CHICAGO, July 23.—The Chicago unit of the Shriners' hospital for crippled children yesterday announced a ten-year revival of the Thanksgiving day college football classic here.

CHUCK KLEIN HAS BATTING LAURELS

NEW YORK, July 23.—Chuck Klein, clouting outfielder of the Philadelphia Nationals, has obtained a monopoly on most of the National league's hitting honors. Latest figures show the Quaker star leading the league in batting with an average of .405; in runs with 87; in runs batted in with 103; and in hits with 140.

In addition he is only two home runs behind Mack Wilson, who nets the league pace for the circuit swatters with 29.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 23.—Joe Stecher, Nebraska, former world's heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated Bob Kruse, Portland, here last night, winning the match with falls in the fourth and fifth rounds. Kruse took a fall in the second canto with a reverse wrist lock, after two minutes and one second of grappling.

SALEM, Ore., July 22.—A total of 78 incendiary fires have been reported to the state forestry department from the Williams creek district in Josephine county in the last 10 days. Forty were set in one day, according to State Forester Cronmiller, who returned today from Grants Pass. Most were extinguished with little loss and the others were under control. Grazing interests are blamed for the fires. Hazardous conditions are reported in Coos county, due to short rainfall.

GASOLINE THIEVES ARE JAILED HERE

Ted Meyers and Reynold Anderson are under arrest here for the theft of gasoline from the Fred Schmidt service station at Coos Junction last month. The youths are accused of pumping 30 gallons of gasoline from the station during the night, catching the drum nearby. Anderson was arrested yesterday and fined \$25. Meyers was taken into custody today and has not yet been arraigned.

EUGENE DROPS 1ST OF LEAGUE SERIES

The Eugene junior league baseball team, which defeated Roseburg in the state contest last Saturday, lost the first of a three-game series with Silverton in the state semifinals yesterday by a score of 22 to 12. Both teams are quite strong, and the winner in the three games will play at Portland against either Portland or Bend for the state championship.

ATTERBURY'S BODY SENT TO ROSEBURG

The body of Ivan Atterbury, Roseburg flier, killed recently in Honolulu, in an airplane wreck, is expected to arrive in San Francisco Friday of this week, according to information received by his parents. The body will be brought to Roseburg and funeral arrangements will be made the first of next week; definite dates being uncertain until the time of the arrival of the body is known.

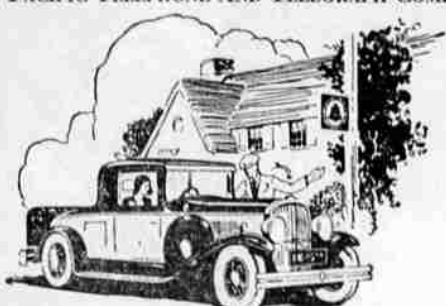
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
