LEONA, July 24.—The old conveyor, left standing when the Leona mill was destroyed by fire recently, caught fire last Thursday and had considerable headway before the blaze was discovered. Only two men and three boys were available to fight the fire, but the women of the community turned out and assisted and managed to keep the fire from spreading to nearby buildings. The fire fighters were aided by the wind, which blew the sparks away from the docks and buildings. Fire is smoldering under the surface of the sawdust and has broken out twice, threatening lumber docks and houses. The situation is made worse by a shortage of water.

FIBRE FACTORY PROJECTED

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Proposed to establish a factory in Salem for the making of fibre from

STEELHEAD AND BIG TROUT "DOUBLE" TO THRILL ANGLER

Louis Langenberg, stenographer at the office of Attorney R. L. Whipple, reports a very thrilling experience while fishing on the North Umpqua last week-end. Mr. Langenberg, an expert angler, hooked a large steelhead in fast water. The fish put up a hard fight and Mr. Langenberg worked it down into quiet water where he had a better opportunity to land it. He was fishing with two flies, and while the steelhead was fighting in the deep pool, after being caught on the lower hook, a rainbow trout, 16 inches long, struck the upper fly and the fisherman had two big fish on his line, resulting in a wild battle. After fighting for about 30 minutes he had the two fish almost landed, when the leader parted between the bottom hook and the upper loop and he lost the steelhead, but managed to keep the trout.

SUIT FOR \$250,000 TRAILS LINGLE CASE

CHICAGO, July 24.—Robert M. Lee, city editor of the Chicago Tribune, has filed a \$250,000 libel suit asking redress of the Illinois Publishing and Printing company, publishers of the Herald and Examiner, for an article published Tuesday.

The suit was an outgrowth of charges and insinuations which have followed the assassination six weeks ago of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Tribune reporter, who worked under Lee for ten years.

The article in question, reprinted from an editorial in an afternoon paper of the previous day, suggested that Lee, because of his close association with Lingle for a decade, be called before the grand jury to furnish whatever evidence he might have of the dead reporter's activities.

Lee was the author of a signed article in the Tribune recently in which he asserted there had been no suspicion of Lingle's integrity by the city editor's office until after the murder. There had been insinuations, Lee wrote, but never were they accompanied by facts.

VETERAN PITCHERS HAVE BIG DAY IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Whoever was said "You must prevail" probably would be inclined to retract that statement if he should look at the major league box scores these days. The ancients of the pitching brigade have done just about as much prevailing as the youngsters and often in a more convincing manner. Five moundmen whose combined ages total about 200 years were sent out to toil yesterday and while only one pitched a complete game, nearly all turned in good performances. Adolfo Luque, Cuba's leading baseball hero, age 39, did a great job as he made first place in the National league safe for the Brooklyn Robins. Luque held the St. Louis Cardinals to five hits through a trying duel with Sylvester Johnson while Brooklyn slowly gathered enough momentum to win 4 to 1.

The Robins' gain was made possible by their neighbors, the New York Giants, who downed the Chicago Cubs, 8 to 6, to put Brooklyn a full game plus a few odd points in the lead. The pitching in this contest was a matter of numbers rather than skill. Chicago using five hurlers and New York four.

Ancient Jack Quinn of the Philadelphia Athletics, whose years number somewhere near 45, above or below, gave the younger pitchers a lesson. Quinn had a little trouble in the ninth inning and George Earnshaw finished the game for him as the A's downed Detroit, 4 to 1.

Urban "Red" Faber, second in age to Quinn in this quintet, did not figure as a winner or loser for the Chicago White Sox. After holding a 1-0 lead for five frames, Faber weakened and allowed the Boston Red Sox three runs in the sixth. Hal McKain relieved him and got credit for the victory as Chicago rallied again and gained a 5 to 3 decision. Washington came back after three straight defeats and pulled a 10 to 9 victory over the St. Louis Browns in eleven innings.

Another youngster of 27 years, Edna River of Cincinnati, had a bad night and was behind when he was put in to pitch in the eighth. Steve Johnson was credited with the victory as the Reds rallied in the ninth to win the game, 8 to 7 from Boston.

Johnson also was charged with the defeat in the second game

Herb Pennock, the youngster of the quintet, age 36, had a rough time of it against Cleveland and



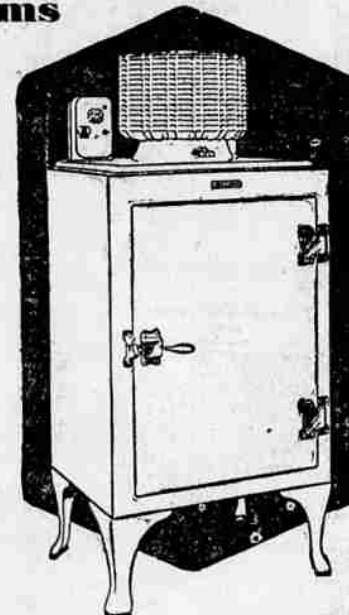
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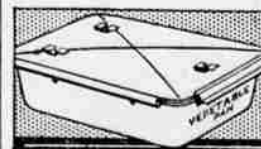
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Pin Money
