MURDER FOLLOWS ELECTION IN DETROIT

"WEEK-END heat attack takes 25 lives in western Pennsylvania and West Virginia." So runs one of the current contributions to the eastern heat wave story.
Take that with a grain of salt. What it really means is that 25 people died while it was hot. How many of them would have died anyway, heat or no heat, remains unsaid. BECAUSE UNKNOWN.

HERE is another one:
"Believed temporarily crazed by the heat, Fred C. Brandel, aged 40, of Detroit, Mich., today attacked his wife and three children with a hammer and an ice pick and then tried to end his own life by hanging."
If he hadn't been crazed by the heat, he would have been crazed by something else. Shallow brain pans like his are easily tipped over.

MRS. CLAUD WILLIAMS, of Washington, D. C., aged 55, arrested for shooting her husband, blames the hot weather, along with a QUARREL, for her action.
If she would blame her own hot temper she would be nearer the truth. But, of course, after one has just shot one's husband one isn't interested so much in the exact truth, as in a GOOD EXCUSE that might have some weight with a jury.

IT'S plenty hot back East, to be sure. It's ALWAYS plenty hot back there in the summer. But, somehow or other, people manage to endure it, perhaps because they don't KNOW ANY BETTER.
If they really knew better, there wouldn't be room enough in Oregon for all the people who would want to live here.

BUT don't get the idea that if these people of whom we read in the newspapers, who do silly or crazy or CRIMINAL things and then blame it on the heat, should come out here to pleasant Oregon they would immediately become model citizens and an example for others to pattern by.
The reason they do silly or crazy or criminal things is because they are silly or crazy or criminal by nature, and NOT because of the heat.

HERE in Oregon, SO FAR, only politics is hot.

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

TWO SAVED FROM FIRE
PORTLAND, Ore., July 23.—Sleeping soundly while flames and smoke swept around them in their room in a Sandy boulevard apartment, E. A. Wade and A. L. Beilhelm were rescued this morning by neighbors who broke into the house.
Damage to the apartment and to a barber and beauty shop underneath was estimated at \$2,000.

FIRE DESTROYS SAWMILL
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 23.—Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the Anderson and Middleton 100,000 foot capacity sawmill here yesterday. The loss, partly covered by insurance, was estimated between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

DEATH HITS UNTIMELY BLOW
SALEM, Ore., July 23.—An hour and a half before the time set for his son's funeral David A. Harris, 73, dropped dead at his home at Richey, near here, yesterday afternoon. The son, Frank Harris, died in the veterans' hospital at Walla Walla.

Over 530 Perish In Italian Earthquakes

HUNDREDS OF OTHERS SAID GRAVELY HURT

Area Around Naples Bears Brunt of Shocks; City Lighting Cut Off, Panic Ensues.

Government Agencies Rush Relief Work—German Bridge Collapse Is Fatal to Many.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NAPLES, Italy, July 23.—At least 530 persons were killed, with the likelihood further victims will be found, in three sharp earthquakes which shook southern Italy early today.

Several hundred persons were injured and relief measures were immediately got under way by the government.

Although the known dead was placed at 530, there was a probability the list would be increased as ruined buildings were explored.

Frigh Alone Kills
It was reported the number of deaths from fright in Naples alone were more than fifty.

As the work of rescue went on it was believed the number of dead might reach 500 and at least another 100 more would be seriously injured.

The violence of the three fatal shocks was grade seven on the Mercalli scale. It was indicated by the calculations of seismographers if it had reached grade ten on the same scale the whole city of Naples would have been destroyed.

Up to two o'clock this afternoon, the United States consulate had no notice of any American victims in Naples or any of the nearby resorts on the famous bay. At Sorrento, which is a popular stopping place of American tourists, two natives were killed by a cave-in. Five deaths were reported in the nearby countryside.

IOWA DEMOCRATS ASSAIL DRY LAW

DES MOINES, July 23.—Iowa democrats will enter the fall campaign with a platform advocating state regulation of the sale of liquor, declaring for a referendum on the eighteenth amendment and opposing a state income tax.

They adopted these planks at a platform which assailed the new tariff bill, urged repeal of the primary election system, and condemned the republicans' efforts at farm relief.

The resolution on prohibition favored a law defining intoxicating beverages "according to a reasonable non-intoxicating standard of alcoholic content," and giving the states power to make their own statutes for forbidding or restricting sale of liquor under the new standard.

Dry Cops Use No Brains and Draw Lay-Off

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 23.—Amos W. W. Woodcock, prohibition director, today instructed prohibition agents to use "brains" instead of force in dry law work.

At the same time he announced suspension of two agents for searching the automobile of E. G. Duncan, Maryland road commission engineer. The officers Charles R. McCartney and John T. Weigel, were laid off three days without pay.

They also were charged by Duncan with firing on his car on the night of July 16. Woodcock said investigation failed to show this to be true.

"I did not suspend the men for using weapons but suspended them for searching the car of a citizen without probable cause," he added.
"Our plan in enforcing the important and serious problems of prohibition is to do it properly and I am trying to teach prohibition agents to use their brains instead of other things."

FIREBUG BLAMED FOR WOODS BLAZES

Incendiarism is blamed for eleven forest fires reported late yesterday afternoon by the Douglas fire patrol, one string being located on the South Myrtle-Days Creek divide and the other on the divide between Council and Catching creeks, two miles southwest of Riddle. All of the fires were extinguished before any great amount of damage was done.

Six fires were set out in the South Myrtle creek district, where the fire patrol has had a great deal of trouble with incendiarism in past years. The fires were strung out for a distance of about a mile along the top of the divide, two being on the Days creek slope. They were spotted by the lookouts within a very short time after they started, and were extinguished before reaching any great size. They had burned together into three fires by the time the crews arrived on the scene, but the total area burned over was less than three acres. It was reported this morning. All of the fires were under control last night.

Five fires were set out southwest of Riddle, all in a distance of about a half mile. They too were caught early and extinguished without difficulty, the total area burned being about two acres.

O. C. Houser, central dispatcher for the forest service, reports that there are no fires on the national reserve. There have been several lightning fires this year, but none of any consequence and none are burning at this time.

MAN SUICIDES TO END ESTATE WORRY

PORTLAND, July 23.—Kenneth Barker, 27, died instantly this morning when he shot himself in the head with a shotgun at the home of his mother.
Relatives said Barker had been brooding over difficulties growing out of management of a large estate at Condon, Ore.

WILLIAM HOSSACK OF COUNTY HOME DIES

William Hossack, a resident of the county home for the past ten years, passed away this morning at the age of 68 years. He has no known relatives. The body was taken to the Roseburg Undertaking parlors and funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in the chapel with interment in the county cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of M. E. Ritter.

SPORTSMEN OF 11 STATES DATED HERE

Members of Western Fish and Game Association to Convene July 28 in Roseburg.

Conservation of Wild Life and Uniform Statutes Among Matters on Program.

The third annual convention of the Western Fish and Game association, representing more than two hundred thousand sportsmen in the eleven western states, will be held in Roseburg next Monday, July 28.

Charles A. Lockwood of Roseburg is president of the association, having been elected head of the organization at the meeting held last year in San Francisco. The convention is to be held at the Umpqua hotel, and will be attended by a large group of outstanding sportsmen from the states represented in this organization, which is devoted to protection and conservation of the fish and game life of this section of the country.

The Western Fish and Game association is the link between the several state organizations and the American Fish and Game association, which is the national group representing the interests of all states. The western association, which includes the various states having mutual interests, takes in the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia.

To Outline Program
The officers and directors are expected to arrive in Roseburg Sunday night for a pre-convention caucus, at which time the tentative program will be submitted and the definite schedule outlined for the Monday meeting. The resolutions committee will meet early Monday morning and will go over the various proposals submitted by the delegates representing the various state associations included in the western organization, and will arrange the various discussions.

FIRE TAKES SHED, HOUSE AND SHEEP

A house and sheep shed and sixteen head of sheep, belonging to Arthur Richardson of Myrtle Creek, were destroyed by fire Saturday or Sunday. The fire being believed by Mr. Richardson to be of incendiary origin. The property is located on Kent creek, the last place on the upper Kent creek road, west from Dillard. Mr. Richardson, who lives at Myrtle Creek, visits the farm at intervals, and was there on Saturday of last week, finding everything in order. He returned Monday and found the ruins of the buildings and carcasses of the sheep. Due to the distance of the shed from the house and the location of the two buildings, it is his belief that a fire was deliberately set. Two barns on the place were not destroyed. Deputy Sheriff George Dietrich made an investigation yesterday, but could find nothing to prove incendiarism, although it is possible, he states, that the buildings were fired maliciously.

U. S. FAMILY NEAR 123 MILLION MARK

WASHINGTON, July 23.—When the census bureau totals up the population of the nation for 1930, a figure somewhat less than 123,000,000 is expected to be the result.
On the basis of preliminary returns from 49 states and the District of Columbia, the Associated Press has calculated the population at 122,557,000 people.

Enumerators reported for those states a total of 100,577,722 as compared with \$6,667,858 ten years ago, an increase of 14,139,455 or 16.11 per cent.
Applying this rate of increase to the country as a whole, the estimated total was reached. Should final returns bear it out, the figure would represent an increase of 17,246,000 for the last decade.

Reports have still to be received from eight states.

DEATH TAKES NOTED FIGURE OF AVIATION

Glenn Curtiss, Pioneer in Aeronautical Industry, Expires in Buffalo Hospital, Aged 52.

Fame, First Won as Racer on Bicycle, Enlarged by Motor Making for Aerial Craft.

BUFFALO, July 23.—Glenn H. Curtiss, 52, widely known aviation pioneer, died this morning in the General Hospital here.

Mr. Curtiss was brought to the hospital several days ago from his home at Hammondsport, N. Y., to undergo an operation for appendicitis. The operation was said to have been successful and he was reported recovering rapidly.

Hospital authorities stated death was due to pulmonary embolism, caused by a blood clot on one of the main arteries leading out of the heart.

Began in Bicycle Shop

NEW YORK, July 23.—Glenn H. Curtiss returned the young science of aviation in the middle years of its development when his fainter hearts had grown discouraged.
His native town of Hammondsport, New York, where he was born on May 21, 1878, is now called by the chamber of commerce "the cradle of aviation" because of that Curtiss and his associates did there.

At the age of 16 he started a bicycle shop, as did those other pioneers of American aviation—the Wright brothers—and from that went into bicycle racing. He sought some means to make them go faster but there were no engines that would meet the demand and so Curtiss decided to make one.

With a tomato can for a carburetor, he built his first motor bicycle in 1901. He continued to experiment with light weight motors and evolved his famous V-type motor, a departure in design reflected in

LOS ANGELES, July 23.—Dolores Del Rio, Mexican film actress, was charged today with wrecking the marital life of Gunther R. Lessing, prominent attorney, by influencing Mrs. Loula C. Lessing to turn against him. The charges were made in an amended answer filed by Lessing in his wife's divorce suit.

NEGRO SLAYERS SOUGHT BY POSSE

MARSHALL, Tex., July 23.—An armed posse combed the country side around Greenwood, La., east of here today in search of two negroes who shot and killed C. J. Mason, 40, Greenwood merchant and fled after robbing his wife.
The negroes shot Mason to death in his store when he refused to open his cash register for them. Sheriff T. R. Hughes of Caddo Parish at Shreveport said early today from 500 to 600 men were engaged in the search and that there was "no telling what would happen if the negroes are caught."

"Chimp" Glands Hailed Man's Boon



Old men become young and frisky again and young men grow taller and healthier when grafted with the glands of a chimpanzee, according to Dr. Serge Voronoff of Paris, father of "monkey gland" rejuvenation. Dr. Voronoff, who arrived in San Francisco this week, believes the time is coming when every man passing the halcyon mark will feel the urge for rejuvenation.

BIG SEVEN LEASES EDENBOWER PLANT

The Big 7 Fruit Warehouses, Inc., one of the largest organizations handling and shipping fresh fruits, has completed negotiations for a lease on the Edenbower plant of the Umpqua Growers association, and has started work of installing machinery for taking care of this year's apple and pear crop, contracts having been signed with the majority of growers of the county, so that this firm will handle the bulk of the crop of the Umpqua valley.

A. D. Clements, a representative of the company, will arrive here Monday, July 28, to remain during the summer in charge of operations in this district and will be able to advise growers regarding any matters pertaining to this year's plant.

The Big 7 company is operating on a very large scale in Medford, and has predicted that the Umpqua valley is to be developed in a very large way from the horticultural standpoint, particularly as to late pears and Bartlett's.

PAROLE GRANTED FOR AUTO TAKING

Adrian Hausman, 21, of Reedport, was yesterday sentenced to two months in the county jail, but given a parole after pleading guilty to a charge of taking and using an automobile without authority from the owner, but with no intent to steal. Hausman, according to his statements, understood that a car belonging to Harry Ansama was for sale and he took the car from the owner's garage, without authority to try it out, as he desired to buy it. When he returned the car he was placed under arrest. In view of the circumstances Judge Hamilton granted the young man a parole from the light sentence imposed.

BLAST KILLS TOTS; FATHER SUSPECTED

BARNESBORO, Pa., July 23.—Two children were killed and the mother injured today in the explosion of a charge of dynamite believed set by the father of the children as a result of differences with his wife.
The explosion demolished the front of the home in which Mrs. K. Terry Langham and her four children were living at Emigh Run, near here, after separating from Langham. Two of the children escaped injury. Those killed were a boy, one year old, and a girl five years old.
Police search for Langham was instituted after officers were told of differences he had had with his wife, and that he had been seen near the home shortly before the explosion.

MRS. SUSAN ROHRER DIES IN 74TH YEAR

Mrs. Susan Rohrer, mother of Mrs. A. K. Gibbs and Mrs. Hazel Pennie of this city, died last night at the Pennie home on Harrison avenue after a long illness. Mrs. Rohrer was born in Canton, Ohio, August 31, 1855, and was almost 75 years of age. She was married to Joseph Rohrer and was the mother of nine children. Mrs. Edith Tilton, R. M. Rohrer, Mrs. Jeanette Rubin, Joseph W. Rohrer, Frank, John, and Lulu S. Rohrer, all of Canton, Ohio, and the two daughters in Roseburg.

Mrs. Rohrer and her husband came to Roseburg for a visit in 1926 and in October of that year her husband was lost while on a hunting trip in the Strader burn district. His body was never found. The widow remained in this city with her daughters.

Her health gradually failed until she became completely invalid several years ago. Her daughter, Lulu, has been here for the past two years assisting in caring for her.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking parlors and is being prepared for shipment to Canton, Ohio, for interment. Miss Rohrer will accompany the body on train No. 14 tonight.

PRO-RECALL RADIO TALKER SHOT DOWN

Jerry Buckley Riddled by Three Men as He Sits in Lobby of Hotel; Killers Escape.

Mayor Bowles, in Office 6 Months, Voted Out by 31,000; Accused of Law Laxity.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
DETROIT, July 23.—A reward of \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of the killers of Jerry Buckley, Detroit radio announcer, and three "back of the killing who instigated it" was posted today by the city council. A similar sum is expected to be offered by the county.

After offering its reward the city council served notice through a resolution of Police Commissioner Thomas C. Wilcox that it will demand reinstatement, at least in an advisory capacity of police executives, who were placed on the retired list soon after Mayor Bowles took office.

DETROIT, July 23.—Gerald E. "Jerry" Buckley, announcer for radio station WMBC, was shot and killed by three men in the lobby of the La Salle hotel at 1:50 a. m. today, two and a half hours after he had talked over the radio. Buckley had taken an active part in the successful campaign to recall Mayor Charles Bowles. His last announcement was a statement that the mayor had been recalled in yesterday's election. Buckley had been an opponent of the mayor.

Paul Buckley, former assistant prosecutor of Wayne county and brother of the slain man, said Gerald had been threatened because of his activities in favor of the recall.

"There is no doubt but Jerry's activities in the recall movement, and the turn in the recall election was the sole reason for the shooting," he said.

Shot From Behind
Gerald Buckley was sitting in the lobby of the hotel when three men entered, approached him from behind and fired eleven bullets into his body at close range. SIX bullets entered the back of his head all within an area of four inches. He was shot in the neck, arm, leg and foot.

Jack Klein, motion picture operator, was sitting in a chair beside Buckley. He said he ran when the shooting started. He could not describe the assassins. After killing Buckley, the three gunmen ran out of the hotel, entered a car and drove away.

W. Wright Gedge, secretary of the Michigan Broadcasting company, WMBC, said Buckley told him he had been threatened because of his activities for the recall.

Foe of Underworld
Buckley had been announcing over station WMBC for the past two years. He had aroused the underworld by his bitter attacks on gambling, which were of considerable influence in bringing about the recall movement.

He was said to have been a witness of the slaying of George Collins and William Cannon, Chicago

NORBLAD ASKS AID IN LIVESTOCK WAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
SALEM, Ore., July 23.—In an effort to get access to water for livestock in the Warrenton district of Lake county, and to avert bloodshed which it is feared may result from the cattle war now being waged in that district Governor Norblad today sent telegraphic requests to President Hoover and to Commissioner General C. C. Moore of the federal land office urging immediate action.

The governor acted after a conference with representatives for the Oregon Humane society. Telegrams received from livestock raisers say cattle are dying for want of water, which they are unable to reach. It is said because Frank Dobbin has filed on 16 "forties" of land entirely surrounding the water holes, the only sources for stock watering in a wide area of eastern country. It is reported that Dobbin has armed guards patrolling his fences and that the distressed cattle owners are arming their men.
