A MODERN PORTIA SOUNDS ALARM

At the sixth annual commencement of the New Jersey College for Women at Rutgers university, Judge Florence E. Allen of the Ohio supreme court told the graduates in her commencement address that, although the United States has laid a fine framework of government, less than 150 years ago, it had lowered its moral standards since that time.

"We have ceased to require that this be a government of the people, by the people and for the people, and we have tolerated and acquiesced in the growth of the conception that it is a government of the politicians, by the politicians and for the politicians. In other words, just because the Indians no longer stand in their meadows across the trails, burn their houses and steal our women, because no longer educate attack our frontiers, and threaten our sovereignty, this does not mean that the eternal conflict is no. On the other hand, we are to establish the physical law as our forefathers set up the fabric of our government."

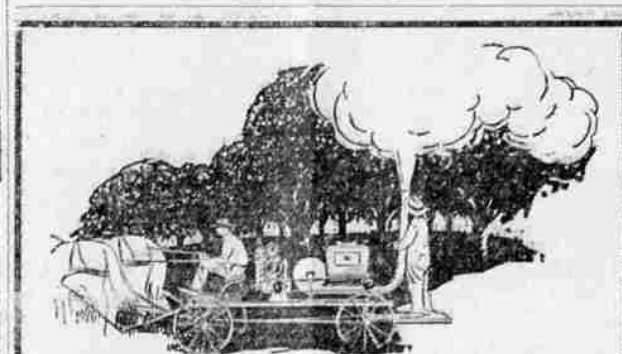
"The length of America's day and the measure of our force and influence of the nation depend upon those of us who require that of officials hold their office in trust for the people. We must cooperate in molding public opinion to the attainment of this end."—News story from New Brunswick, New Jersey, June 7, 1930.

STIRLING PRaised AND SCOTT JEERED BY BRITISH PRESS

LONDON, July 29.—W. J. (Young) Stirling has tossed aside the caution that used to mar his efforts in the ring and smashed his way once more into the forefront of challenges for the heavyweight championship.

Just five weeks after his sensational one-round knockout of Otto Von Porat, lantern-jawed Norwegian, Stirling stormed through the weak defenses of Phil Scott, English champion, in Wimbledon stadium last night, floored the London Irishman four times in the first round and knocked him out in the second.

A crowd of 35,000 roared approval of the Georgian's ferocious attack and jeered their fallen champion as the fatal count found him sitting on the floor of the ring and valiantly trying to get to his feet. "Pitiful," "disgraceful," "humiliating," the press called the bout to day, making no attempt to vindicate Scott. "He was outclassed, outboxed and outpunched," said Sporting Life's expert who added Stirling was the "best and cleverest heavyweight in the world not excepting Schmeling."

Among the stinging comments on Scott's showing was the following from the Express:

"British boxing has been in the mud before but never so much as last night. Stirling, of course, is due for praise but even that praise is lessened by the remembrance he had nothing to beat."

It was apparent early in the first round Stirling was out to end the match as quickly as possible. He smashed Scott all over the ring, using left hooks almost exclusively. Before the round was over he had Scott on the floor for counts of five, seven and nine and the Briton was reclining on the canvas for the fourth time when the bell came to the rescue.

The second round was only a minute old when Stirling rifled home a right to the jaw and a shuffling left hook to the body that sent Scott to the floor for the long count. Scott, an agonized expression on his face, quickly got to one knee, vainly tried to rise at nine and fell back on his haunches as the referee counted ten.

Just as impressive but in another style was the performance of Bill Terry in the Giants 5 to 1 victory over the Phillies. The big first baseman's activities included two home runs, a pair of singles and a sacrifice fly, which drove in the winning run in the ninth.
