

POULTRYMEN WILL ATTEND MEETING

Considerable local interest is being shown in the eighth annual Oregon poultrymen's convention, which is to be held at Oregon State college, July 23 and 24. The new demonstration poultry plant, consisting of six buildings, is now complete and will be inspected by the visitors. Another new house provides for a laboratory for studying poultry diseases with a large number of birds. Exhibits will include a battery of broilers, electrical poultry equipment, a model 16-acre poultry farm, disease control methods and good and poor type birds in a culling exhibit.

Special demonstrations have been arranged to cover the new tattoo method of branding birds, canning and weed killing under wire screen runs. A two day program of practical discussion of modern poultry problems and methods has been prepared as follows:

BIG GERMAN STEAMER SINKS
 All Passengers Rescued by British Liner as Boat Burns and Goes Down in Mid-Atlantic

LONDON, July 18.—The British steamer Rangitata radioed to the Porthead wireless station today that she had rescued all passengers and crew of the German steamer Targis, which burned and sank at about midnight in latitude 36:54 north longitude 59:07 west.

The first message from the Rangitata came at 11:14 p. m. Thursday, and announced half the crew and all passengers of the Targis, bound from Valparaiso to Antwerp and Hamburg, had been picked up by the Rangitata. The Targis was said to be burning in No. 1, 2, and 3 holds.

Seven minutes later another message said the Targis holds had burned through to the boiler and engine room, the vessel was filling with water and in a sinking condition.

The last radioed message said all passengers and crew were aboard the Rangitata, which was standing by at the request of the master of the Targis, watching the vessel sink.

The position given was about 1,500 miles east of New York in mid-Atlantic.

The Targis, a ship of 3,537 tons, left Colon, enroute to Hamburg from Valparaiso, Chile, July 7.

The Rangitata, of 10,315 tons, left Colon, enroute from Wellington, New Zealand, July 10.

The Targis is a North German Lloyd ship. The Rangitata is owned by the Federal Steam Navigation company, Ltd., a British concern.

The Targis was a freighter and carried a crew of 40 hands.

A representative of the North German Lloyd line in New York said there were accommodations for not more than ten passengers and she probably had aboard not more than three or four.
