Talks on Health

By anemia, we mean a condition
 where there is a defect in the
 quality, or a considerable reduction
 in the total quantity of blood.

Ordinary anemia is met with
 very commonly and is usually only
 a temporary thing. It disappears
 after a few weeks or months with
 proper care and treatment.

Serious bleeding may produce
 an anemic condition. This type is
 called "secondary anemia." Sec-
 ondary anemia may follow malaria,
 poisoning, blood poisoning, and
 other infections. Mercury and other
 chemicals may produce anemia of
 the secondary type.

What is known as primary or es-
 sential anemia has no recognized
 cause. Young girls between the
 ages of thirteen and seventeen are
 liable to attacks of it. The blood-
 making machinery fails to do its
 work, and in consequence a pecu-
 liar pallor or greenish complex-
 ion develops.

A very much more serious mal-
 ady is pernicious anemia. Like
 primary anemia it is obscure in
 origin. Men are much more sub-
 ject to it than women, especially
 under thirty-five. In women it is
 often associated with pregnancy.
 Severe emotional experience, shock
 or other similar mental states are
 causative factors.

Poison developed in any part of
 the body may cause anemia. De-
 generative processes in any por-
 tion of the body or organs, due to
 obscure causes, may lead to im-
 pairment of the blood, and anemia.

In every case of anemia, and es-
 pecially pernicious anemia, a care-
 ful examination should be made to
 find out whether or not there is
 some infection somewhere in the
 body. Bad teeth, diseased tonsils
 and particularly intestinal infection
 are capable of producing symptoms
 very like pernicious anemia.

The patient has an increasing
 pallor, a lemon-colored complexion,
 weakness of the muscles, with
 vomiting and diarrhea. There is

ported. It will include all the dis-
 tance from Rock creek to the Sky-
 line highway on the other side of
 the Cascades and much of the
 route would be re-surveyed to
 eliminate as many curves and
 other defects as possible.

Mr. Marsters was told by the
 highway commissioners and by the
 engineer that a heavy traffic is
 expected on the North Umpqua
 road once it is completed. That

is the reason a wide road will be
 surveyed.

Depends on Weather
 Whether or not the survey will
 be made this fall will depend
 largely on the length of the season.
 If the engineering crew can com-
 plete its work in Montana and get
 here in time to make the survey
 before the rains set in, the survey
 will be made this fall. Otherwise
 the work cannot be done until next
 spring.

The North Umpqua road pro-
 gress is now in the hands of the
 bureau. Local boosters can do no
 more until the survey is made. Mr.
 Marsters states. He is optimistic
