building caused firemen to extend every effort to beat down the blaze before it reached that place.

If the fire had spread to the filling station and on to other nearby structures, it is probable that it would have whipped into the main business section and done thousands of dollars of damage.

The air condition was favorable to the firemen in that only a quiet breeze was blowing at the time, making the fight much more even. Prompt work in laying six lines of hose, surmounting the buildings and maintaining unusual order is credited by onlookers with having done much to prevent a much more serious loss.

Poultry Rescued

Quacks of ducks, cackles of excited chickens and the shouts of firemen mingled to make a noisy chorus. Several hundred chickens and other fowl were in pens in the poultry house and barely escaped being burned to death. Volunteers plunged into the flaming building and carried out coup after coup of chickens until finally it got too hot to continue. Then firemen turned water inside to save the poultry until men could go back in and rescue those remaining imprisoned. So far as Mr. Shook could ascertain early this afternoon, none of his chickens had been lost.

Firemen were successful in saving all the equipment of the bicycle shop, including a number of new cycles, desks, tools and other stock. Boys particularly lent anxious hands in carrying out the bicycles.

Humorous Angle

D. J. Jarvis, proprietor of the repair shop, standing drenched before the building that had housed his business, and viewing the things that had been carried out and strewn all over the block, remarked humorously that he was afraid he had lost his old Missouri meerschaum pipe.

The building occupied by the key shop was owned by Albert Lane and the poultry business was in Wilbur Sauech's building. Both were old landmarks in this city, having housed everything from a cabinet shop to an undertaking establishment. It was not learned

whether either was covered by insurance.

New Structure O. K.

The new fireproof building recently erected for the Roseburg Cleaners proved its worth as the adjoining structures went up in flames and left the tailor shop undamaged. The greasing rack and equipment of the service station and the quarters of the Taylor Electric company were all saved by the efforts of firemen. Although the walls of these two buildings are of fireproof material the roofs

were endangered for a time by the large particles of falling embers.

Linemen for the power company were rushed to the scene and cut down electric wires leading to the burning buildings. This was done to avoid the wires falling and electrocuting firemen or onlookers. Rumors circulated through the crowd that a fireman had fallen through the roof and been injured were unverified by Chief Fletcher. It was impossible to obtain an estimate of the amount of damage done at press time this afternoon.
