Gore, blind former senator, with whom he will contest for the democratic senatorial nomination in a runoff primary Aug. 12 on the face of the returns from 3,248 out of 3,338 precincts tabulated today by the Associated Press. The vote: Wrightsman 70,227; Gore 69,976.
