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WRIGHTSMAN AND GORE RUN NECK AND NECK

Result of Primary Vote in Oklahoma for Senator So Close Runoff Must Follow.

Alfalfa Bill Murray Easy Victor for Nomination for Governor; Pine Has Big Lead.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 30.—T. P. Gore, blind former senator who dropped out of the political world for ten years only to stage a spectacular comeback, and Charles J. Wrightsman, millionaire oil man of Tulsa, today were neck and neck for the lead in the contest for the democratic senatorial nomination in Oklahoma.

As returns came in from yesterday's primary, it became apparent that Gore and Wrightsman would be forced to battle it out for the nomination in the runoff primary August 12.

Murray Easy Victor
A veteran of early Oklahoma politics, W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray, who came back from Bolivia only recently after an unsuccessful attempt to establish a colony, was running so far ahead of his nearest opponent for the democratic nomination for governor that his friends claimed a runoff would not be necessary when the complete vote was counted.

Murray had nearly a 2 to 1 vote over his nearest opponent, Frank Buttram, Oklahoma City oil millionaire, who only this year entered politics. E. B. Howard, former congressman of Tulsa, who had shifted throughout the night for third place with M. E. Trapp, former governor, was in third place again today.

Murray made a stormy campaign for the nomination, promising to put a "howdy" sign on the executive office.

Two Entrants Close
With 1,555 precincts of 3,338 in the state reported in the senatorial race, Wrightsman held the lead with 32,893 votes, Gore had 33,815, Henry S. Johnson, former governor, 24,587, Lee Cruise, former governor, 18,965 and J. B. Robertson, former governor, 7,100.

Indications that Senator W. B. Pine, republican incumbent, would not face a runoff primary was shown by the vote he received with 510 precincts reported. He had then polled 12,255, while his two republican opponents had a total vote of 4,285.

Returns from 1,765 of the state's 3,338 precincts for the democratic nomination for governor gave Murray 70,758; Buttram 38,033; Howard 22,224; M. E. Trapp, former governor, 21,772; Frank Bailey, 7,395.

QUAKES RECORDED IN 2 U. S. CITIES

NEW YORK, July 29.—Two earthquakes shocks of moderate intensity were recorded early today on the seismograph of Fordham university. They were 2,100 miles from New York and "probably in the Caribbean."

WASHINGTON, July 29.—An earthquake, beginning at 1:30 a. m., eastern standard time, was recorded today on the seismograph of Georgetown university observatory.

The center of the disturbance was calculated as being 2,000 miles from Washington, with indications it was northward. The observatory said it was probably off the coast of Newfoundland.

THE MODERN MAGELLAN

If Lindbergh is to go down in history as the Columbus of the air, then Major Kingsford-Smith will undoubtedly be known as his Magellan, for his has been the first attempt at encircling the world in an airplane over oceans.

It was just before he took off to complete the last lap of this epoch-making flight—the lap from New York to California—that he posed for me in New York. Behind him was the most dangerous part of his trip—he has crossed the Pacific to Australia, flown to the British Isles and had reached this continent.

Tanned and weather-hardened, his face has well-etched lines, such lines as have all men who live much of their lives in the open. And yet despite this ruggedness, he has about him something that brings to mind a fellow-Australian—Percy Grainger. Perhaps it is the wavy sandy hair, or the blue of the eyes, or the thin mouth, or perhaps it is something more subtle than any of these. A similarity of imagination, of outlook. For this airman is something more than just a flier. There is a note of poetry and fancy about him that suggests that he can keep his ears tuned to the hum of the motor and yet see the clouds about him. He has a humorous turn of thought, and a quickness of expression, a sailor's wit and a sailor's sentiment. He has the love of home that is the sailor's, the nostalgia that none experiences save those who have traveled.

He is a human dynamo of energy. Nevertheless his square-tipped fingers and his almost knotted hands are those of a man who can tinker endlessly with gadgets, who can give his nerve force to manual work. It is impossible for him to sit and do nothing. His movements are quick and incisive, and about him always is an air of action. * * * S. J. Woolf in the New York Times, July 6, 1929.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—Top grades wheat were firm today at 15c per bushel, but the price of off-quality wheat, however, was reported as being shaded by some dealers.

Butter supplies were liberal with moderate trading, but there were no changes in prices. Some surprise was made at outside markets. San Francisco and Los Angeles reported advances on 50 cents and above.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable market, the Portland Bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

Team-truck holding of 125 cars of fresh fruit and vegetables Monday of which half were watermelons, marks the heaviest volume of any city at any one time this year. Yesterday's arrivals were light with only 25 cars compared with 27 cars received over the weekend; and Tuesday morning witnessed a reduction in arrivals.
