THE opening skirmishes at the committee meeting in Portland involved whether the balloting would be secret or not. That is a pretty tough question, isn't it? Suppose you were a delegate. You would hope with all your might that the balloting would be secret but you would hate like everything to go on record as voting for a secret ballot.

The fundamentals beneath such an apparently cringing attitude are extremely simple. You, like those delegates, are an ordinary citizen able to do your own thinking and resenting any attempt by anyone to influence your opinion for his own selfish interests. So, you would not, and those delegates do not want to be a target for the heavy artillery of the high pressure politicians. The delegates can hardly be blamed for wanting to vote secretly and so be un molested.

Secrecy for the purposes of the immediate convention is a reasonable thing. The voting should be made a matter of record, however, and a detailed compilation kept of each ballot. The delegates should not be permitted to meet, vote and go home without leaving behind them a complete record of how they voted upon each and every candidate and at each ballot. The people of the state are entitled to have that information.

We are not at liberty to divulge the source of our information, but we have every reason to believe it is authentic. If the report were merely rumor, or cracked barrel gossip, we would not mention it. For we detest the irresponsible humbuggerism that raises false hopes in a community by giving currency to reports which are unsupported by facts. A newspaper can do a community no greater disservice than to indulge in that sort of speculation. Far better to say nothing than to broadcast mere possibilities as certainties or even probabilities.

We do not mean to say that our information is "official" or that the Great Northern connection with Medford was already been decided. Nor do we deny that something MAY come up to prevent such a connection.

That we do say this:
That there is no doubt that the program above is the program that is contemplated by the directing heads of the line. That when they recently said the permission to build the Keddie cutoff meant the construction of "feeder lines in Oregon"—they had the Medford construction in mind.

And, we repeat, is good news. And under the circumstances, the present is a propitious time to pass around the good news. For there is a great deal of pessimism hereabouts. There is a great deal—too much—"viewing with alarm."

We believe what one THINKS—the attitude or mind—has a great deal to do with what happens. Thought does not alter facts, but thought DOES to a large extent, determine the final product of those facts.

So here is news of good report. Unless there is some unlikely slip Medford within five years will have another railroad—a railroad that develops the country in which it builds, instead of relying solely on the country to build up the railroad.

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Talks on Health

"TAKING COLD" in hot summer weather is disgusting to us and to our friends, as it is an evidence of weakness, and it is only an indication of weakness. It shows that the system is out of gear.

When you lose sleep, eat meals at an hour, spend hours and hours at hard work in dusty, smoke-laden rooms, you are sure to get an unfavorable reaction. The first thing you know you are sneezing and coughing, and maybe you have started the most obstinate kind of a cold.

You are liable to colds if you do not take regular exercise. In the hot weather, when the body wastes are thrown off by the skin in the perspiration, daily bathing to purify the skin is to be kept in good condition.

Cleanliness of the mouth and teeth is essential. The germs of colds, influenza and tuberculosis are ever present to make trouble in the body by way of the nose and mouth. The mouth and nose should be kept clean because they are the hiding places of many kinds of germs.

With a reasonable care of our bodies we do not need to fear these germs. But when we are tired out or run down from bad habits of living and eating then it is that the resistance of disease is low and we are easy prey for the germs.

As a matter of fact, we are terribly careless of these bodies of ours. Haven't you seen boys and girls throw themselves, overheated, on the grass after a strenuous game of tennis, or even go to bed when they are overheated. Then comes a chill, and they may be made ill by the quick chilling of the body.

The condition called a "cold" is almost always accompanied by constipation. One of the causes of constipation is eating too rapidly. Eat slowly. Don't bolt your food. Chew it thoroughly. Do this because the processes of digestion begin in the mouth.

The time to deal with a cold is in its first stages. When you have sneeziness, chilliness, running of the nose, a smarting or burning of

the throat you may know trouble is on the way.

The best thing to do is to get into a hot water bath, as you can sweat the cold out. Water as it comes down the throat and into the lungs, keeps the throat up for some time.
