

EUGENE WALLOPS ROSEBURG, 12 TO 7, IN LEAGUE GAME

Roseburg was eliminated from the state junior league baseball contest Saturday when the Eugene team won an exciting game 12 to 7. The Lane county team took a lead in the first inning when Scouts went to first on an error and Merce followed with a home run. The margin gained in the first inning was maintained throughout the entire contest.

Eugene ran in five more runs in the third on a combination of five hits and an error and secured four more in the sixth on six hits and three errors, including one "home-head" play which let in two runs. In the fifth inning the score was 7 to 5, and the Douglas county fans were pulling hard for the needed runs to tie the score, but the Eugene rally in the sixth ended the hopes of the locals.

Smith opened on the mound for Roseburg and pitched a good game, but was given poor support by the batters. He pitched and also twirled fast ball, but lacked support from the rest of the team. Brewer pitched the first five innings for Eugene and was relieved in the sixth by Williams, whose fast pitching proved too much for the Douglas county team.

Eugene secured 18 hits and Roseburg 8. The visitors made 4 errors and the locals 5.

As a result of this contest Eugene plays Silverton in the state semi-finals, the winner to go to Portland to participate in the state championship games.

2 JAILED AFTER ASSAULTING COP

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Henry Wilson, 22, of Portland, Minn., and Arthur Bastran, 29, of St. Paul, were held in jail here today while out bond after White struck a policeman with a machine gun and was shot in the leg by the officer. They were arrested last night after a chase through the business district, both were charged with assault with a dangerous weapon.

C. W. Davis, the policeman, nailed the pair to question them on a vagrancy charge and said Bastran threatened him with a revolver. When he attempted to arrest them White struck him.

Bastran said he and White robbed several stores at Wyoming and a number of fishing stations between that state and Oregon. Their automobile was stolen in Casper, Wyo., he admitted.

The two escaped from a jail at Detroit Lakes, Minn., last Tuesday.

OREGON RANGES IN GOOD CONDITION

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Although there is a deficiency in moisture, summer and fall ranges are fair and condition of livestock is generally good. This is the report of the federal state crop reporting service, released today. The range condition of July 1 shows a slight decline from last month. The hay crop promises to be smaller than last year. The report says a shortage of stock water is anticipated by stockmen, and irrigation water and reserve moisture supply is less than usual.

"Oregon cattle are generally in good condition throughout the state," the report said. "But conditions have been favorable for the growth of calves." Losses of cattle during 1930 have been slight.

The bureau said the Washington supply of calves is a little short. Idaho cattle are in good flesh and a good calf crop is in prospect.

The condition of Oregon sheep appears above average. Lambs are making good growth and losses of lambs have been lighter than in past years.

KAY COUNTING ON EASTERN OREGON

SALEM, Ore., July 21.—Eastern Oregon members of the republican state central committee will not vote as a unit when the committee meets in Portland next Friday to nominate a candidate for governor to take the place of the late George W. Joseph. State Treasurer T. B. Kay, candidate for the nomination, said today after returning from that part of the state.

"I expect to see a scattered vote from the eastern members in the early balloting," Kay said. "But after they have cast their ballots for certain eastern Oregonians as a matter of local loyalty I feel sure that they will center on me."
"I was well received everywhere and the trip was very satisfactory," Kay said. "Many expressed surprise at my good health having ridden the mountains that I saw an invalid. I played golf on a number of courses during the trip."

Mrs. Edison traces the decline of the American home to trends that started with woman suffrage and the World War. She blames the widespread restlessness of today on the dwindling of the nest-building instinct.

The wife of the distinguished creator of the incandescent lamp and a thousand other inventions might have pointed to her own life as an example of how a woman's devotion to domesticity can help the male bread-winner.

She Aided Inventor
Scores of times Edison has publicly declared that without his wife's help and encouragement he might not have accomplished half that he did. In the Edison home at East Orange, N. J., harmony and peace has reigned throughout the couple's forty-four years of marriage.

Young Atlantan Lawyer Seeks World's Golf Crown

American Open Championship Crown Now Remains Sole Honor in Golfdom for Bobby Jones.



New York Welcomes Champion - Jones in Action

MINNEAPOLIS, July 21.—Fresh from his amazing triumphs abroad, Bobby Jones, that chubby-faced Napoleon of the links, is here to make a bid for the American open championship.

Not content with lifting every golfing crown in Great Britain, the brilliant Atlantan—hailed the world over as the greatest golf club wielder of all time—has hastened here to prove his supremacy over all comers.

Met by a welcoming delegation of local sportsmen and city officials, Jones greeted his hosts with the same modesty and youthful charm that has made him the idol of athletic enthusiasts the world over. The famous tournament started on July 10.

Bobby Jones is the third Georgian to become an outstanding figure in the sphere of sport. Ty Cobb, that king of the diamond, was the first native of Georgia to carve a niche for himself in the athletic hall of fame. Young Strickling, the brilliant heavyweight boxer, completes the trio.

Robert Tyre Jones, 24, is the first man in golfing history to hold three major links titles at the same time—British open, British amateur and American open. The last of these was won in last year's tourney.

Although he is still a youngster, Bobby has held either the open or amateur championship each year since 1923. That year and in 1926 and 1929 he won the amateur crown. In 1924, 1925, 1927 and 1928, he was acclaimed the peer of all American rivals.

Though he has been flooded with professional offers since first achieving golfing eminence, Bobby has steadfastly refused to be lured away from the "farm-pure" ranks. Although not wealthy in his own right, Jones makes a comfortable living as a lawyer.

A vast change has come over the Georgian since his boyhood victories. He was given to fits of temperment, but today he has quieted down and devotes himself during matches in concentrating on his unbeatatable grand of golf. He wins by playing the golf course instead of his opponent.
