A seven-month son was born to a Mrs. M. M. Bredley of this city, in the Mercy hospital.



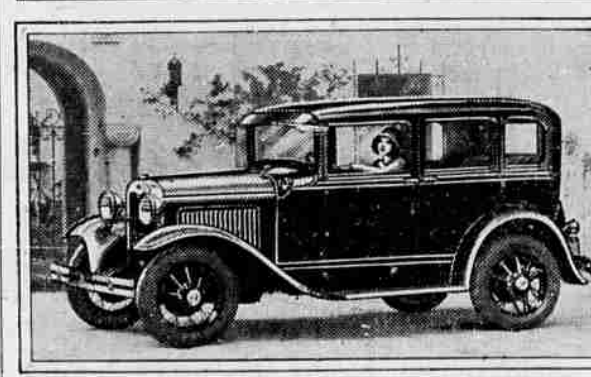

CHECKING TOTAL IN COAST BANKS MAKES BIG GAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—Net worth of checking accounts in leading Pacific coast banks jumped \$32,000,000 in a week, the federal reserve bank here reported today. The total attained July 16 was \$771,000,000.

A year ago the total was only about \$7,000,000 higher.

Other shifts in financial figures for selected cities in the twelfth federal reserve district made possible today included:

A total of \$15,000,000 in loans and investments. Securities loans were up \$13,000,000. Commercial loans were down \$9,000,000; bank investments were up \$11,000,000, of which \$8,000,000 went into federal government securities and \$3,000,000 into other securities.

Time deposits, including savings accounts, dropped \$6,000,000, to \$1,995,000,000, which was \$25,000,000 above the corresponding figure for last year.

There were no borrowings from the federal reserve bank here, in contrast with borrowings of \$33,000,000 a year ago.

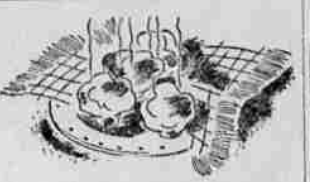
