

## POULTRYMEN PLAN NATION-WIDE WEEK OF ADVERTISING

Plans to put on an intensive campaign of advertising eggs and other poultry products were made at the state poultrymen's convention held at Corvallis during the past two days.

A committee was formed to work with Chas. D. Burns, professor of industrial journalism at the Oregon State college, who addressed the convention on the value of advertising.

The preliminary outline calls for an educational and advertising campaign to be put on during the next national egg week, early next year.

Resolutions were approved providing for the continuation of the appropriations supporting the poultry disease work conducted by the Oregon experiment station under the supervision of Dr. W. T. Johnson.

A companion resolution favored an additional appropriation to be spent exclusively in investigating turkey diseases and in working out control measures.

Douglas county turkey growers have been trying for the past two years to get disease control work started and expect to push the project now started to a successful conclusion.

thrown heavily to the ground each time.

He was knocked unconscious, but his son, Ralph, who witnessed the attack, drove the bull off with a club and saved his father from being gored.

Mr. Shelton was carried to the house and a doctor was called from Myrtle Creek. His body was not bruised externally, but the skull fracture and accompanying concussion, together with other possible internal injuries, caused death at about 12 o'clock last night.

The body was brought to the Roseburg Undertaking parlors in this city.

Born in Garden Valley, Mr. Shelton was born in Garden Valley, May 11, 1879, and spent practically his entire life in Douglas county. For the past 20 years he resided on North Myrtle creek about 12 miles east of the city of Myrtle Creek.

He is survived by his widow and four sons, Albert Shelton of Oak Fork and Ralph, Bernard and Ray Shelton, who reside at home. He also leaves a brother, Ray Shelton.

handling is secured they also will be denied the privilege of landing the cargoes.

Lowman said the International Paper company had purchased large amounts of Russian pulp wood through the Amtorg corporation, official Russian trading organization.

Convicts Have Hard Lot. It said the vessels were loaded by convicts and political prisoners who were marched down from their barracks to the steamer each day.

"The prisoners were poorly clothed, mainly in rags, evidently the clothing they had at the time of their arrest," the report said. "They used canvas on their hands and feet. The meals served to the prisoners consisted of black bread and warm water. Women were not employed in loading ships but they were employed in unloading cargoes of pulp wood in the yard."

Three prisoners who were caught stealing bread from another steamer were immediately shot for their act without trial. The cargoes of pulp wood being loaded were destined for the United States.

Hurricane Takes Toll. TERVISO, Italy, July 25.—New figures on the hurricane which swept down the Piave valley last night showed that 22 persons were killed, 100 injured, and 200 houses damaged.

The storm tore down many buildings, principally at Barco, Sessorana, Nervosa, Selva and Volpago, and swept over a stretch of 25 miles.

It is considered possible, of course, that in event of a deadlock over two or more of the principal aspirants, a "dark horse" will be thrown into the contest.

Tom Kay and Phil Metchem are said to be claiming all the way from 10 to 17 votes apiece. Julius Meier says he is without a complimentary vote but believes he has more "absolute assurance" than any other candidate.

Majority Unpledged. The majority of committed men came to Portland unpledged. It was revealed today. Several pointed out they are carefully considering selection of the best man in the state—one who will be able to avert a bolt to an independent.

The balloting will be secret and the roll will be called by counties. After the nominations the various aspirants will be permitted to address the convention in behalf of their candidacies and on their platforms.

To be nominated a candidate must receive a majority—at least 19 of the 36 votes.

## DOUGLAS PATROL ESTABLISHES NEW SUMMER STATION

An emergency fire station has been established by the Douglas Fire Patrol at Riverside, where a crew of fire fighters will be stationed day and night to respond to any forest fire report. Heretofore the patrol has employed men only as needed, keeping a list of men available for fire fighting uses, but this year a crew is to be maintained constantly.

The old store building, near the railroad track on the Garden valley road has been rented for the summer and fitted up for quarters. Beds and a kitchen have been provided so that the men will be at the station at all hours, subject to call.

Each man has his complete equipment available at a moment's notice, and within a very short time after a call is received the crew, completely equipped, outfitted and provisioned, can be on its way to the scene.

Harvey Brown, supervising warden, states that the crew will be enlarged at the need arises, as same quarters are available to take care of a score or more of men. It is believed that this system will enable the patrol to handle its fires more quickly and efficiently.

### NOTICE OF APPOINTMENT OF A BEE INSPECTOR

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Douglas County, acting upon a petition of representative bee owners, has appointed George Anderson, of Roseburg, Oregon, County Bee Inspector.

Under the law it is mandatory upon the owners of bees to secure a license for the maintenance of an apiary, and have such apiaries inspected for the presence of disease. Licenses must be secured from the County Clerk not later than Sept. 1, 1930. A fee of \$1.00 is charged for each license.

As the presence of bees in the county is necessary for the successful pollination of fruit, the County Court urges that all owners of bees secure licenses for the maintenance of apiaries, and have all stands inspected by the County Bee Inspector for the presence of disease.

## POULTRY CULLING DEMONSTRATIONS DATED IN DOUGLAS

A series of four poultry culling demonstrations have been arranged by J. C. Leedy, county agent for August 4 and 5 in different sections of the county. Culling should be practiced very strictly this year, according to the county agent. The poultry outlook indicates that there will probably be a recession in prices when the pullets come into production. While this price drop probably will not be very great, yet the poultrymen seeking to make the most profit from his operations will cull out all unprofitable hens, so that there can be no loss by low production. Culling should be done in August, and consequently the meetings are being arranged for the 4th and 5th, so that poultrymen may have the benefit of expert instruction when they begin culling their flocks.

H. E. Conby, extension poultryman from the state college will conduct the demonstrations, assisted by the county agent.
