GLENDAL BEATS ROSEBURG TEAM BY SCORE 10 TO 4

GLENDAL, July 28.—An eighth inning rally during which they put across 4 runs is all that saved the Roseburg Allstars a shut out at the hands of Glendale Sunday afternoon when the same at Glendale was won by the latter by a score of 4 to 10.

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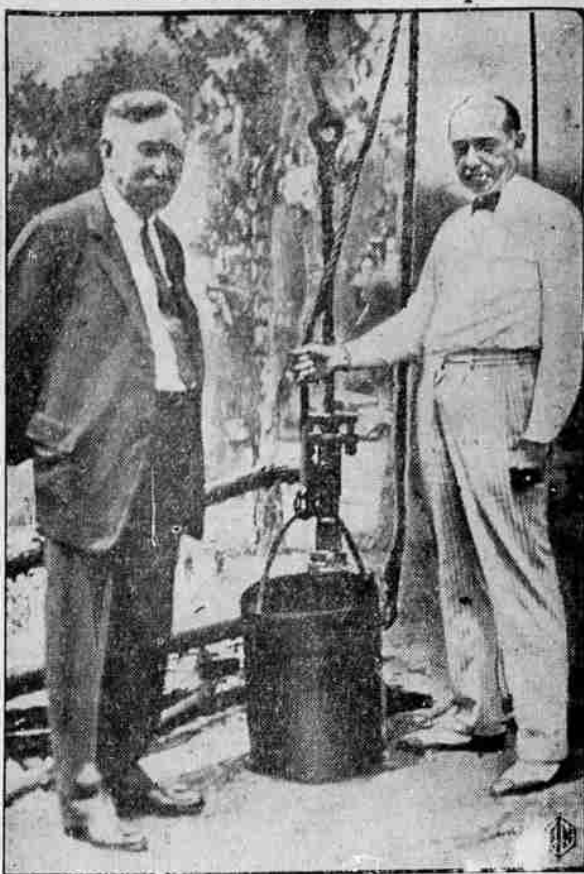

ROBINS INCREASE LEAD BY WINNING WHILE CUBS LOSE

In the National League Chicago, after leading the way in the inter-sectional struggles with eleven victories and six defeats, went down yesterday before the Cincinnati jinx and lost a game and one-half to the Brooklyn Robins, who fanned the Phillies twice.

The Cubs have a promising rally nipped by the second triple play the Reds have made against them this season and dropped their fifth straight decision to Cincinnati 6-5 as the Reds followed their advantage with a four run burst.

The Robins pounded the Philadelphia pitchers for 26 hits in a pair of slugfest matches that produced nine home runs. They won by score of 10 to 6 and 9 to 6.

The Giants were pulled down somewhat in their inter-sectional campaign as the Pittsburgh Pirates scored two victories in the final double header yesterday, 12 to 8, and 8 to 4.

The St. Louis Cardinals handed the Boston Braves a double defeat. They won the first game, 2-0 on homers by Fisher and Hatley and Sylvester Johnson's three-hit pitching.

Washington put on one of its rather infrequent displays of its earlier strength and slammed the Chicago White Sox for 15 hits and a 10 to 1 victory after losing three straight.

Fred Marberry made it a complete triumph by holding the Sox to three hits.

The St. Louis Browns ended their struggle to remain in seventh place by winning two to the day's most surprising games from the Boston Red Sox 10 to 9 and 9 to 6. These two weak hitting clubs brought forth 53 hits, nine homers, and bursts of seven and eight runs in the first game. Goose Goslin hit three four baggers. Webb and Todd two apiece while Metzler won the second clash with a ninth inning homer.

STRIBLING-SCOTT BOUT LURES 35,000

LONDON, July 28.—Attendance records for European boxing today appeared about to be smashed at the match between Phil Scott and William L. "Young" Stribling this evening. Not less than 35,000 spectators will be on hand, according to forenoon sales at the box offices.

Stribling continued favorite with odds shortened to 6 to 5, and a few bets at even money. Fans believed Scott was at his best form and that Stribling reached his peak a trifle prematurely.

Stribling was expected to weigh in at 190, Scott at 202.

TORNADO KILLS 20 IN TURKISH CITY

ISTANBUL, Turkey, July 28.—A tornado and hailstorm killed twenty persons and injured hundreds in Odrinople yesterday. Eighty per cent of the houses were destroyed and crops in the surrounding country were ruined.

METSCHAN PLANS STRONG CAMPAIGN; SUPPORT PLEDGED

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—Phil Metschan, republican nominee for governor, spent the week-end answering messages of congratulation and promises of support that poured in on him from all parts of the state of Oregon.

Metschan indicated yesterday he already was planning an intensive political campaign that would take him into every section of the state before the general election in November.

Rumors continued to be heard over the week-end that an independent candidate would be placed in the field by friends and supporters of the late Senator Joseph Such a candidate, reports said, would enter the race on the platform enunciated by Joseph.

Political observers were of the opinion the independent candidate would be Julius L. Meier, Portland business man, who had been mentioned prominently for the party leadership. They pointed out Meier had withdrawn from the

race when the state central committee refused to outline a platform for the party or its candidate and that he had contemplated Metschan on his nomination but had given no assurance of his support.

Virtually all the other candidates for the nomination have assured Metschan of their loyal support.

COPCO SUES OVER ROGUE BLASTING

PORTLAND, July 28.—The Beaver Portland Cement company and the city of Gold Hill in Jackson county, were made defendants in a suit filed in federal court here today by the California-Oregon Power company. The suit is for \$5000.

The Copco declares its property on the eastside of the Rogue river at Gold Hill suffered from dynamiting of the river channel near the opposite bank by the cement company.

The complaint says the dynamiting is causing the channel of the river to shift to such an extent power developments planned by the company cannot be accomplished.

Restraining order and injunction is sought.

TWO SEA RESCUES SAVE 46 PERSONS

LONG BEACH, N. Y., July 23.—Ten men, women and children were rescued from a 40-foot cabin cruiser a few minutes before the craft blew up yesterday one mile off Lido beach.

Three women in the party were slightly burned by a first explosion which set the craft afire. The engineer and two of the guests were thrown into the water.

VENTURA, Calif., July 28.—One woman and 35 men, passengers and crew of the fishing launch Starlight were rescued today after spending fifteen hours adrift off Anacapa island, fifteen miles off shore.

The motors of the Starlight became disabled west of Santa Cruz island Sunday afternoon. Distress signals were flown while the boat drifted helplessly, finally coming east of Anacapa island where it was seen.
