Wool Falls to Rise

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—The commercial bulletin of Portland will say tomorrow:

"Opening prices on lightweight staples and tropicums by the American Woolen company on Monday at prices rather lower than generally reported—2 to 10 per cent. Under the previous season on comparable numbers were not returning to the wool trade at first. Trading in wool in the last forty-eight hours, however, has been sufficiently brisk to restore and possibly increase confidence in the outlook.

"Demand still favors the finer wools and medium staples are not neglected. Prices are firm generally, although woolen goods are slow.

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PLAN HIGHWAY ON WHOLE OF COAST

Definite work is proceeding at both ends of the proposed international highway linking the Americas from Alaska to Argentina, according to reports compiled by the Oregon State Motor Association which has endorsed and is co-operating in plans for this project. This proposed longest highway in the world would link existing routes in California, Oregon, and Washington and in British Columbia with a new route north to Fairbanks and south through Mexico and Central America along the Pacific slope into South America.

Coincident with the recent blazing of the trail to Hazelton, B. C., near the boundary line of Alaska comes the news from Washington that the United States government is opening a field office in Panama to cooperate with the governments of the Central American countries in making surveys to determine the most desirable route for the proposed highway.

Not only are Canada, United States, Mexico and the Central American countries at work on the huge project, but also the Argentine republic, the furthest south of the South American countries interested. Official announcement has been made that the Argentine republic has provided the initial appropriation for a road across the Andes from Buenos Aires to Santiago, Chile. Santiago marks the southernmost point of the great highway that eventually will extend from Alaska through Pacific coast provinces, states and nations down the west coast of South America into Chile.

The United States government has appropriated \$50,000 to aid in making preliminary surveys through the Central Americas. The Inter-American Highway congress that met in Panama last October provided for the appointment of an Inter-American Highway commission to study problems of routes. The U. S. bureau of public roads will cooperate with this commission and will assist in making surveys in the countries requiring such help. Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Salvador and Panama all have requested assistance or indicated their adherence to the international plan.

LIEUTENANT IVAN ATTERBURY—ROSEBURG'S TRIBUTE TO AVIATION

All Roseburg and Douglas county mourn the passing of Ivan Atterbury, whose brilliant career in the United States army flying corps, was suddenly ended when his plane crashed at Honolulu, fatally injuring both Ivan and his companion.

He was a Roseburg boy and passed his boyhood in our public schools, and was the center of a host of friends both young and old. He was the kind that makes and keeps friends—kind, unselfish, helpful and lovable.

From boyhood Ivan's dream was to be an aviation pilot—a thoroughly efficient one. Out of six undergraduates, applying in the whole of the United States for entrance into the army aviation school, three succeeded, and Ivan led them all. From March 1929 he had lived a most exultant life in his studies, and passed from each class with honors. His letters written to his family and friends have been enthusiastic in setting forth his hopes of joyous and successful career in his chosen profession.

He was of the Richard Byrd or Charles Lindbergh type of young man, whom aviation has drawn into its fascinating service—generous, wholesome, clean, manly, religious, eager, and earnest. Heroes of the airplane age!

Each age has martyrs of its own; Today they're in the flying zone. And some of them the seas have claimed And left their graves forever unnamed. Young Ivan Atterbury's crash, That smote his friends with keenest lash, Has stilled another golden lute That list of martyrs to recruit.

We live in aviation's dawn; It takes brave youth to carry on— The hero stuff of pioneers, That from its purpose never veers, That threat of danger never fears, That never fails to keep its vows; This is the kind brave Ivan had E'en back in days when but a lad.

To soar the air was Ivan's dream— To learn to fly his boyish theme; So, when he grew to be a man, He joined the aviation clan; The airship was his chief delight, Exulting in his power of flight; And yonder where the islands smile He's flown from us a little while.

Ah, this is not a place for tears, But for the kind of faith that cheers! He had a joyous bright career, Had won his conquest over fear; He lived the life his heart desired— With highest hopes his soul was fired; He loved to fly above earth's sod; He dwells in fellowship with God.
