IRATE MAN SLAYS TWO AND HIMSELF

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WILKES BARRRE, Pa., July 21.—An enraged caretaker of a Lehman heights estate, near here, shot his employer and a deputy sheriff to death, wounded two other persons and then took his own life when cornered by a posse yesterday. Those killed by Paul Sholpa were Harry D. Sordoni, of Kings-ton, owner of the estate, and John T. Ruth, chief of police of Harvey's Lake and deputy sheriff of Luzerne county. Sordoni's 17-year-old daughter, Frieda, was shot in both arms and his son, Francis, 25, was wounded in the right hip and leg. The shooting began when Mr. and Mrs. Sordoni, their daughters, Frieda and Florence, and their son, Francis, arrived at the Sordoni estate Saturday night to spend the week-end. They were unloading packages from their motor car when Skopka opened fire with a double-barreled shotgun. The elder Sordoni fell mortally wounded. Francis was struck down by another volley he went to his father's assistance and Frieda was shot when she leaped into an automobile and started for aid. Despite the wounds, the girl sped to the home of a physician who notified the police.

MOONEY WITNESS BRIDGE WORKER DROPS TO DEATH

McDonald has again declared that he perjured himself on the stand when he identified Mooney and Billings as the men who planted the bomb.

GLENDALE WATER USERS CAUTIONED

(News-Review Douglas County Special) GLENDALE, July 19.—Unless water users in Glendale within the next few days voluntarily restrict the amount of water used for sprinkling and irrigating purposes it will be soon necessary for the city officials to issue orders restricting sprinkling, according to statement made by J. H. Brown, mayor, Friday afternoon. The impression has been out that Glendale now has unlimited water and the result is that many water users are letting water run day and night on their gardens and lawns. The fact is that while Glendale has sufficient water at present for all ordinary uses, the amount of water now being used is greater than the supply and the reservoirs are being drawn on to take care of the increased demand. If the people here will be conservative with the use of the city water said Mayor Brown, and prevent its waste there will be no need of placing any drastic restrictions on sprinkling at this time, otherwise rates for restricted sprinkling will be placed in effect.
