AGED TURK SAYS HE LIKES PLUMP BRUNETTES BEST

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 18.—Azaro Agha, who says he is 156 years old, and the first 100 years were the easiest, landed here from Turkey today to get himself a set of false teeth and, for a consideration, to let American scientists have a look at him.

The date of his birth, as given on his passport, was February 16, 1774, and this was based, said his great great grandson, Ahmet Musa, who accompanied him, on an actual record in the possession of the Turkish government.

Yellow and wrinkled, with a hawk-like nose, bristling grey moustache, and lively, curious eyes, weirdly alive in their deep, sunken sockets, Zaro Agha sat in the sun on the deck of the steamer Shima and talked of wars and women, and the third set of teeth that he grew at the age of 105.

Agha indignantly denied a report he had divorced his eleventh wife to marry the present Mrs. Agha—“She's young, only 65”—who waits for him in Istanbul.

“Me?” I never divorced any of my wives,” he grunted. “I got along with them all, very nice, and they all died.”

“Now women—I always am interested in them. I like them brunettes best and plump.”

Agha again today said he had never tasted alcohol in his life. Nor tobacco. He lives, he said, mostly on vegetables and sweets.

RUNS FROM CRIME HE DIDN'T CAUSE

NEW YORK, July 18.—Police of New York and Chicago are engaged in a manhunt that is different.

If they find Joe Ferri, 42, of Rosebank, Staten Island, they will arrest him. He has committed no crime and will urge him to go back to his family.

Ferri, a night watchman at a building in course of construction, was busy filling the little red danger lamps in front one night when he heard a scream within. On the floor he found the crumpled body of a young boy, who sneaking into the building with his playmates, had fallen through the steel frame of the second floor.

Nobody accused Ferri. But that night he quit his job. For 12 days he stayed home debating with himself his responsibility and waiting for the police to come after him. Finally, on June 30, he kissed his family goodbye and went to Chicago to escape the “disgrace.”

His wife, fearful he might take his own life, asked police to send him home.

THE MONARCH OF GOLF

Bobby Jones returns to America as the undisputed monarch of the world-wide empire of golf. He takes home to share the Jones' mantle in America the winner's trophies of the British amateur and British open championships—events which attract a larger number at the world's greatest golfers than any other championships on the golfing calendar. It is the British open trophy's third trip to Atlanta, but the first trip on which it is accompanied by the British amateur trophy. Forty years ago John Hall of Liverpool won both the amateur and the open titles in the same year. This feat had never been equalled until Bobby won the amateur at St. Andrews and the open at Hoylake this summer.

A long career, unblemished in all the history of golf, has attained a climax which makes Bobby Jones the greatest golfer who ever lived. No monarch of golf was ever more loved, young and unspoiled, he has a knack of arousing such affection that it would seem an outrage of all the deities to think of him as ever being beaten. Even the golf ball—one of the most treasured, most inviolately hostile little objects ever invented—cannot help but like him. His accession to the throne of the empire of golf has not increased his technical reputation as a golfer. Nothing could do that. But it has made his fame higher than ever as a very human man of great courage and character. —Bernard Darwin wireless to the New York Times from London June 29, 1930.

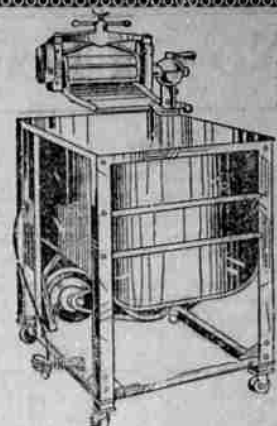

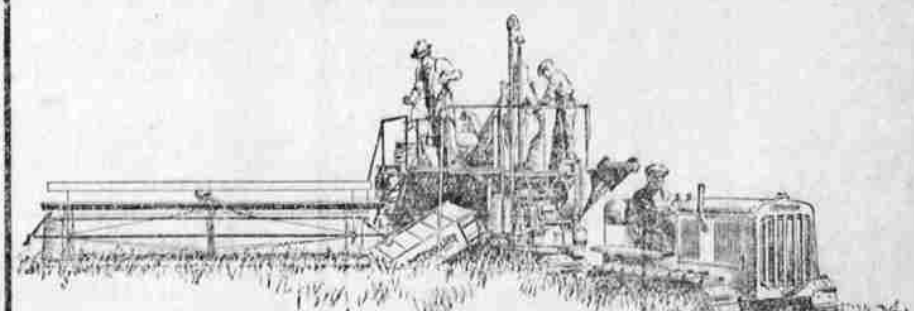
