GENRIG'S HOMER BREAKS UP CLOSE PITCHERS' DUEL

Yanks Climb by Defeating Braves; Mackmen Trim Senators; Robins Boost Lead.

In 1919 Babe Ruth opened the era of lively baseball by hitting 29 home runs.

Five players, still led by the Babe, already have reached that mark of 29 this year with only about two-thirds of the season past. Ruth is even ahead of his greatest year, 1927, when he raised the home run record to 60 while Lou Gehrig and Hack Wilson are only a game or two behind that pace.

Gehrig was the only leader in the slugging brigade to hit a homer yesterday and he picked a highly appropriate moment to connect. The homer came in the tenth inning of the Yankees' game against Boston and turned a 2-2 pitching battle between Herb Pennock and Milton Gaston into a rout, the Yanks winning 8 to 2. They continued their slugging through the second game while George Frazier held the Sox in check to win by a 10 to 1 count.

Mackmen Beat Senators

The double victory gave the Yankees a bit of an edge on their leading rivals as the Philadelphia Athletics defeated Washington, 7 to 4. The Yanks now are only 2½ games behind the second place Senators, who in turn are seven "games back of the A's."

Grove held the Senators in check while four Washington hurlers proved ineffective although the teams not the same number of hits. President Hoover was a spectator. At Cleveland, Earl Whitehill's relief hurling kept the Indians from overcoming an early Detroit lead, although they had a 14-9 margin in the hitting, and the Tigers won, 6 to 5.

Browns Win Twin Bill

Stewart and Blueholder each pitched a nice game for St. Louis against Chicago, and the Browns won the first by means of unearned runs, 3 to 2 in ten innings, and the second, 6 to 1. The Sox made seven errors in the first game.

Brooklyn showed the way to National league in home run hitting as well as in the standings yesterday as they improved their position with a double victory over Philadelphia. Glenn Wright and Harvey Hendrick hit four baggers in the second game, which Brooklyn won, 9 to 4 after taking the first 9 to 5 while Frank O'Doul, another of the many who have climbed more than ten homers this season, hit his 13th in the first game. By winning two contests, to Robins placed themselves 2½ games ahead of Chicago, who was idle.

Fred Fitzsimmons also hit a homer and it made a hero of him despite the frequency with which this season. The homer clinched pitchers have been chasing homers, a rather doubtful dispute between the New York Giants and Boston Braves, giving New York a 5 to 2 victory. Fitzsimmons also hurled the full game and gave only eight hits. A timely single was all needed to give Pittsburgh its second 6 to 5 victory over St. Louis.

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Grim Walls of N. Y. Prison Bar Bogus Peer's Freedom

His Trail of Deception Checked, "Lord Francis," in Dreary Tombs, Boasts of His Love Conquests in the United States.

The Tombs, New York's most famous prison, is now doing quite a carriage trade. For, besides sheltering within its grim walls the Archduke Leopold of Austria, it is giving cell room to Francis Willis Harland-Edgcomb, said to be a scion of a prominent English family and known to Park Ave. and various doting dowagers as "Lord Duprez" or "Viscount Beaulieu."

When Edgcomb arrived in New York in 1928 in the capacity of secretary to Lady Sholto Douglas, one of Britain's wealthiest women, his dapper appearance and perfect manners, together with his employer's social prestige which gained him entry into some of the most exclusive homes on Park Ave. After the return of Lady Douglas from Washington, she released her debonair secretary, as it is believed that officials of the British embassy had acquainted her with her servant's prison record which includes sojourns at several English prisons. Not wishing to let her friends know that she had been duped, she left the country and the noble Harland-Edgcomb to continue his explorations of drawing rooms and boudoirs of leading members of New York society.

Using the name of Howard Norton, Edgcomb obtained employment with Everett Vincent Currier, a publisher, and as rushing charming "debbs" with expensive tastes, is difficult on a limited income, the danger Englishman brought out his book of rubber checks and released some in the direction of his employer. But until he was arrested on the larceny charge, he was going strong with some of the best known people in New York who apparently accepted the Britisher on the strength of his Mayfair accent, perfect clothes, suave manners and obvious knowledge of polo and hunting.

The Beaux Arts Ball, the exclusive Embassy Club, the roof of the St. Regis hotel, Edgcomb made the round of them all, dining sumptuously at the expense of various prominent hostesses, none of whom came to his rescue when he was sentenced to the penitentiary on Welfare Island for an indeterminate term. And on his release last week from that institution, he at least did find someone waiting for him. It was not any of his debonair friends it wasn't even a family retainer, it was Detective Edward Fitzgerald, of Bernardsville, N. J., who conducted his newly met acquaintance straight to a cell in the Tombs to await arraignment on a charge of having forged two checks on Frederick Strohmeier, of Bernardsville, N. J. In June, 1928, at the time that most exclusive colony was basking in the reflected glory of the aristocratic young man, then resident in its midst.

He claims to have won the heart of several prominent members of the younger set of various cities. But, the authorities declare that he will have to leave all these charming friends and experiences behind him, for, as soon as the latest charge is disposed of, deportation proceedings will quickly follow. Until then, Edgcomb, who declares "that it is all a beastly mistake," is expected that some of his erstwhile friends will help him out of "a most beastly and awful mess." For Welfare Island and the Tombs are quite the nicest phase of New York life.
