grant power site to the California line, is about 15 miles.

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The new filings apparently follow a suggestion made by State Engineer Luper in an exchange of telegrams a few days ago with Paul Reiss, attorney for the power company, who is now in Washington. Reiss stated in effect that he had come to terms with the federal power commission which would be ready to act as soon as assurance could be had that the state would grant the applications. Reiss intimated a more extensive development than that indicated in the company's original application, and Luper advised him that new or amended applications should be filed accordingly.

The old application was held up because of the federal government's withdrawal from appropriation some years ago of water in Klamath basin. Because of this an opinion of the attorney general advised the state not to grant any applications in the district. Last September, however, the attorney general gave a modified opinion in which he advised that applications could be granted if federal interests were protected.

Reiss in his telegram to Luper indicated that part of the development is to be undertaken within the next five years.

guns, the communists showered the Palos with bullets.

Caught in close quarters and unable to turn back, the Palos brought its three-inch rifles and machine guns into action, firing into the attackers at close range.

The battle raged for an hour before the communists were silenced. The attackers had taken up positions behind stacks and in undergrowth along the bank.

Heavy fire was necessary to clear the banks.

Gunboat Little Damaged

The five sailors received flesh wounds only. Although the Palos was hit hundreds of times she was not materially damaged. Her steel armor plate turned the red bullets.

Commanded by Lieutenant Commander R. D. Tisdale of Baltimore, the Palos, which previously had helped to evacuate foreigners from Changsha last before the reds were driven out of the city, sought to approach and survey the damage. An unexpected rise in the river enabled her to approach.

After the battle the Palos was towed down river to an installation of the Standard Oil company of New York and was moored. The Palos is one of the six to twelve gunboats comprising the American Yangtze patrol headed by Rear Admiral Thomas Craven.

Another City Periled

Admiral Craven is now in the vicinity of Kiating seeking information concerning the extent of communist penetrations in Kiangsi province. Unconfirmed reports yesterday said communists have occupied Nanchang, Kiating, and are viewing Kiating with envious eyes.

A dispatch from the Standard Oil company offices at Kiating today said foreigners to Kiating, summer resort near Kiating, have been forced by Chinese authorities to leave immediately. Although Chinese officials failed to explain this request, it was considered an indication that fear communist incursion of that area.

There are hundreds of foreigners, including scores of Americans, in Kiating. They have been warned to evacuate the place in haste. Messengers dispatched from Changsha reported no alarming developments.

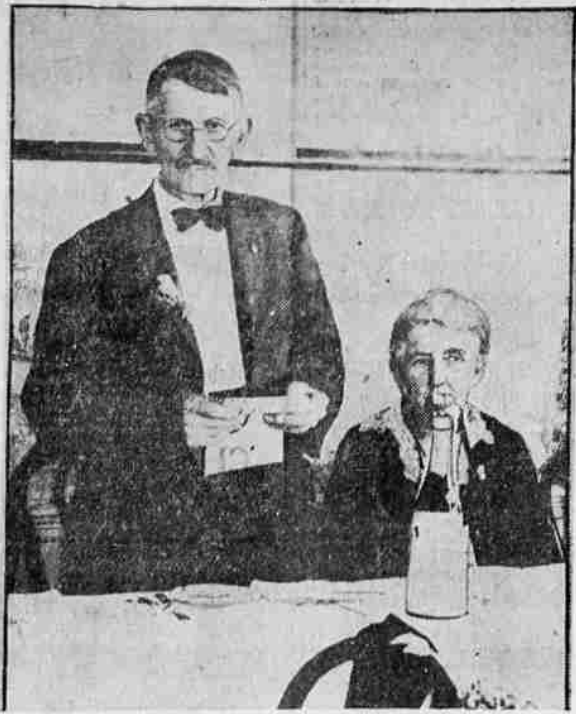

ments today. All foreigners, with the exception of four missionaries who chose to remain in the city when it was evacuated and for whom some concern is felt, have been removed to safety by American, British and Japanese gunboats.

Virtually all foreign property in and near the city lay in ruins, looted and given the torch by the invading reds. Of government buildings only the postoffice and hospital remained.

Aliens Thought Slain

SHANGHAI, July 31.—Japanese press dispatches from Hankow today said refugees arriving there today expressed the belief unidentified foreigners had been murdered when communists ravished Changsha, capital of Hunan province. The refugees said all other foreigners not rescued were in the hands of the reds.

The Hankow refugees, all Japanese, stated the communists also had abducted 300 wealthy Chinese merchants of Changsha and were holding them for ransom.

Two Americans, the Rev. W. H. Lingle and Dr. Allen N. Cameron, Miss Gertrude Ruz, a British missionary, and an Italian priest were known to have remained in Changsha when foreign gunboats left with about 50 refugees. One report expressed the belief Lingle had escaped from the communists. The four missionaries were said to have declined to leave the city.

SHANGHAI, July 31.—Changsha advices today indicated the fury of the communist army which burned and looted much of the foreign property in the Hunan capital had subsided somewhat although the reds retained control of the city. Dispatches said there were indications the reds were preparing to depart in a day or two. The majority of the invaders had withdrawn to a huge camp east of the city.

No new fires were reported today but numerous foreign properties to which the torch had been applied still were burning. Inspection of the city by foreigners still was impossible because gunboats could not approach within five miles of Changsha due to the low river level.

Japs Sailed Out. Although foreign properties on the island opposite the city had been looted, the majority of them were not burned. The reds apparently had been anxious to destroy Japanese property, having burned the Japanese club there. The communists also looted and

burned the Japanese consulate and the Japanese hospital on the mainland. The British Jardine-Matheson Steamship company's wharves were burned last night.

May Save Oil Depots. A slight rise in the river enabled gunboats to reach the vicinity of the Standard Oil and Shell Oil properties on the outskirts of the city and it was believed these would be saved unless a receding river level forced the gunboats to withdraw again. The oil properties are valued at about \$5,000,000 each.

The foreign gunboats appreciably improved their positions as a result of the river rise, and reached the environs of the city. An early inspection of the city was planned in the event of a communist withdrawal soon.

THREE FINED FOR WET JULY FOURTH. (Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, July 31.—George Rice, 28; Art McKee, 30, and James Quinn, 50, all of Klamath Falls, were fined \$250 each in federal court today on liquor charges. They made no court appearance.

Through Francis Marsh, assistant United States attorney, the three men entered pleas of guilty to liquor possession and transportation charges. They were arrested by federal prohibition agents in the "Last Chance" soft drink "saloon," operated in connection with a Fourth of July celebration in Klamath Falls.

Fines without jail sentences were recommended by Marsh on information that the defendants had never been in legal difficulties before and were highly regarded in Klamath Falls.

COZY DOLAN'S CLUB IN BOOZE DRAG NET. (Associated Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, July 31.—The fashionable Club Huron at 16 E. Huron St., under the management of John (Cozy) Dolan, former coach of the New York Giants, was raided by prohibition agents early today and several cases of liquor, wines and beer were seized.

Dolan, who figured in the Philadelphia-New York baseball scandal of 1934, was arrested. A dozen well-dressed couples, as well as the club hostess, were not detailed.

A card index bearing the names, the agents said, of several hundred persons, was seized and the names will be investigated.

DRY FORCE TO BE INCREASED BY 500

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, July 31.—An increase of approximately 25 per cent in the number of federal prohibition agents is to be asked of congress by the reorganized enforcement bureau.

This announcement was made late today by Amos W. W. Woodcock, director of prohibition, after a two-day series of conferences with the administrators in charge of enforcement in the field.

To the present force of approximately 2,000 agents, he said, about 500 are to be added. He described this number as tentative and subject to revision.

Nearly all of the administrators, he explained, were definitely of the opinion that the present staff of agents is inadequate and that the efficiency of their work could be greatly increased by adding to it.

BEAUTY PAGEANT ENTRANT STRANDED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 31.—Newspapers today published a report that President Moncada had ordered funds cabled to Senorita Taydee Morales, who represented "Miss Nicaragua" at the recent Miami International beauty contest and who was reported stranded in the United States.

The incident caused comment here because the father of the Nicaraguan beauty queen was a bitter political enemy of General Moncada before his election.

The funds were sent to buy her a ticket home.

CHARITY BENEFITS IN BANKER'S WILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire) LOS ANGELES, July 31.—Probate of the will of Motley H. Flint, banker and financier, recently shot to death, in superior court, today disclosed that two thirds of the \$750,000 estate was bequeathed to charity.

Fifty thousand dollars was left to the widow, Mrs. Gertrude Flint of \$180,000 to various relatives and friends.
