DISEASES TO PLANTS ENTAIL HUGE LOSS

One and a half billion dollars annually is the average amount of the injury plant diseases do in the United States each year, says Dr. R. J. Haskell, plant pathologist of the U. S. department of agriculture, who is in charge of the plant diseases survey of the bureau of plant industry. Other nations suffer proportionate losses, although statistical information is lacking in many countries. In Canada the estimated annual losses average about 15,000,000 English pounds. England estimates that plant disease takes an average of 10 per cent of the value of its plant products.

Doctor Haskell cites many instances of severe losses of agricultural wealth as a result of disease. "It is estimated," he says, "that the United States wheat crop is reduced by about 97,000 bushels a year, on the average, by rusts, smuts, root rots and other diseases. The corn crop is curtailed by approximately 271,000,000 bushels and white potatoes by about 95,000,000 bushels annually."

ATTERBURY'S BODY NOW ENROUTE HERE: FUNERAL TUESDAY

The body of Lieutenant Ivan Atterbury, killed July 11 in an airplane accident at Lake Field, Honolulu, arrived in San Francisco yesterday, according to word received this morning by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Atterbury, and is being forwarded to Roseburg tonight. Arrangements have been made to hold funeral services at the Roseburg armory Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. A full military funeral will be accorded the flier. Rev. C. A. Edwards will officiate, and the American Legion and national guard company will participate. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

According to reports received from Honolulu, impressive services were held there for Lieutenant Atterbury and Sergeant Mills, the latter having been killed in the plane with the local flier.

An escort of army planes, with one file missing, and a foot escort accompanied the casket from the Service club to Fort Armstrong for the final service, where the entire personnel of Lake field was present.

The escort was made up of Lieutenants E. G. Johnson, Flight Commander A. H. Foster, L. P. Holcombe and E. R. Todd, flying De Havilland planes.

Full bearers were Lieutenants T. B. Anderson, John H. Davies, Edwin W. Rawlins, James M. Thompson, T. L. Boyd and Joseph B. Stanley, all officers who accompanied Lieutenant Atterbury to Hawaii a few months ago.

THERE are no polar bears or Eskimos below the Antarctic circle.

"The North Polar cap of the globe is crowded when compared with Antarctica," says Willard Vander Voe, Paramount cameraman, who, with his partner, Joseph Rucker, brought back a complete film record of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's South Pole expedition. This picture, "With Byrd at the South Pole," will be the feature of the Antlers theatre program for three days starting Tuesday.

"When I was with Byrd near the North Pole," says Vander Voe, "we were meeting Eskimos or running across bears, caribou and musk oxen. The Arctic seemed quite populated."

"But despite the fact that the North Pole is located on an ice field while the South Pole is in the center of a continent, conditions are altogether different at the latter extremity of the globe. During the 20 months we spent at Little America, our nearest neighbor was 2,500 miles away. This is due to the lower temperatures experienced at the South Pole. That pole is located on a great plateau, 10,000 feet above sea level. In winter the thermometer often registers 75 degrees below zero and winds reach

the greatest velocity on earth, 150 miles an hour.

"In the summer whales and seals come down to the edge of the ice to live on crustaceans, while schoolgulls fly over the Bay of Whales from Patagonia."

"But, in winter, the only living things below the circle are the silly penguins, who can't go away and explorers who don't want to."
