SECRET BALLOTS BAN ON JOCKEYING, DR. STEWART SAYS

The nominating convention of the republican state committee Saturday was a very peaceable session, with the exception of the battle over the method of balloting, according to Dr. E. B. Stewart, delegate from Douglas county, who served as chairman of the committee on resolutions, one of the most responsible appointments in the organization. The open balloting proposal, Dr. Stewart stated, was injected into the convention issues, long before the meeting was called to order, and created much discussion. The written ballot, however, was approved by the majority of delegates, who were of the belief that it would eliminate much political jockeying. Dr. Stewart was well pleased with the committee organization, and particularly with the election of Floyd Cook as chairman, who was nominated by the Douglas county delegate and elected without opposition. Dr. Stewart nominated A. C. Marsters for governor by ballot and continued his vote for the local candidate for the first four ballots, receiving one vote also from Coos county. He shifted his vote at the advice of Mr. Marsters himself, but came back to the Roseburg candidate in the later balloting, when the shifts indicated that there might be an opportunity to advance his cause. A Lane county vote was also secured at that time. Dr. Stewart was accompanied to the convention by Mrs. Stewart, who was an interested spectator.

YOUTH OF 5 SAVES LIFE OF ANOTHER, 4

(Associated Press Licensed Wire) SALT LAKE CITY, July 28.—If there are any hero medals for 5 year old life savers, Calvin Morris of this city is a candidate for one of them. His rescue of a 4-year old boy became known here today. Passing a mill stream at Logan, Utah, where he was visiting last week with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Morris, Calvin saw Bobbie Nielson fall into the water. He ran to the mill and gave the alarm and then hurried back to the stream where the younger boy had been carried against a grating by the swift current. Stooping over, he grasped Bobbie's arm and held on until help arrived. Just below the stream makes a 30-foot drop. Bobbie's father said it would have meant certain death for his son had he been carried over it.
