

ATHLETICS BOOST LEAD IN AMERICAN TO FIVE GAMES

The Athletics again provided a big feature of the American league's day by clinching his 25th homer yesterday as the New York Yankees defeated Detroit 5 to 2, and put Ruth 12 games ahead of his 1927 pace.

Jimmy Fox, Philadelphia's long distance star, also hit a homer, although it was only his 27th. He made more at the time than did Ruth. Fox's circuit loop was made in the ninth inning with the score tied and gave the Athletics a 10 to 6 triumph over Cleveland.

It was not the Athletics' five games ahead of the tottering Washington Senators, who were the victims of an uprising on the part of the Chicago White Sox and lost a 19-14 decision. Ted Lyons scored his 15th victory for Chicago by pitching in the entire game.

The Boston Red Sox threatened to shake another change in the American league standing, coming within a half game of St. Louis with an 8 to 5 victory over the Browns.

Pitcher Kelp's homer in the second inning of the first game between the Reds and Brooklyn, gave Cincinnati a 3 to 0 lead and with one out, rain was enough to win the game 4 to 3. Brooklyn came back and took the second game 9 to 6 before rain stopped them in the sixth inning.

The Cubs at Philadelphia, after a 1-2 hours of slugfests, came out ahead by a 19-15 score. Thirteen of Chicago's runs were in the first two innings.

The same storm that stopped Brooklyn's proceedings, gave the New York Giants a 1 to 0 triumph over Pittsburgh in seven innings. Boston's Braves won the remaining National league game, beating St. Louis 5-4.

**CARTER DEFEATS
