relief party which went to the assistance of the stricken plane after reports of the crash had been received found that the machine had crashed on a hill side. The men were making a daily aerological flight.

Both bodies were found in the cockpit of the plane which had been smashed in. Pounders apparently had died instantly while Martin, mortally injured, appeared to have died soon afterward.

\$105,000. The contractor has set up his plant and will begin spreading rock about July 25. Surfacing will not be completed until July 30, 1931.

East of Scottsburg on the same highway a contract was let last March 27 to Harmon & Title of Eugene for the grading of a 4.4-mile stretch at a contract cost of \$95,000. This will be completed by Oct. 31, 1930. On this unit a separate contract was awarded to C. A. Catching of Roseburg for construction of a number of small bridges and culverts at a total cost of \$22,181. These will be completed by August 31 this year.

A 16-mile section between Reedport and Scottsburg was graded and surfaced a few years ago as a forest highway project and a bridge across the Umpqua to replace the old ferry was completed last year at a cost of \$98,000.

Highway 55 Miles Long
The Umpqua highway is 55 miles long, connecting the Pacific highway and the Rosevelt coast highway. When completed it will give practically a water grade between the Pacific highway and the coast, since it will not be necessary to cross the Coast Range mountains at any point.

The Umpqua highway is interesting both historically and scenically. Tidewater on Umpqua river extends as far as Scottsburg which has the distinction of having been the third postoffice established in Oregon. In early days small boats came up the river as far as Scottsburg where supplies for mining camps and settlements of southern Oregon were transferred from boats to pack horses. It was at the mouth of the Umpqua that the Jedediah Smith party was massacred by Indians.

Some Escapes Miraculous

W. J. Kinney, of Hartford, Wis., who at first was reported among those in the east drift, later was found at the surface. He did not go to work on the shift as scheduled, his place having been taken by Patrick Gallagher.

Dan Tranar, skip man working at the bottom of the shaft, was hurled 50 feet by the explosion but was not believed critically hurt.

R. A. Trompoczynski, who was near Tranar, also was badly shaken.

Charles O'Malley, who ascended to the surface just before the explosion, escaped the fate of his co-workers by a hair's breadth. He had barely stepped away from the shaft when the ground quivered from the blast. The shaft belched a column of smoke.

The tunnel in which the blast occurred is one of a score being constructed to bring mountain water from the high Sierra to San Francisco and adjoining communities.

More than 87 miles of such tunnels are provided for in the Hetch Hetchy project which will furnish 400,000,000 gallons of water daily and one billion kilowatt hours of electric power annually.

ROSEBURG WOMAN HEADS AUXILIARY

Kirkendall of Baker was elected senior vice-commander, George H. Carr, Portland, will serve as junior vice-commander and James Robinson, Portland, adjutant.

The closing of the Spanish War Veterans' assembly marked the opening today of the tenth encampment of Veterans of Foreign Wars. Hundreds of United Spanish war veterans who are also members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars organization are remaining for the second meeting.

Mrs. Clara Starmer of Roseburg, wife of Samuel Starmer, commander of the soldiers' home, was elected president of the Spanish War Veterans' auxiliary.

LIMIT ON TREATY ARGUMENTS SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, July 17.—A petition seeking the closure rule to shut off debate on the London naval treaty was circulated in the senate today by Senator Watson, the republican leader, after Senator Johnson, republican, California, had refused to enter any agreement for a limitation of debate beginning Tuesday.

The necessary 16 names were quickly enrolled. Watson had expressed confidence that the necessary two thirds majority could be obtained to invoke the rule, although some of the treaty advocates are opposed to the closure.

If introduced today, the petition would be automatically voted upon Saturday. If adopted, each senator would be limited to one hour of debate thereafter.

MASTER OF DEATH SHIP TO ANSWER

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Charges of reckless navigation, negligence and navigating at excessive speed in fog have been filed by federal steamboat inspectors at Boston against Captain Archie H. Brooks, master of the steamer Fairfax, which collided with the tanker Pine this off the Massachusetts coast June 10 with the loss of 49 lives.

ESCAPED DOUGLAS PRISONER CAUGHT

Milton Anthony, who escaped from the Douglas county prison road crew last November, was arrested last Saturday at Mapleton in Lane county, and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, according to word received here today by Sheriff Jackson.

Anthony was arrested in Roseburg in October last year, for possession of liquor and was fined \$300 and given 60 days in jail. He was assigned to the road crew, and while the prisoners were being taken out to work on the morning of November 13, he escaped from the gang. His wife had loaded the automobile with the family belongings, with three loaded guns piled on top. She had trouble starting the car, however, and arrived a few minutes after Anthony had escaped, and the officers seized the car and took her into custody for a couple of days while they searched for the man.

He was later located in California, but was not extradited because of the expense.

A few weeks ago, it is stated he returned with his wife to Oregon and went to Mapleton, where he was apprehended with a companion while operating a still. He was taken to Eugene and was sentenced to the penitentiary for two years.

He still has the uncompleted portion of his sentence hanging over him in this county, and if the amount of the fine is not paid, he will have six months and four days to serve.

Sheriff Jackson is notifying the prison officers that Anthony is wanted here when he completes the pen term.

HEAT WAVE KILLS THREE IN CALIF.

LOS ANGELES, July 17.—With three victims dead from the higher than 100 degree temperatures which have baked southern California for the past four days, little relief was promised today.

John Smith, 55, of San Diego, died in El Centro, in the Imperial valley, after having been overcome while riding in a bus. John Cennarons, of Sacramento, and G. S. Lompert, Plaster City section had, succumbing to 111 degree temperatures near El Centro Tuesday.

Yesterday's high mark was at Brawley 112 degrees. At Calexico, on the Mexican border, where 118 degrees was recorded Tuesday, a comparatively cool breeze moved the mercury down to 101.
