Don't Blow Auto Horn At Roseburg Band Concerts

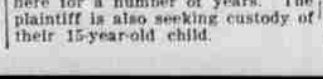
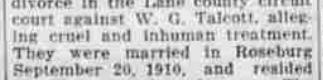
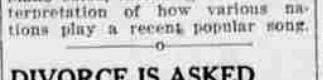
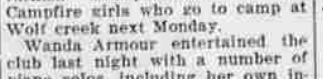
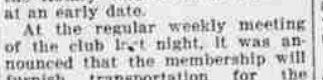
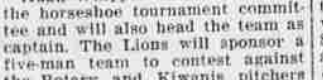
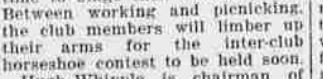
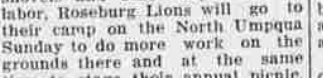
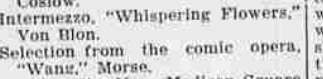
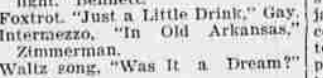
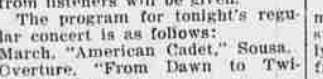
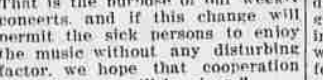
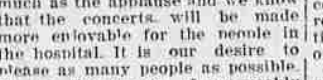
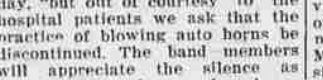
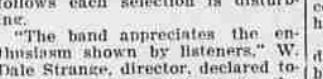
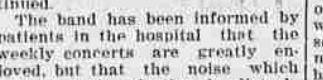
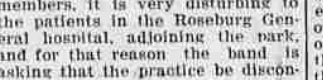
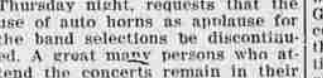
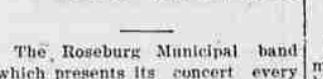

The band has been informed by patients in the hospital that the weekly concerts are greatly enjoyed, but that the noise which follows each selection is disturbing.

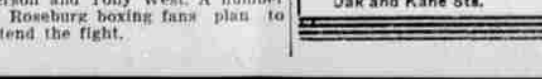
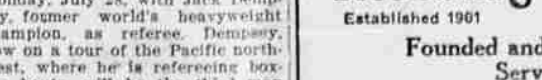
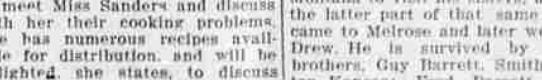
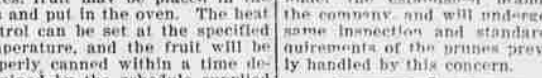
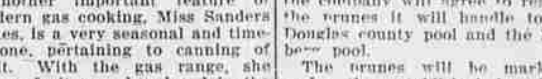
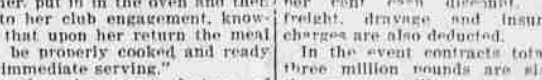
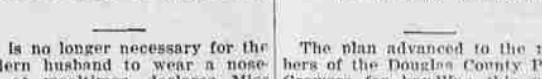
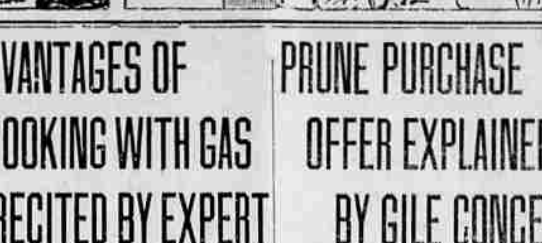
