

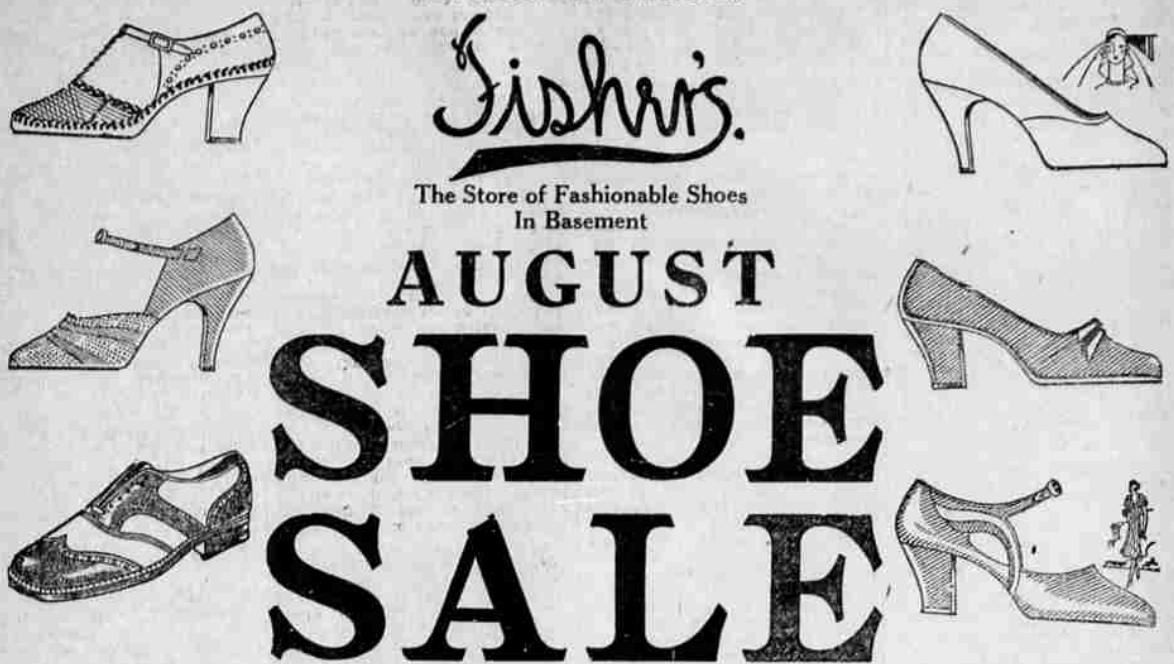

bring the dirigible to Montreal at about 10:00 a. m. eastern standard time, on Thursday if the schedule was maintained.
The rain at which the R-100 was traveling this morning, however, indicated arrival might not be possible until many hours later than estimated.
Commander Booth, 35 years old, has had 15 years experience with airships.
Major G. H. Scott, who commanded the R-34 on that dirigible's historic flight to New York and return in 1919, an observer on the flight Monday, said he was entirely confident of success.
Trail Blazing Is Plan
The R-100 will be used as a trail-blazer in Britain's scheme to link her broad empire by air. Much, officials admitted, depends on the success of the Canada flight.
The great dirigible has developed a speed of 81.5 miles an hour, but for cruising purposes this probably will be reduced to 80 miles.
Slower Than Zeppelin
Despite its larger hydrogen capacity, the R-100 is shorter than the slender Graf Zeppelin, Germany's premier air liner, being 776 feet long, while the R-100 is 709 feet in length. The Graf is faster, also, but the R-100 has a hydrogen capacity of 5,000,000 cubic feet—the greatest afloat. The Graf Zeppelin's capacity is 3,708,000 cubic feet.
The R-100 is driven by six engines, water cooled, of 700 horsepower each. The ship uses gasoline as fuel instead of heavy fuel oil.
"Safe" Flyer Killed
YOUNGSTON, O., July 29.—M. D. Smith, known through 13 years of flying as "Safe and Sane Smith," was killed here last night when an airplane in which he was a passenger, with a student at the controls, stalled and dived from a height of 30 feet.
The student flyer, Robert Shugart, 25, is in a serious condition with fractured legs.
Endurance Planes Awaiting
ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., July 29.—The big "Red" endurance plane challenging the 554-hour mark of the Hunter brothers, reached its 207th hour in the air at 10 a. m. today. The regular refueling contact was made without mishap.
ST. LOUIS, July 29.—Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien started the ninth day of their endurance flight at 7:11 a. m. today when they had been up the hours. From now on until they land they must remain over the Lambert-St. Louis field, always within sight of an official observer. Their barograph was for only eight days and to make the flight official they now must be constantly under observation.
Girl, 18, Wins License
DOSTON, July 29.—Eighteen year old Alice Du Pont, daughter of A. Felix Du Pont, of Wilmington, Del., today held a private pilot's license although her plane circled and looped and hit another here yesterday during test flights. She was unharmed.
Derbyist Crashes
METROPOLITAN AIRPORT, Los Angeles, July 29.—The first of the all-American air derbyists to start eastward on the home stretch, Lee Gehlbach of Little Rock, Ark., got off promptly this morning. He headed his tiny 100-horsepower plane toward the haze of Mohave desert and Ogden, Utah, tonight's stopping place.
J. R. Weddell of New Orleans, holder of second place in the race, was forced out by the cracking up of his plane just before the scheduled start of today's lap. His motor stalled soon after leaving the company's air field, dropping his plane to a heap of wreckage. As his eleven fellow contestants started, J. R. Weddell was seen with tears in his eyes.

of mind to tell the truth.
