

ECKERSON FORCED DOWN IN MONTANA

BUTTE, Mont., July 23.—Major Gilbert H. Eckerson, flying from Portland, Ore., to New York, crashed last night in the mountain country 35 miles southeast of here. Major Eckerson was not seriously hurt, so far as could be learned by telephone communication with a nearby ranch. He is being brought to a hospital here after emergency treatment.

The plane was demolished. The engine was found 60 feet from the fuselage.

The cause of the forced landing was not known.

The morning program will end at 11:30 and will be followed by a noon luncheon, after which the convention will act upon the issues presented by the resolutions committee.

A large number of the sportsmen who will attend will remain in Roseburg for several days to fish the North Umpqua river. President Lockwood has extended personal invitations to each of the visiting delegates to fish the river.

The officers of the association besides Mr. Lockwood are Earl Price, Seattle, first vice-president; J. G. Exley, San Francisco, second vice-president; M. M. Hogan, Medford, secretary.

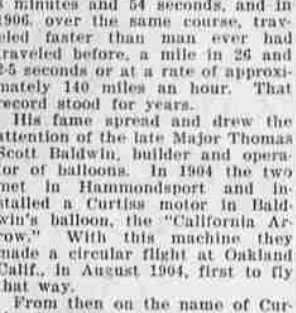

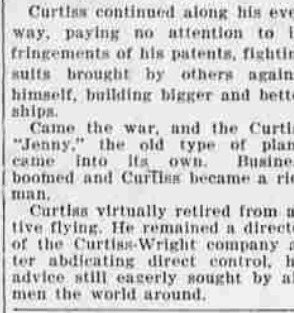

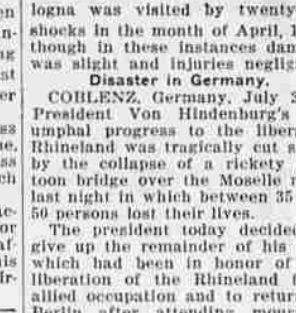

Had First Hydroplane

Curtiss worked and labored, tested, tore up, built anew. In 1911 he established a camp at North Island, near San Diego, Calif., and with Lieut. Eliason of the navy and Captain Beck of the army set out to master taking-off from the water. He succeeded and had America's first hydroplane.

In the meantime he had won the Scientific American trophy for 1909 and in 1910 he took it out of competition. The winning flight in 1910 was a two-stop flight from Albany to Governor's Island, New York for an additional prize of \$10,000 offered by the New York World, a flight he re-traced this summer in a multi-motored transport plane, the Curtiss Condor,

manufactured by the company that bears his name.

Incessant Builder

Curtiss continued along his even way, paying no attention to infringements of his patents, fighting suits brought by others against himself, building bigger and better ships.

Came the war, and the Curtiss "Jenny," the old type of plane, came into its own. Business boomed and Curtiss became a rich man.

Curtiss virtually retired from active flying. He remained a director of the Curtiss-Wright company after abdicating direct control, his advice still eagerly sought by airmen the world around.

Disaster in Germany.

COBLENZ, Germany, July 23.—President Von Hindenburg's triumphal progress to the liberated Rhineland was tragically cut short by the collapse of a rickety pontoon bridge over the Moselle river last night in which between 35 and 50 persons lost their lives.

The president today decided to give up the remainder of his tour which had been in honor of the liberation of the Rhineland from allied occupation and to return to Berlin after attending mourning services in Coblenz.

Among the victims of the tragedy which took place in the midst of last night's joyous celebrations was a six-year-old American boy, Raymond Lawler, of Akron, Ohio, who was drowned with his aged grandfather whom he was visiting here.

was married and had one child, four years old. He was a graduate of St. Mary's college, St. Mary's, Kas., and Detroit College of Law. He practiced law here and was counsel for the Ford Motor company four years.

Bowles Ousted

DETROIT, July 23.—Mayor Charles Bowles today was the first mayor of a major American city to be recalled from office.

By a majority of 30,956 out of 210,770 votes cast he was recalled from the office he has held for six months in yesterday's special election after a bitter two weeks' campaign.

As a result, Detroit is on the threshold of another municipal election, its third in little more than nine months. Mayor Bowles, who continues in office until his successor is elected and qualified, automatically becomes a candidate for re-election. No other candidates would be required to file nominating petitions signed by voters.

The next election must be held within 30 days after the results of yesterday's balloting have been duly canvassed and certified. Five days are allowed for those formalities.

That the mayor and his supporters are planning a fight to the finish was indicated by the statements of the mayor and his campaign manager, John Gillespie, commissioner of public works.

The mayor said the ten days of campaigning was insufficient to "overcome the prejudice produced by misrepresentation during the last seven months."

Walter H. Carr, chairman of the recall committee, announced his organization is going out of existence with its purpose of "debunking an unfaithful administration" accomplished.

Mayor Bowles, who rose from political obscurity to head of the fourth city in the United States within five years, was elected last November as a reform candidate, with the support of the Anti-Saloon league and similar organizations.

He appointed Harold H. Emmons, prominent attorney and businessman, police commissioner and later made Gillespie commissioner of public works. This latter ap-

pointment was said to have turned many of Mayor Bowles' supporters against him.

The Mayor returned from attending the Kentucky Derby last May to find his police commissioner had authorized a sweeping series of raids on race handbook agencies against which a newspaper crusade had been waged for weeks.

He discharged Emmons.

This precipitated the recall movement with charges he had "tolerated lawlessness" and "fired Emmons for enforcing the law," heading the list of accusations.

Detroit's municipal elections are on a non-partisan basis, and in regular elections there is a primary to reduce the candidates to two, one of whom must have a majority in the final election. In an election to replace a recalled mayor, however, there is no primary. The office, in such a case, goes to the candidate receiving a plurality. Mayor Bowles was elected with a majority of about 8000.

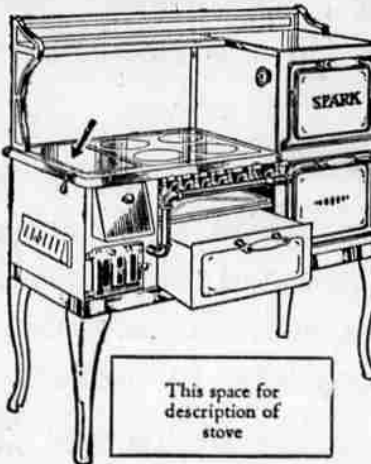
