Editorials on the Day's News

FOR the first six months of 1930 in the 578 principal cities and towns of the United States, the volume of building permits issued was \$1,039,037,914.
For the first six months of 1929, in these same cities and towns, the volume of building permits issued amounted to \$2,036,334,562.
That is to say, THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY, volume of building permits issued so far this year has declined by 49 per cent from the total of last year.

SPEAKING of city growth, and the influences responsible for it, here is a significant paragraph from the Longview News:
"Work on a new 150-ton sulphite pulp mill to be erected at Longview by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company will start as soon as the plans can be completed. It was announced today. When completed, it will employ some 200 men, and should be in operation by the middle of next year."
"This mill is in addition to the plant contemplated in the announcement from Cloquet, Minnesota, in June."

HERE is the moral to be drawn by EVERYBODY out in this country from this announcement, and others like it:
BIG MONEY isn't afraid of the future here on the north Pacific coast, and is going ahead NOW getting ready for the growth that will take place just as soon as the business cycle turns upward again as INEVITABLY it will.

LAST year the total receipts of the Tillamook County Creamery association were \$1,852,780.19. This compares with receipts of \$400,044.84 in 1909, just 20 years earlier.
That is to say, total receipts of the Tillamook County Creamery association last year were nearly FIVE TIMES the total of receipts two decades ago.

Think what it would mean if the industries of ALL OF OREGON had increased in a similar proportion!
HERE is the secret of the growth of dairying in Tillamook county: Strict standardization and guarantee of quality.

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

HAWLEY PRAISES TARIFF
SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Representative W. C. Hawley, who has returned to his home here, believes relief of the unemployment situation by fall will be one of the early results of the tariff measure. He does not think, however, that unemployment is as serious as reported, and attributes the high unemployment estimate to the census.
"Almost immediate response to the tariff measure was noticed in business conditions throughout the nation," he said. "After the first period of uncertainty due to passage of the bill had passed off business picked up, and will continue to improve as time goes on."

Dark Horse May Win Nomination

STATE G. O. P. COMMITTEE BEGINS WORK

None of Ten Aspirants for Governor Have Pledged Majority; 19 Votes Needed to Win.

Selection Not Looked for Before Saturday P. M.; All Balloting to Be Secret.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—For the first time in Oregon's history, the republican state committee gathered here today to nominate a candidate for governor. This nomination will fill the place left vacant by the death of Senator George W. Joseph, nominated at the May primary election. Senator Joseph died a month after his nomination.

Phil Metschan, chairman of the committee, said he would call the convention to order at 2 p. m. During the morning, however, pre-convention caucuses were held in hotel rooms throughout the city and the merits and qualifications of the ten candidates were discussed.

Those generally credited with wide knowledge of things political in Oregon today confessed complete confusion, and the most prominent republican leaders declined to make any prediction as to the outcome. "The delegates themselves, in general, had a bewildered air. Most of them are unacquainted with one another and until they arrived here had no opportunity for an exchange of views on candidates or anything else."

Ten in the Field

The ten men upon whom political conversation generally settled today were Tom B. Kay, state treasurer; Julius L. Meier, Portland business man; Alfred E. Clark, Portland attorney; Phil Metschan, state chairman republican; and seven others.

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SIX LIVES LOST IN TWO PLANE CRASHES

LOS ANGELES, July 25.—An airplane crash at sunset last night cost the life of one man and probably that of another.

Harry Hastings, passenger, died at the California Lutheran hospital this morning. Peyton Burke, pilot, is reported dying at the Physicians' and Surgeons' hospital. Both lived in Florence, Cal.

The two men took off at Filmore airport, 40 miles north of Los Angeles, for a pleasure flight. The motor stalled when the plane was about 300 feet off the ground, and the craft crashed onto the field.

MEXICO CITY, July 25.—Four military aviators and one civilian were killed here today when two army airplanes were wrecked and fell into Carranza athletic field near Valbuena airport.

One of the planes in its fall hit a man who was playing on a handball court, crushing him to death.

SUSPECTED 'SOCK' BANDIT ARRESTED

McMINNVILLE, Ore., July 25.—Earl Sears, 22, alias Earl Wilson, and Theodore Ralston, 21, alias Jack Edwards, were arrested near Dundee today by H. L. Betts, state traffic officer, charged with theft of an automobile. Local police say they believe Sears is wanted in Portland in connection with the activities of a robber there known as "The Sock."

They were driving a small convertible coupe rented from a Corvallis garage five weeks ago. The Oregon license plates had been taken off and Washington plates attached.

With the two men was Lola Merwin, 17, of Newberg.

Officer Betts arrested them after he had heard a broadcast from the state traffic department.

On Sears police found a large automatic pistol. He also had a brown canvas sack bearing the name of Abraham and Bates bank, and a long leather purse.

PORTLAND, July 25.—Portland's mysterious and elusive gunman and robber, "The Sock," got himself into a jam last night but escaped. He is called "The Sock" because he has collected more than a thousand dollars in robberies in a long, brown sack resembling a woman's stocking.

Last night he entered a grocery store, drew a pistol, subdued the clerk and left with \$25.70. "Thanks," he said as he left the building.

The clerk called Luther Smith, manager. Smith ran to the sidewalk to see "The Sock" get into a small brown roadster in which was a tall dark man with a brown mustache.

A chase followed, Smith in another car.

Two miles out of town the bandit turned into a side road and hid. Smith ignored the gun.

"What do you want," the robber demanded. "My money back," said Smith. "Well, then here it is," and "The Sock" handed over a \$20 bill. "That isn't all," Smith protested, and the pair quibbled over the change.

"Get on back and keep your mouth shut," the bandit ordered, flourishing his gun. Smith "got."

He also got the license number of the car and police were searching for it today.

WET ORGIES BLAMED FOR 2 LONG FALLS

SEATTLE, July 25.—Ralph Kennedy, Portland salesman, plunged from the fifth floor of a hotel to the mezzanine four and a half stories below here last night. Hospital attendants said he received a fractured skull and internal injuries.

Police were told the fall followed an alleged drinking party. Ralph Kennedy, 34, was married.

Armstrong told police Kennedy became intoxicated and started for his room, with Armstrong. When Kennedy became unmanageable, Armstrong said he returned to the first room for help. Upon his return he said Kennedy was missing, but that articles of clothing were strewn about the hallway.

Apparently, police were told, Kennedy climbed or stumbled over the balustrade.

PORTLAND, July 25.—Hurling from a third story window of a Third street rooming house this morning, Joseph Keane, 45, Wood land, Wash., was fatally injured. Police said liquor was found in the room.

Two companions, William Kenny and Donald Faherty, were held for questioning by the district attorney.

Faherty told police the three had "a couple of drinks." Keane then started across the room for some water. Faherty said, "staggered and fell through the glass."

WRECK IN OMAHA RESORT KILLS TWO

OMAHA, Neb., July 25.—Two were dead, two others were near death and 15 others were suffering less serious injuries today, the result of a roller coaster crash at Krug Amusement park last night. The dead are C. H. Stout, 59, and Ruth Farrell, 14, both of Omaha.

EX-KIN OF CHICAGO MAYOR SUICIDES

CHICAGO, July 25.—William Burkhardt, former state and city official and brother-in-law of Mayor William Hale Thompson, was found dead in his apartment today, his head in the oven of a gas stove whose jets were wide open.

Two months ago he made a similar attempt to end his life, but was revived by an inhalator squad. He lived alone.

Burkhardt was 55 years old, a former deputy commissioner of public works under Mayor Thompson and an appointee of former Gov. Small on the Illinois commerce commission. His health forced him to quit public life several years ago.

Two years ago Burkhardt was divorced by Mrs. Florence Burkhardt, a sister of Mayor Thompson, on charges of desertion.

RUSSIAN PULP WOOD DENIED ENTRY TO U. S.

Ban Imposed Under Section of Tariff Law Bearing on Manufacture by Convict Labor.

Action Hits Cargoes Here and Enroute; Miserable Lot of Prisoners Is Described.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The treasury today prohibited importation from Russia of pulp wood purchased by the International Paper company on the ground that convict labor had entered into its production.

Assistant Secretary Lowman said evidence in the hands of the treasury was that convict labor had been used in loading the pulpwood on ships at Archangel. The reports, he said, described the condition of the convicts and the shooting of three of them because they stole bread from one of the pulp wood ships.

"The action was taken under a tariff bill provision which prohibits the entry of goods produced wholly or in part by convict labor. The customs service recently denied entry to two ship loads of Russian lumber but Lowman admitted it after the government failed to show it had been produced by convict labor."

Four more ships bearing lumber are on the seas. If evidence that convict labor entered into its production is shown, they will be barred.

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TRIO OF GUNMEN DIES ON GALLOWES

KANSAS CITY, July 25.—Three bank robbers who sprayed bullets into a republican national convention crowd in a downtown district here two years ago, were hanged simultaneously today for the murder of Traffic Patrolman James H. "Happy" Smith, victim of their fire.

They were Tony "Lollypop" Mangiaracina, Carl Nasello, machine gunner for the gang, and John Messino, driver of the bandit car.

One of five buttons pressed by five deputy sheriffs released the trap, sending to their deaths three of the six bandits who planned and executed the robbery of the Home Trust company June 14, 1928.

Maurice Nagle, who rented his car to the bandits, and Tony Bonello, confessed members of the gang, are serving life terms in the Missouri penitentiary.

Bonello's young wife was slain in New York after his confession, because, police were told, she "knew too much."

Sam Stein, sought by police as the actual slayer of Smith and a mysterious figure known only as "The Cowboy" are at large.

HARRIET LONG NEW STATE LIBRARIAN

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Miss Harriet C. Long, of Wisconsin, is the selection of the trustees of the Oregon State library to succeed the late Virginia Cleaver Bacon as state librarian. It was announced by Governor Norblad today.

Miss Long was elected at the trustees' meeting yesterday. The salary will be \$4000 a year.

Miss Long is now in charge of the traveling library division of the Wisconsin Free Library commission. She was graduated from the University of Nebraska with Phi Beta Kappa rank, and later was graduated from the New York State library school at Albany. In 1925, following the publication of her book, "County Library Service," she was granted the degree of M. L. S. by the New York State library school.

Miss Long has served as supervisor of the county extension department of the Santa Barbara public library, librarian of the Kern county, California, public library, also of the Bramble county library at Van Wert, Ohio, during 1918 and 1919 she was in the American Library association was service both in this country and abroad.

QUAKES' DEATH TOLL REMAINS AROUND 3,000

Italian Agencies Toil Hard to Relieve Multitude of Homeless; New Shock Kills.

Enormous Loss in Property Checked—Hurricane's Toll 22 Lives and Ruined Homes.

ARINO, Italy, July 25.—A new earthquake at about 10 o'clock here yesterday morning added another death to the long list mounting rapidly from the disastrous quake of Wednesday.

The registry office toppled and an elderly woman was killed when debris fell upon her.

All the inhabitants were terror-stricken at the new shock.

Death Total 2,930

ROCHETTA, San Antonio, Italy, July 25.—Italy lavished its utmost efforts today to bring relief to the thousands of victims of Wednesday's quake. Attention centered on this heart of the stricken zone with the arrival of King Victor Emmanuel to see the progress of relief measures.

The total dead in the province of Avellino today was placed at 2,573. This together with the 357 reported dead in the five other provinces struck by the quake, made a death total thus far of 2,930.

Meanwhile government agencies of every sort were hard at work in this area checking up the dead and injured, aiding the thousands of homeless and taking stock of the huge material damage so that the work of rehabilitation may

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MANY SIGNING FOR CO-OP CANNERY PLAN

OREGON CITY, Ore., July 25.—One man was killed in a terrific explosion that shattered windows and set fire to the Pastime, largest pool hall here, before dawn today. The dead man was identified as Robert Pickles, 25, of West Lima.

Firemen found Pickles' body in the basement after battling the flames for an hour.

The pool hall had been closed several hours when the blast occurred.

It was not known anyone was in the building until firemen began clearing away the debris and seeking origin of the explosion after the fire had been extinguished.

How Pickles happened to be in the basement of the establishment is not known. Neither were firemen able to determine the cause of the blast. It was supposed, however, it originated in a supply of gasoline which was kept in the basement.

Pickles is survived by his widow and a child.

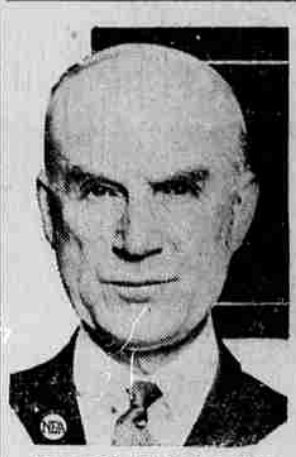
Bert Pidgeon, in charge of the pool hall, was taken into custody later in the day by deputy sheriffs after they had followed him several miles in an automobile chase.

OHIO SENATOR TO SUCCEED HUSTON AS G. O. P. GUIDE

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The stormy service of Claudius Huston as chairman of the republican national committee is at an end.

Mr. Huston brought a sudden close to the controversy over his leadership late last night when he told President Hoover that he would call the executive committee of the national committee together on August 7 and submit his resignation. The president approved.

Senator Simeon D. Fess of Ohio is the choice of the republican high command to succeed Huston and his election by the executive committee which receives the Huston resignation next month is confidently predicted.

Robert Lucas, of Kentucky, who became commissioner of internal revenue a few months ago, is slated to take over the active campaign work for the approaching congressional elections as executive assistant to Fess.

The agitation against Huston became active shortly after he testified to the senate lobby committee that he had collected funds for the Tennessee River Improvement association for use in promoting Muscle Shoals legislation and had used these funds in his brokerage account before turning them over to the association, of which he was president.

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W. F. SHELTON DIES 5 HOURS AFTER ATTACK

Vicious Young Jersey Turns on Owner, Knocking Him Down Twice, Causing Skull Fracture.

Son Finally Routs Animal With Club; Victim Born in Douglas County 51 Years Ago.

William Frank Shelton, aged 51 years, a native of Douglas county and a resident of North Myrtle Creek for the past 20 years, died late last night as a result of injuries received when he was attacked by a vicious bull.

He was attempting to lead the bull back into the pen in which it was kept, when the animal rushed at him, throwing him heavily to the ground twice, resulting in a fractured skull and other injuries to Shelton which caused death after about five hours.

The young bull, a Jersey, had become quite vicious and was kept in a pen where he could do no damage. Yesterday evening, shortly before 7 o'clock, while doing the chores about the place, Mr. Shelton turned the bull out of the pen in order that it might go to the nearby creek for water.

Sen's Aid Too Late

After the animal had secured its fill of water, he went out to lead it back to the pen and had thrown a rope over its neck, when the bull turned on him and rushed him. Mr. Shelton seized its horns, so that he could not be gored, but was tossed twice into the air and

Roseburg Proper Place for 'Vets' Home, Hawley Asserts; Gen. White Adds Endorsement to Bureau Head

Congressman Hawley, in a letter to the Roseburg chamber of commerce, declares that he will use every influence to secure the location of the proposed branch of the national soldiers' home in Roseburg.

"Having introduced the bill and secured its passage through the house, I am not in any frame of mind to permit the building of the soldiers' home outside of the state of Oregon, and am strongly committed to the belief that Roseburg is the proper and suitable place for the home," Mr. Hawley declares in his letter.

He stated that he would like to confer with representatives of the chamber following his return to this state.

The chamber of commerce is also in receipt of a copy of a letter written by George A. White to Frank T. Hines, head of the consolidated veterans' bureau. General White and General Hines are in the same company of Utah volunteers and are personal friends. In his letter to General Hines, General White is emphatically in favor of the Roseburg site for the home, declaring that the climatic conditions, geographical setting, transportation facilities and various conveniences are all in favor of the Roseburg location, and he also attests the fact that Roseburg is morally entitled to the home as a result of its effort in securing passage of the bill.
